

Changes to the Roman Missal

My dear parishioners,

Change happens.

Just take a look at your grade school picture; you will know what I mean. Change happens throughout the span of our lives. We change in appearance. We change in interests. We change in behavior. History records changes that have taken place in every society, in every culture, in every organization. Some changes mark progress. Horsedriven carriages have given way to combustion-engine cars. Combustion-engine cars are giving way to hybrids. Typewriters succumbed to the emergence of the computer. The photocopier replaced the messy stencils on the mimeograph machine. Fax, e-mail and smart phones have changed the ways in which we communicate. Some changes mark decline. Regimes collapse, businesses fold, stock portfolios fall, homes are lost, and churches close. Change characterizes all life, personal and organizational.

Change happens.

Change happens in the Church as well. This should not surprise us. While the Magisterium keeps the Church in continuity with the intentions of its founder, Jesus Christ, the church as a living institution changes. Throughout the church's history, liturgical changes have taken place — some significant, some minor, some grand, some very simple. Consider what has taken place in the liturgy in our own life times since the Second Vatican Council's promulgation of Sacrosanctum Concilium (Constitution of the Sacred Liturgy) in 1963. The priest now faces the community. We pray in the vernacular. People participate in a full and conscious way. Laity serve as lectors and extraordinary ministers of holy communion, as cantors and psalmists.

Organizational development teaches us that change is always messy, fraught with challenges. Change can take an emotional

toll, evoke different and oftentimes idiosyncratic response from people and can disrupt and divide a community. Change can leave an individual or an organization better or worse depending on how that change is prepared for and dealt with. People need to understand why changes are being made and become convinced of the change's wisdom. Change comes with difficulty, sometimes with resistance, oftentimes with

a sense of loss. Just look at the changes after Vatican II.

Some people neither understood nor accepted the changes that were put into effect. In many places the changes happened overnight with little or no preparation. That was a great mistake. Where and how one prays is sacred to people, affecting us at our deepest roots.

St. John the Evangelist Parish, during these past months, began the communication process concerning the changes to the New Roman Missal to take effect on Sunday November 27. We have placed in the weekly bulletin a series on the upcoming changes. Shortly, we will begin to review the new music at Mass, and we have talked about it at

Mass from the ambo. We want to do everything possible to make this a positive change for all of us. To further enhance our communication we have scheduled group sessions for all parishioners to attend, which will include the reasons for the changes, the changes for the people, the changes for the presider, and some catechesis of the Eucharist, which have been strongly recommended by the United States Council of Catholic Bishops, and most importantly an opportunity for questions and answers.

We have scheduled a total of fifteen sessions in an effort to provide a time convenient for everyone. Each session will cover the same topic. The sessions will be led by myself. The sessions will last for about an hour and a half.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.



Thank you so much to everyone that gave so very generously to the second collection last weekend for World Missions. The collection totaled \$6,079.00. Offerings from Catholics in the United States, on World Mission Sunday and throughout the year, are combined with offerings to the Propagation of the Faith from Catholics worldwide. Mission dioceses about 1,000 at this time - receive regular annual assistance from the funds collected. In addition, these mission dioceses submit requests to the Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples for assistance, among other needs, for catechetical programs, seminaries, the work of Religious Communities, for communication and transportation needs, and for the building of chapels and churches. These needs are matched with the funds gathered in each year. The world's national directors of the Propagation of the Faith vote on these requests, matching the funds available with the greatest needs. These funds are then distributed to Mission (Arch) Dioceses throughout the world. This General Fund of support is then distributed in its entirety each year.

Veterans Day is a day to remember, honor and thank all who served in the United States Military. In 1954, President Dwight Eisenhower signed a bill into law proclaiming November 11 as Veterans Day and called upon all Americans to rededicate themselves to the cause of peace. Leadership ~ The Call to Serve

s we listen to the gospel, we find that Jesus makes no veiled attempts at putting the Scribes and Pharisees in their place. Jesus' criticism of the religious leaders had been communicated by way of parable up until this point. Such criticism of the religious aristocracy brought Jesus' mission to another level. He was confronting the religious leadership with its own weakness. What was their weakness? The weakness that Jesus clearly sees is that these men had succumbed to power and control rather than surrendering to God's will and mercy. They were no longer servants of God's Word, rather they became the astute lawyers and police of the people. Jesus warns his listeners to follow the observances of Moses, but not the example of the teachers. Jesus did not want the religious leaders to become more caught up in their practices and their appearances. Jesus wanted each one of them to see that tradition certainly has its place but it is never more important than people. Christ recognizes the great opportunity the leaders have in removing painful burdens from people's lives, but He also recognizes

the painful reality of the leaders doing nothing about it. Jesus encourages his listeners to pay heed to the ultimate teacher who is God. The only true father is the Father in heaven -- the Father of truth and love, the Father who is slow to anger and rich in mercy, the Father who takes away his children's burdens.


Many fundamentalists have used this gospel text to challenge the leadership of the Catholic Church on a variety of different levels. As Catholics we are often asked, "Why do you call your priests 'father' when scripture states that you should not call anyone on earth your father, you have but

one Father in heaven?" To approach the gospel in this way is too literal and entirely misses the point that Jesus was making. Jesus was reminding the people of his day that religious leadership is about service to the Word of God, inspiring others to fall in love with the Father in heaven and to listen to his commandments of love. The leader of faith should become selfless and transparent so that God may be encountered through him. The priest is given the title "father" as a reminder of his mission and ministry to bring others to God the Father and to love them as our heavenly Father does. Authentic religious leadership should bring others to the teachings of Truth that has been granted by the Father in heaven. There are others who have mentioned that all the sense of ritual in the Church is reminiscent of this gospel passage, and they use this opportunity to ridicule members of the clergy. Again, such a position entirely misses the point that Jesus was making. When we look at the gospels it is very clear that Jesus observed many customs and practices of his faith. In fact, on the night before he died, he celebrated Passover, the oldest ritual practice of the Jews, in the presence of his disciples. Ritual has its place. Vestments and the adornments in places of worship certainly raise humanity's consciousness toward God and our destiny. However, these are never intended to be put ahead of people.

