Liberty Ball Honors Our Military

Arthur "Artie" Corr was honored, in memoriam, as a veteran and for his long and distinguished service to the Knights of Columbus at the 11th Annual Liberty Ball July 1 at the new St. Leo the Great Parish Life Center.

Artie held many positions within the Knights, and, at the time of his death, was serving as State Marshall, District of Florida. In addition to the many positions he held within the Knights, Artie and his wife Pat served St. John the Evangelist in several parish ministries.

The Liberty Ball, which is sponsored by our local 4th Degree Assembly Knights of Columbus, honored all current military personnel as well as veterans who served our country with distinction during past conflicts.

Among the veterans who received special recognition during the evening was St. John's own Dortha "Dottie" Farrell. Lt. Farrell served with the Army Medical Corps during World War II throughout France and Germany. She landed in Normandy June 7, 1944, and served in or near combat zones until the end of the war.

Proceeds from the Liberty Ball go to support many veterans and community projects.

During the past year our 4th Degree Assembly has purchased wheelchairs for veterans; supported the Archdiocese for Military Services with financial support for Catholic Chaplains serving throughout the world;



During the Liberty Ball, the Knights displayed the monument which depicts soldiers raising the United States flag atop Mount Suribachi on the island of Iwo Jima. The flag was raised on February 25, 1945. Arthur "Artie" Corr was honored, in memoriam, at the Liberty Ball.

Last week I alluded to the fact that the rainy season had begun. As it turns out, that was an understatement. We have had measurable rainfall every day for the past seven days as of this past Tuesday. Unfortunately, it is very difficult to re-seal and re-stripe a parking lot when the conditions are wet. A job that was supposed to be completed in three days was still far from completed as of this past Wednesday morning. We apologize for the inconvenience, however, mother nature can be very fickle and we are all paying the price. The good news is that we are receiving much needed rainfall. The bad news is that the forecast calls for increased rainfall at the end of this past week with the approach of a tropical wave. Being the eternal optimist, I am hopeful that we can find a window of dry weather to finish the parking lot project.

Have you had a chance to walk through the Memorial Garden recently? We continue to enhance the landscaping and have added beautiful new shrubs on the interior of the garden. The Zoysia grass is thriving with the recent rainfall and the entire garden looks absolutely beautiful. Many of our parishioners have taken advantage of my suggestion to purchase a space sooner than later. Most of the sales in the past were to parishioners in their 70's and beyond. Recently, the age of prospective buyers has dropped substantially, and I am meeting with many couples in their 50's and 60's. There is no greater gift that you can give your loved ones than to plan ahead and have all

your final arrangements in order prior to your death. The all-inclusive cost to purchase a space in our Memorial Garden is only \$1,200.00. This price includes the opening, closing, urn headstone and plaque. If you are interested in making St. John the Evangelist your final resting place, please contact me at your earliest convenience at 566-1678.

Did you know that the nature of the landscaping in the Memorial Garden was planned for a particular reason? We wanted to plant as many flowering trees, shrubs and plants as possible for one specific purpose. The last thing we want to do is clutter our beautiful Memorial Garden with plastic flowers and large bouquets that look out of place. The idea is that instead of placing an arrangement of flowers on a particular grave, you would pick one of the many varieties of flowering plants and place this on the grave. The placement of small American flags is also perfectly appropriate.

Work in the Paniccia Prayer Garden continues at a steady pace. All of the paver work has been completed, and you may now see the outline of the garden taking shape. Lattice is currently being installed in the gazebo, which will ultimately be the main entrance. The lattice will be shrouded with Confederate Jasmine providing a dramatic entrance into the garden. In addition, when in bloom, the aroma of the jasmine is absolutely intoxicating. The conduit for electrical and irrigation has been installed. Due to the poor soil underneath the existing pavers, we have brought in organic material to be rototilled into the existing soil to create a solid foundation for the new plantings. We are also going to install a sound system so that music may be heard by those visiting the

garden. Installation of landscaping should begin this coming week allowing the new plantings the remainder of the growing

season to become established.

