

Saying the Rosary Without Making a Sound

Using twine in the colors of green and blue, Emily Sage D. Anton, age 16, has made over 50 Stealth Rosaries, a type of rosary battle soldiers can use because they can say the rosary without making a lot of sound. She got the idea from her teacher, Sister Brittany at St. John Neumann High School.

"I'm making the rosaries because I want to help raise money to help the choir go to Italy," Emily said. "Sister Brittany taught me how to make them. They are called Stealth Rosaries because they do not make any noise. I chose green and blue because I like the colors and there are many different colors. The colors are mardi gras and field of violets."

This is Emily's first time making these rosaries. She began making the rosaries about six months ago. It takes her 60 to 90 minutes to make a rosary.

"I'm using twine because in the battle soldiers can't have metal rosaries because they make a lot of sound. That's why twine is the best idea to have for stealth from

the enemy. I will be making more as soon as I get more twine."

Emily gets her materials from a website called Twine by Design. Her mother helps pay for the materials.



"I am very proud of Emily. She has been working on the rosaries all summer. She wants to help the choir and make rosaries. She is excited to get to go to Italy," said her mother, Molly Anton.

These rosaries may be used by anyone who wants to say a rosary in a very quiet environment. They are easy to carry around or put in a pocket.

This rosary is an example of a sacramental, which is a blessed material object that prepares us "to receive grace and dispose us to cooperate with it" (CCC, 1673).

From start to finish it takes Emily 60 to 90 minutes to make a rosary. To date, she has made over 50 of the Stealth Rosaries.

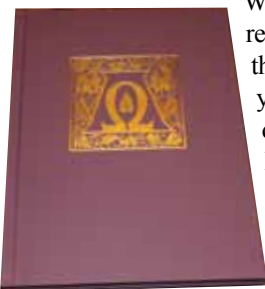
Mass Times Revert to Winter Schedule Beginning Sunday, November 4

Crossroads and The Pro-Life Thing

This past Sunday, our High School youth group was blessed by Jessica Berman, who gave a powerful testimony of her experience walking across the U.S. to stand up for the dignity of human life with pro-life organization *Crossroads*. Jessica is a parishioner, young adult leader for our high school youth group and current FGCU student.

Our teens were inspired by Jessica's commitment to the pro-life cause, which led her to sign up to walk with *Crossroads* for not just one, but

two summers. She shared her experience of walking across America, praying at abortion clinics, giving talks at parishes and the general shenanigans and hijinks she and her fellow walkers engaged in.

Crossroads is one of the many dynamic pro-life groups inspired by Bl. John Paul II. Jessica describes them this way:

"*Crossroads* is one of the most pro-active movements a young adult can be involved in. Who can say they've walked across America for the unborn? It sounds insane, but the idea came from a college student

named Steve Sanborn and some of his friends. In 1993, they attended World Youth Day in Denver not knowing their hearts would be so inspired by John Paul II's homily to the huge crowd gathered. The Holy Father told everyone: 'be not afraid to take the Gospel to the streets like the first Apostles did.' In 1995, Steve and his friends acted upon those words literally and set out from California to D.C. with an RV, walking shoes and pro-life shirts."

Crossroads is essentially a coast-to-coast walk across America to witness to the dignity and sanctity of every human life, especially the unborn. They are a peaceful organization on a mission to promote a Culture of Life through prayer and sacrifice and to change the hearts and minds of the people. Today *Crossroads* has expanded their walks to four in the U.S. and one in Ireland, Spain and Canada. The Pro-Life Thing (Continued)

In last week's bulletin, we discussed the foundational principle of the pro-life movement: *The dignity of all human life and the inalienable*

rights that flow from this dignity, first among which is the right to life.

This week we ask the question: *Why does human life have such great dignity and where does this dignity come from?*

The answer is two-fold: our *origin* and our *destiny*. As human persons, we are all created in the image of God and destined for eternal communion with God (Gen 1:26-27; Eph 1:4-5). In fact, the only reason for the creation of any human person is God's love and his desire for all human persons to experience his love for eternity:

"God our Savior . . . desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tm 2:4). "He chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. He destined us in love to be his sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will" (Eph 1:4-5).

In this Year of Faith, we will hear much about the New Evangelization. There is perhaps no greater aspect of the New Evangelization than this: proclaiming the origin, destiny and dignity of every human person.

The following quotes are excellent meditation points in this regard:

C.S. Lewis: "Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbor is the holiest object presented to your senses."