Since the Second Vatican Council, many have been called to leadership within the Church. Both the ministerial priesthood (Clergy) and priesthood of believers (the baptized) are asked to communicate the truth of the gospel, sharing the grace of God's mercy. Together as priest and people, the Church strives to grow in holiness as it serves the world. From the

community, God calls people forth to offer their lives in humility and sacrifice, so that others may feel the healing hand of God. Jesus is reminding us today that all of us share in the dignity of Christian leadership. We should not just be concerned about ourselves and those who are dear to us. Rather, we should be concerned with the redemption and salvation of all people. More specifically, this means that we should always have the humility to recognize that the broken reality of people's lives is actually the fertile ground in which God's mercy grows through the work of our hands. Whenever we are confronted by suffering and sin, we are given an opportunity to give witness to Rabbi Jesus and follow his example of mercy and love.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"Having set forth the functions of the hierarchy, the Sacred Council gladly turns its attention to the state of those faithful called the laity. Everything that has been said above concerning the People of God is intended for the laity, religious and clergy alike. But there are certain things which pertain in a special way to the laity, both men and women, by reason of their condition and mission. Due to the special circumstances of our time the foundations of this doctrine must be more thoroughly examined. For their pastors know how much the laity contribute to the welfare of the entire Church. They also know that they were not ordained by Christ to take upon themselves alone the entire salvific mission of the Church toward the world. On the contrary, they understand that it is their noble duty to shepherd the faithful and to recognize their ministries and charisms, so that all according to their proper roles may cooperate in this common undertaking with one mind. For we must all "practice the truth in love, and so grow up in all things in Him who is head, Christ. For from Him the whole body, being closely joined and knit together through every joint of the system, according to the functioning in due measure of each single part, derives its increase to the building up of itself in love".

New Accoutrements Help Create Sacred Place for Celebrating Mass

Last week, we discussed in detail the structural renovations in the church which took place in late August and September of last year. This week we will address the accourrements.

Many of you are familiar with Marty Gauthier. He is an active member of the Arts and Liturgical Environment Committee and the Building and Grounds Committee. Marty was an integral player in the renovation of the church and worked tirelessly (literally) to make sure everything was just right prior to the grand opening. One of Marty's biggest accomplishments was the fabrication of the pedestal for our new Tabernacle. The pedestal was constructed of existing materials already in place in the sanctuary. The old massive stone celebrant's chair was used as the base for the pedestal. The remainder of the pedestal was composed of cast stone pieces that were formerly the benches used for altar server seating and the old Tabernacle wall. Marty used exactly 12 pieces of stone to construct the pedestal which is symbolic of the 12 disciples of Jesus.

The new Tabernacle is a massive 300 pound work of art depicting Jesus with the 12 disciples on the front. It was designed and fabricated in Spain. Immediately above the Tabernacle is our beautiful crucifix. The large wooden cross was hand made by Marty

Gauthier and the corpus is an original commissioned piece created by Timothy Schmalz, the same sculptor that designed the Blessed Mother and Saint John the Evangelist statues. The old stone pieces, which once hung above the altar representing the risen Christ, were moved to the back wall immediately outside of the Narthex. By moving this structure we created a sharp contrast with the crucifixion above the altar and the risen Christ or resurrection as parishioners leave Mass. The use of existing materials and symbolism was a great addition to our newly renovated church. Adjacent to the Tabernacle is a magnificent sanctuary lamp. This piece was also designed and fabricated in Spain.

Additionally, we installed a new celebrant's chair and accompanying side chairs, which were moved to the right of center to allow for a clear view of the celebrant and concelebrants. The Tabernacle, Sanctuary Lamp, Celebrant's chair and side chairs were all the gift of a very generous anonymous donor. After the old Stations of the Cross were removed, new Stations were purchased by the generosity of a gift from John and Maureen Wurtz. These beautiful new Stations were fabricated in Italy and are now installed around the entire perimeter of the church. The Altar was appointed with beautiful new candle stands which were the gift of Andy and Kay Sanfellipo, Bobbi Rossi and Thomas and Sondra Sheehan. New ciboria were purchased for the distribution of the body of Christ by a gift from Philip and Nace Baier and an anonymous donor. Finally, Votive Candle Stands were installed adjacent to the Blessed Mother and St. John the Evangelist statues as a gift of James and Tomasina Schiro.

By adding the aforementioned accoutrements, we feel that we have created a very sacred

space in which to celebrate Mass. We are confident that you appreciate these wonderful changes to our church. Thank you once again to all of the donors that made these changes possible.




Through the Knights of Columbus Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP), councils, assemblies and Squires circles "adopt" one or more seminarians or postulants and provide them with financial assistance and moral support.

RSVP money is used by seminarians and those in religious formation for tuition and books, car insurance and maintenance, travel during vacations, emergency expenditures and other living expenses. Knights provide more than financial support, though. Members write letters to students, sponsor dinners for them, invite them to join the Order and, most importantly, pray for vocations.

Last year, financial help from 2,697 councils, assemblies and circles to future priests, sisters and brothers, exceeded \$2.8 million. Since 1981 the Order has provided more than \$49.9 million in aid through RSVP, helping more than 80,000 men and women follow their vocations.

Qualifying councils and assemblies receive a \$100 refund for every \$500 donated, up to a limit of \$2,000 donated to an individual seminarian. This refund is placed into the Council Vocation Fund.