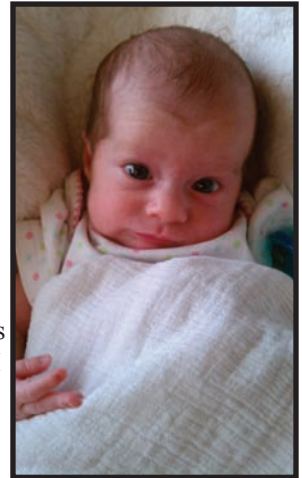

update: As I was looking at the triplets the other day, I noticed that they are beginning to lose the hair that they came into this world with. I then took a good look at myself and contemplated

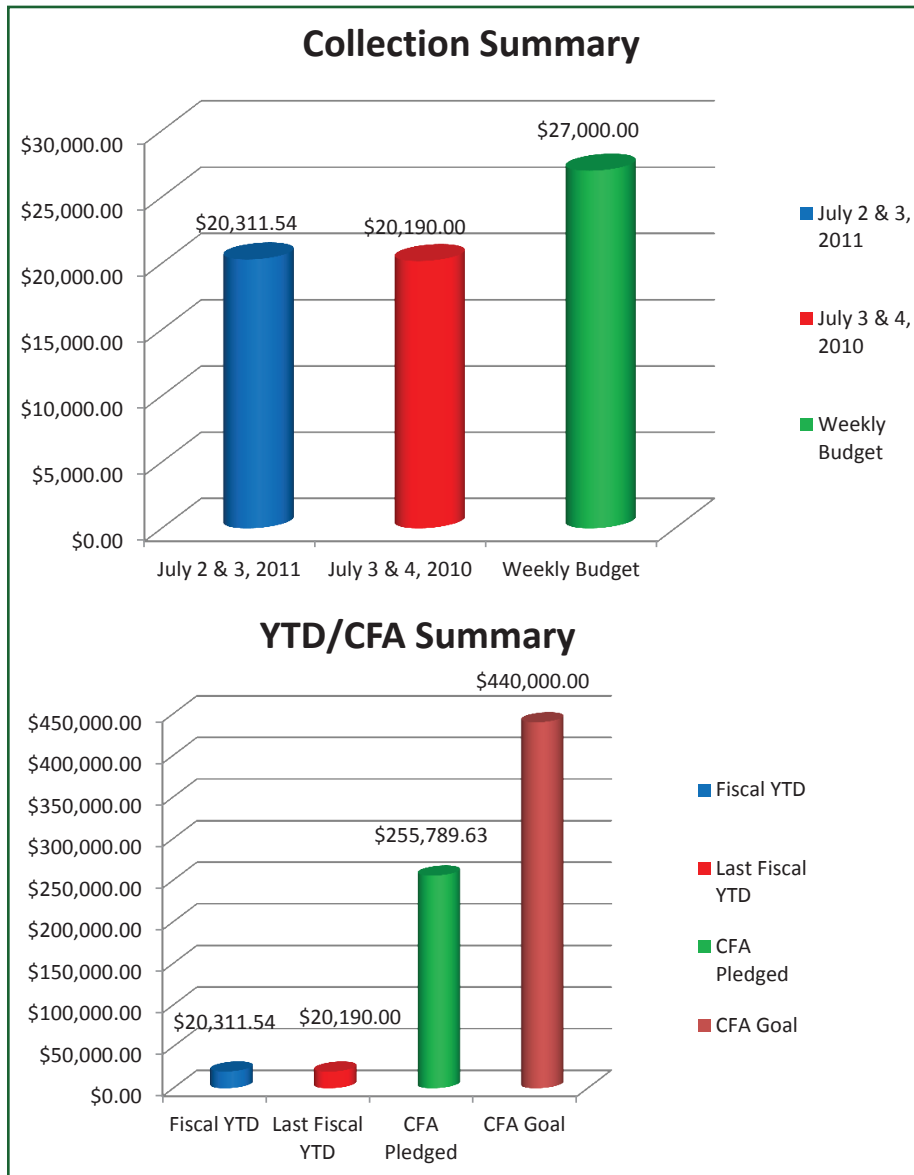

Ask and Youth Will Receive

Thank you to everyone who took the time to fill out our Youth Ministry Surveys. The information we gathered is proving extremely valuable as our Youth Ministry Planning Team develops new and exciting programs that will be a vital part of our youth's lives.