Fr. Robert Barron: "The Incarnation tells us the most important truth about ourselves: we are destined for divinization. The church fathers never tired of repeating this phrase as a sort of summary of Christian belief: God became human so that humans might become God. God condescended to enter into flesh so that our flesh might partake of the divine life, that we might participate in the love that holds the Father, Son and Holy Spirit in communion. And this is why Christianity is the greatest humanism that has ever appeared, indeed that *could* ever appear. No philosophical or political or religious program in history — neither Greek nor Marxist humanism — has ever made a claim about human destiny as extravagant as Christianity's. We are called not simply to moral perfection or artistic self-expression or economic liberation but to what the Eastern fathers called *theiosis*, transformation into God."

In the very near future (hopefully within the next few weeks) you will see a new addition to the Narthex in the church. For those of you unfamiliar with this term, the Narthex is the space immediately inside the main entrance of the church separating the entrance from the sanctuary. Our Narthex, although small, is intended to be a gathering space for parishioners to greet each other and converse before entering

the sanctuary and following Mass. Our Narthex has also been used to display any number of information boards, bulletins, Catholic literature, etc. The Stewardship Council is installing two flat screen monitors which will be mounted on either side of the Narthex. The monitors will reduce the need for easels and clutter making the Narthex a more open, welcoming space. What will be displayed on the monitors? We plan on highlighting particular ministries, announcing upcoming events and communicating anything we feel pertinent to the parish. The Stewardship Council feels that this will be a very effective communications tool.

“Keep Christ in Christmas” is an evangelization program of the Knights of Columbus designed to emphasize the real meaning of Christmas. During these times, when everything “Christian” is being attacked in our secular society, we have an obligation to encourage the message that the real purpose of December 25 is to celebrate the birth of our Savior. The Knights are again selling their high quality, modestly priced Christmas cards. These cards are being sold after each Mass in front of the Church. All profits will go to the Jamaica Outreach Program and the Youth of the parish. The Knights deserve your support.

The first “Families in Christ” session is quickly approaching and will take place next Sunday morning, October 28. Bill Maguire (Director of Youth Ministry) is hosting the events this year and we look forward to a very lively gathering. For those of you who read Bill’s weekly column, you will agree that he is very well versed in his theology and relates incredibly well with the youth of our parish. It is no secret that many of our seasonal residents have returned early this year. Attendance at Mass this past weekend was much greater than I have seen in quite some time. I mentioned last week that we met our weekly budget for the first time since May of this year. We now are on our second straight week of meeting budget. Not only did

we meet our budget but we recognized an increase of 37.75% over the same weekend last year. Thank you to all of our parishioners for your incredible generosity.

Since taking over the management of our Memorial Garden back in March 2009, I have sold over 300 spaces to parishioners and their immediate families. As I have said before, I initially found the new addition to my job description quite morbid. Since that time, I have come to actually enjoy the interaction that comes along with the job. I have never claimed to be good at sales, however, the Memorial Garden sells itself and at \$1,200.00 per space, it really is an easy sell. Many of the couples I meet with really like the idea of being able to come to Mass every week and visit their loved ones before or after Mass. You may also take solace in the fact that your loved one is being buried in consecrated ground. Yes, it costs only \$1,200.00 to purchase a space in our Memorial Garden. This is an all inclusive price meaning it includes the opening, closing, urn and engraved granite headstone. I can assure you that this is an incredibly competitive price. You will pay at least three times this amount at any other cemetery. With the addition of new landscaping, a beautiful fountain and new granite benches, the memorial garden is in tip top shape. As a reminder, space is very limited and sale of space in the garden may be terminated without notice. If you are interested in purchasing space in our Memorial Garden, please contact me at 566.1678.

As of this past Wednesday, I still did not have firm pricing for the “Lest we Forget” Veterans Memorial to be constructed across from the front of the church. I promise to have this information available in next week’s bulletin. I have received numerous calls to reserve benches, flagpoles and pavers. I apologize for the delay.

