
Deacon Matthew Grady has written about his journey to the Priesthood.


Continued from page 1 courage to follow the path. Another aspect to this image is the fact that any journey involves decisions. No path exists alone, it crosses many others and it may sometimes occur to us to explore these other ways too. The fact is that this path is something I chose to walk with the help of many others and above all with the help of God. I am really overjoyed as I approach the priesthood, because I know it is the sum of many decisions, many prayers for guidance and most of all a personal choice

to put my life at the crossroads of a bigger path where God and people encounter each other every day.

My journey to the priesthood did not come out of a startling revelation and I cannot really pin it on one specific moment. Many events in my young life came together at once and it was above all the loss of my mother to cancer and the comfort which subsequently came from my faith that I believe left a lasting impact on my approach to life from then on. God was a refuge for me and my family in our time of need and so were so many other good and faithful people who lived the message of the Gospel. In the midst of all this I encountered many priests, men who seemingly stood apart, men who led us in prayer and consolation, men who could keep their composure and calm while explaining to me how everything would be all right under God's protection. I was inspired by this bravery and conviction, it is something that still inspires me, that no

matter how bad things get for any of us, we have nothing to fear, we are in the arms of a loving Father who will find a million and one ways to show us how much we are loved.

As a teenager I went off to a boarding school in Wisconsin. It offered an opportunity to focus on discernment of priesthood. I am grateful for the experience because it allowed me to live the normal experience of high school while at the same time really getting a practical look at what the life of a priest was like. From there I was not sure if and where I'd want to go to seminary, so I decided to first get my Bachelor's degree. I arrived to Southwest Florida in Fall of 2008 to start at the newly minted Ave Maria University

in the Vineyards of Naples. My interest in languages brought me to the Classics program where I got a great education in Ancient Latin and Greek. During my last year of school there and after having visited a few places, I decided to turn my gaze to the Diocese in which I was living. It really struck me that while I had considered places I'd lived before why had I not thought about the place that I'd been most involved with as a young adult, coming into my own commitment of faith. It was then that I approached the

Diocese of Venice and I immediately knew I found where God wanted me to be. The whole process of joining was welcoming and friendly, everything came together almost effortlessly and I really grew to love Florida and didn't want to leave any time soon.

As God would have it I was going to be leaving Florida quite soon. I was sent to Rome for my seminary studies and I'm still there now. I'll do one more year there as a new priest to get the academic license in Scripture I'm currently enrolled in. My time in Rome has been nothing short of a blessed and maturing experience. I feel like I have been able to see the church at her heart and I feel so humbled to see how so many people from all around the world share our faith and find peace and comfort in the message of Jesus as taught by our church. It is a universal experience and one steeped in great traditions, glorious patrimony and most of all it continues to inspire and endure

world wide. The experience of seminary is something which is truly necessary for the formation of a priest. I can say without a doubt that I have grown, and, more importantly, know that I always need to grow since having undergone the process. I am grateful for everything that's been passed on to me, and at the same time I am glad the seminarian experience is not meant to last forever. I am eager to put my hand to the plow and mark out a path on my own, I know it is my turn to lead now, my time to blaze a trail by which people can encounter God in the pathways of their lives.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.



The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops offers several facts regarding the Health and Human Services (HHS) regulations on mandatory coverage of contraceptives, sterilization and abortion-inducing drugs.

Many others have joined the Catholic bishops in speaking out against the mandate. Many recognize this as an assault on the broader principle of religious liberty, whether or

not they agree with the Church on the underlying moral question. For example, at a February 2012 congressional hearing on this issue, testimony supporting the USCCB's position was heard from the President of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, a distinguished Orthodox rabbi, and officials and professors from several Protestant institutions of higher learning. The nation's largest non-Catholic denomination, the Southern Baptist Convention, has strongly criticized the contraceptive mandate, as have leaders of the National Association of Evangelicals, Institutional Religious Freedom Alliance, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, Evangelicals for Social Action, and the Council for Christian Colleges and Universities. An online declaration supporting the Church's position has been signed by about 28,000 Catholic and non-Catholic women, including many health professionals, academics and businesswomen.

Every summer I have a jealous streak that comes over me knowing that our seasonal residents are up north enjoying truly beautiful weather while we are left to sweat it out in Southwest Florida until they return in the fall. It seems that the tables have turned slightly this year. Our high temperatures in the low 90s pale in comparison to what others

are experiencing up north. From Minneapolis to Chicago to New York and even in Boston, temperatures are extremely unseasonable with many of these cities seeing triple digits in the past week. Looking at the national temperature map, it seems that the only safe haven is the coast of California. The good news for those up north is that this heat wave won't last. The unfortunate news for us is that we can guarantee temperatures in the low to mid 90s and humidity of at least 90% for the next several months.

This past Sunday marked the beginning of our new fiscal year. Our fiscal year runs July 1 – June 30. I am pleased to announce that in the face of a challenging economy, we once again finished the fiscal year "in the black." Once I have

completely closed the books for last fiscal year, we will publish a financial report in the bulletin so that you may see the details. On behalf of St. John the Evangelist parish, thank you for your extreme generosity in allowing us to remain solvent during the trying economic times.