Here are the top five interests of the youth in our parish:

1. Learn to speak naturally and intelligently about my faith (Catechesis)
2. Recreation and social activities where youth get acquainted (Community Life)
3. Be of service to other people in my community and the world who need help (Justice and Service)
4. Experience a closer relationship with God (Prayer and Worship)
5. Develop a deeper understanding of the life and message of Christ (Evangelization)

According to our surveys, the number one thing youth are interested in is learning to speak naturally and intelligently about their faith. From this piece of information, we can see that our youth are truly interested in learning more about their faith, which is wonderful! To ensure we are completely meeting this need, we are updating our resources and strengthening our previous efforts in Catechesis. We are also increasing our efforts in Community Life, Justice and Service, Prayer and Worship, and Evangelization, which are the components of youth ministry that coincide with our youth's interests.

Parents' View of Youth Ministry

Another interesting point our surveys showed us is that the youth's interests strongly reflect the interests of their parents. This evidence supports the fact that

parents are the primary teachers of their children in the Catholic faith. To ensure our parents are receiving the support they need to continue teaching their children, we are adding family-oriented programs to our youth ministry efforts, including things like family and parish-sponsored service projects, family potluck socials and parent and youth family nights (movies, games, etc.).

The amount of support and insight that was given in our Parish Adult Surveys was inspirational as well. It is incredible how many people in our parish, who do not have children in our youth ministry programs, are so interested in the youth's faith development. Most everyone recognizes the "optimism, high energy, willingness to help, creativity and enthusiasm" of our young people. With those positive characteristics that several of you commented on, we can rest assured that our parish youth ministry really will be amazing.

✠✠✠ Embracing Change in the Liturgy ✠✠✠

For many people, change does not come easy. Change requires us to stop doing things a certain way in order to do something else. Many people find comfort in familiar routines and known ways of acting. Change interrupts those familiar routines. But change is also an opportunity to stop and reflect on what we are doing and to come to a better understanding of God, who does not change.

Why does the Church change the Liturgy?

In its Liturgy, the Church always attempts to follow the “norm of the holy Fathers.” This effort “requires not only the preservation of what our immediate forebears have handed on to us, but also an understanding and a more profound pondering of the Church’s entire past. . . . this broader view allows us to see how the Holy Spirit endows the People of God with a marvelous fidelity in preserving the unalterable deposit of faith, even though there is a very great variety of prayers and rites” (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, no. 9).

The Liturgy must, therefore, always celebrate and make present the Paschal Sacrifice of Christ—his saving Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension. However, over time, it may become necessary to make certain changes, such as adding prayers for recently canonized saints and adding texts that reflect the needs that the People of God wish to bring to God in prayer. The third edition of the *Roman Missal* makes such additions and provides a fresh translation of the Latin texts of the existing content of the *Missal*.

Who decides that the Liturgy should change?

Pope John Paul II approved the promulgation of the third edition of the *Missale Romanum*, the Latin text, on April 20, 2000. The final Latin edition of the revised text was published in March 2002. The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments was responsible for preparing the text. The Congregation is the Vatican office that the pope has charged with overseeing all matters related to the Liturgy and the sacraments. Any changes in the words of the sacramental formulas—the essential words in the celebration of each of the sacraments (either in Latin or in vernacular translations)—must be approved by the Holy Father personally. In addition, church law also gives to conferences

of bishops (such as the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops) as well as individual bishops certain responsibilities with regard to the Liturgy.

What exactly is changing?

The structure of the Mass (the order of the elements, the actions of the priest celebrant, and so forth) remains unchanged in the new edition of the *Roman Missal*. However, the translation of the prayer texts will change to more closely reflect the original Latin texts. In some cases, new options for prayers may be available, and some old options may no longer be present.

Will the changes be noticeable?

In the third edition of the *Roman Missal*, almost every prayer in the Mass—those spoken by the priest and those spoken by the people—has been retranslated from the Latin to English. Some prayers now recited by memory will need to be relearned, and the familiar language of many prayers recited by the priest will change.