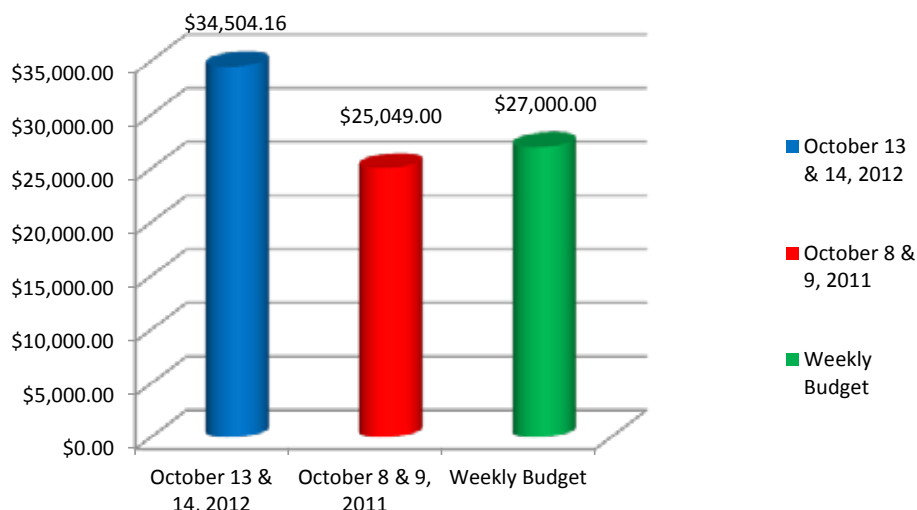

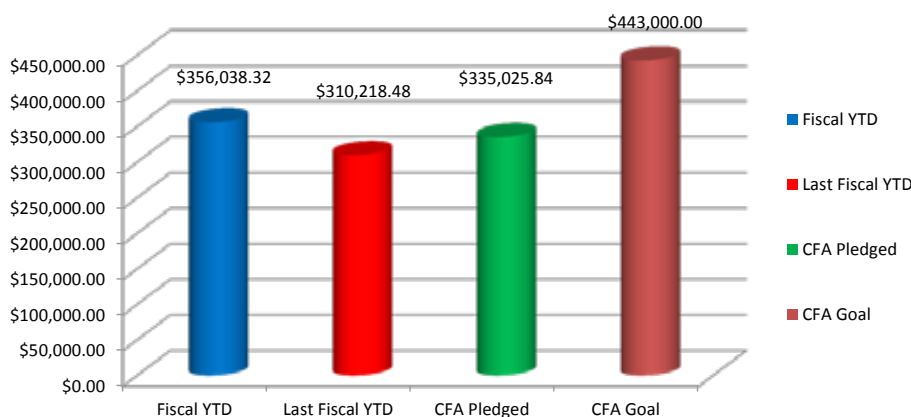



The Word & Life

Refusing Power

In today's gospel we see an all too familiar scene of a hunger for power, position, and ambition. James and John are traditionally known as the "Sons of Thunder." These men act without thinking. Jesus had shown himself to be the master of humility, the Incarnation of service, the violence of love, and the empowered one who did not seek power. These disciples had put their ambition ahead of their commitment to Jesus and his message of service. James and John wanted recognition for the sacrifice they had made to follow Jesus. The two disciples had lost focus – their attention turned from the challenge to make known the way of the Lord to reward and prestige. James and John thought they were ready to drink from the cup that Jesus was to drink and be baptized by the baptism by which Jesus would be baptized. True to form, James and John jump ahead of themselves and commit to something which they did not truly understand. Jesus grounds these men's thoughts by redirecting their energies away from the hunger of power and prestige, to thoughts of servitude and the reality of suffering for the sake of the kingdom.

If we say that we truly believe the gospel that we hear proclaimed, then we must embrace the servitude that Jesus is calling his disciples to in today's gospel. Whenever we engage in Christian acts, we should do so out of love rather than the desire to be recognized by others in doing so. Our Christian acts are rooted in God's will for us and our ability to love as He has loved us. Our motivation in doing good should ultimately be for those who are in need, i.e. to feel God's presence through us. To do the truth in love is to do

the right thing for the right reason. Simple acts of charity that are given freely and without any conditions allow God's generosity to flow through us. The recipient of such kindness is aware of this loving service. It is in such giving that we truly receive God's grace.

The gospel today tells us of how Jesus warned his disciples about not getting wrapped up in worldly power. In the language of today, Jesus would be telling his listeners that power truly corrupts. The authority bestowed upon the Church is an authority that calls us to serve. Jesus himself became a suffering servant who humbly washed the feet of a sinful and broken people. He gave his life as a ransom for many. Jesus asks us to share in this same selfless giving. As his disciples, we are asked to go out and make a difference in the world. Awakening each day is a gift for everyone living in the world. The only power that God desires for us is the power to love and the power to serve. The authority that he continues to hand onto the Church is an authority to bring others to the Truth. Such authority is clearly seen in the way that we reach out to others in love and confront those situations in life that are devoid of love and dignity. Maybe we will never eliminate the third world debt, or put an end to war and violence. All we can do is to act justly, to love tenderly, and to walk humbly with the God who is present in all peoples (Micah 6:8). In living in this manner the gift returned to us is not in being honored for these acts, but recognizing the blessings of such service.

The crucifix reminds us of the price of salvation and of God's infinite love: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son" (John 3:16). His Son is on the Cross.

In church, the crucifix indicates that "the sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are one single sacrifice" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1545*). In the Mass, Jesus, through the priest, offers himself to the Father on our behalf, under the appearances of bread and wine.