Did you know that the nature of the landscaping in the Memorial Garden was planned for a particular reason? We wanted to plant as many flowering trees, shrubs and plants as possible for one specific purpose. The last thing we want to do is clutter our beautiful Memorial Garden with plastic flowers and large bouquets that look out of place. The idea is that instead of placing an arrangement of flowers on a particular grave, you would pick one of the many varieties of flowering plants and place this on the grave. See the attached picture of the new landscaping and a gentleman placing a freshly picked hibiscus on a grave. I would kindly ask that

you comply with this request to further beautify our garden. The placement of small American flags is also perfectly appropriate.

The final order of granite benches arrived this past week and

they have been installed in the Memorial Garden and in the courtyard between the church and Parish Life Center. If you missed out on the opportunity to purchase a bench, we may have one final campaign. Please see the bulletin for details as they become available.

Each week the Diocese of Venice sends me an updated spreadsheet of contributions made to the Catholic Faith Appeal (CFA.) Included in this report are statistics regarding the total number of registered families and those that have made a contribution the CFA. We currently have 2,600 registered families at St. John the Evangelist. A registered family is defined as one that has contributed at least \$1 in the past twelve months. Obviously, our parish membership is much greater than the 2,600 listed, however, many choose not to register, others do not contribute and many more are very seasonal and contribute cash while here, making them virtually "invisible" as far as record keeping goes. What I found truly amazing is that only 29.99% of these registered families have contributed to the CFA. That amounts to roughly 780 of our 2,600 families. Currently, we are \$168,000 short of reaching our goal for the 2012 appeal. If we had participation from the 1,820 families that have not yet made a contribution

> or pledge, we would have a great shot at exceeding our goal this year and on into the future. Our shortfall divided by the number of families not contributing amounts to approximately \$92.00 per family. If these 1,820 families were able to make an annual pledge of \$100 (\$1.92 per week at 52 weeks) to the CFA, we would be in great shape. As everyone is aware through my constant badgering, we missed our goal last year by \$23,000.00. This shortfall was recognized by operating funds that would have been put to

better use by supporting our countless ministries within the parish. Remember that the CFA is the single most important component of our annual operating budget. For those who have made a pledge or contribution the CFA, thank you for your generosity. For those who have not, please consider doing so as there is certainly power in numbers. Although \$1.92 per week doesn't sound like a lot, when there is


a factor of 1,000 or more involved, the growth is exponential. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

Wisdom Beyond Time and Space

he Incarnation represents for us the dawning of salvation. The characters involved in the events surrounding this watershed in history were people like us. Since salvation was to be offered to the world, God's wisdom came to rest in the midst of the human condition. Jesus, for us, is the wisdom of God. Jesus was confronted by the fragility of human existence. His hand of healing was extended to the poor, the broken hearted, the weak, the strong, the outcast, the sinner, the possessed, the dispossessed, the depraved, the religious, the nonreligious, the God-filled, the Godless, the blind, the sick and the dead. Jesus was a man for all seasons who touched and

transformed the heart of humanity. The most powerful factor in all of this, the Word became flesh to dwell among us, to transform us. God becomes one with us to show us how to be truly human.

We cannot fully appreciate the context within which Jesus lived. Scripture tells us that he came from a small town of Nazareth. It was a basic town in which very simple town folk existed. Their lives would have been very basic where trade and commerce took place on a very local level. Roman legions would have probably been scarce, but the people had to pay taxes to Caesar. Jesus was born into this simple life. He was the

son of Mary and the Carpenter,
Joseph. He would have been
taught the trade of his foster
father in order to make ends meet.
His contemporaries watched
him grow and mature. It is not
surprising, therefore, to see Jesus
being rejected in today's account
of the gospel. For the believers
of the day, God existed in the
heavens. The work of the Lord
was accomplished in the Anointed
people God had chosen. The
questions they would have been
asking, "How can Jesus perform

the great acts of faith? How can he have such wisdom for he is one of us?" Jesus realizes their lack of faith and is not able to accomplish God's work among his own and has to move on. The negative aspect of humanity gets in the way of Jesus' gift to transform humanity.

The reality of God is clear. Jesus became flesh to become a model of perfection for humanity. Just like the prophets and the chosen disciples, God likewise chooses people like us to accomplish his mission. Through the very nature of baptism, we are set apart to make his presence known in the world today. The wisdom of God is to speak through us – our words and deeds. We have an opportunity to reach out to the various groups of people that Jesus reached out to. The ministry and wisdom of Jesus transcends time and space to occupy



an important place in our faith life and journey. We might very well face opposition from the contemporaries of our day. Maybe there will be some who might always be on the sidelines pointing out our inconsistencies when we are trying to be consistent in living out the gospel. The scriptures today give us courage. In the words of Paul in the second reading today: "Therefore, I am content

with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

Prayer

We pray: Lord, help us to be prophets of our day. Empower us to read the signs of modern day and discern where we are to give witness to You. We ask that Your wisdom will lead and guide us in all things. May Your ways be our ways and Your thoughts our thoughts.Amen.