In preparing the new translation, the translators were asked to make the English texts conform more closely to the Latin originals and to retain traditional theological vocabulary that communicates important concepts of the faith. The language that the faithful will hear and pray is more formal and somewhat more complex than the language of ordinary conversation. It conveys rich theological concepts and retains biblical language and images.

How can I prepare for the change?

There are many ways in which you can prepare for the changes in the Mass:

- ✠ Make a conscious effort to participate more fully in the Mass each Sunday and holy day.
- ✠ Take advantage of any special catechetical sessions offered by your parish or diocese.
- ✠ Visit the *Roman Missal* Web site (www.usccb.org/romanmissal) to study the new texts and to learn more about the changes.
- ✠ Read the new texts of the people’s parts at Mass. Begin to study them so that you will be able to pray them well when the new *Roman Missal* is implemented.
- ✠ Pray for a renewal of love for the Liturgy in your parish and in the Church.

What difference will these changes make in my parish?

Some of the differences will be obvious immediately. We will have to learn new musical settings for the various parts of the Mass. We will learn new words for common prayers, such as the Creed. Those of us who began saying the Mass prayers by heart long ago will need to rely on printed texts again, at least for a while. In the early months of the transition, we may find it more challenging to pray with one voice as people adjust to the new texts and gradually commit them to their hearts.

But these surface differences will give way to deeper and more significant changes. If we use the time of preparation well, we will make the changes with a deeper understanding of the Liturgy and a renewed reverence for and appreciation of the Mass. We will hear the prayers with new ears and with new hearts. Our Liturgy will be filled with new life and new spirit as we celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Christ made present for us.

Where can I turn for help in understanding these changes?

The first stop for catechesis and formation regarding these changes is your parish and diocese. All the faithful are encouraged to take advantage of parish efforts. You can attend catechetical sessions, read articles in the parish bulletin or newsletter or the diocesan newspaper, listen closely to homilies that help explain the changes, and come early to Mass to practice new musical settings for the prayers.

In addition, many dioceses, schools, universities, and retreat centers will offer programs to help people understand and appreciate the new translation. You can take advantage of these programs where possible.

The official Web site for the third edition of the *Roman Missal* is found at www.usccb.org/fromanmissal. A variety of resources will be posted that may help you.

Catholic publishers and national organizations will publish many resources, in print and online, to help you negotiate this time of change. Check out your parish book rack or your local Catholic bookstore to see what is available.

What if I don't like the new translation?

For most people, the unfamiliar is always uncomfortable, at least at first. The more familiar the old is, the more challenging it may be to accept and embrace the new. It is completely normal to feel uncomfortable as you begin studying and reading the new texts. Taking steps to become more familiar

with the texts can help a great deal. At the same time, be open to the possibility that you will find things to appreciate in the rich language of the new texts. The more you read them and study them and pray them, the more familiar and comfortable they will become and the more you will appreciate the theological depth they convey.

Taking the time to learn more about your faith, including the Mass and Scripture, can help you appreciate the new texts more fully. Using the catechetical opportunities made available by your parish and diocese can help you overcome concerns about the changes.

Finally, you can take your concerns to God in prayer. Pray for a deeper understanding of the meaning of these texts and for an open heart to grow in communion with the Church.

What can I do to make the process of change a good one for my parish?

Everyone has a role to play in preparing to use the new translations:

- ✘ Study the new texts with an open heart and an open mind so that you will be ready to use them in the Liturgy.
- ✘ Take advantage of opportunities to learn more about the new texts by attending catechetical programs and reading articles about the new texts.
- ✘ Offer to assist your pastor or parish director of religious education in preparing parish catechetical events.
- ✘ If you are a parent, teach your children the new prayers and help them to understand the changes. Encourage them to participate in the Mass fully and to learn more about their faith.
- ✘ Be very intentional about celebrating the Liturgy each Sunday and holy day. Arrive on time (or a bit early). Pray and sing with attentiveness. Stay focused on the action of the Liturgy rather than letting your mind wander. Hold the Sacrament of the Eucharist in great reverence. Finally, give thanks to God in your heart for so great a gift.

Times of change are always a challenge. But from this challenge can come a deeper appreciation of who we are as the Body of Christ, gathering to celebrate the Paschal Mystery of the Lord.
