Did You Know? Cassocks traditionally have 33 buttons up the front to symbolize the years of Jesus' life.


# Ministry Spotlight

#### Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

## Diocese Will Tape Two Masses for the Homebound at St. John on October 3

Taping of two different Masses for the homebound is scheduled for Thursday, October 3 starting at 1:00 p.m. here at St. John the Evangelist.

The first liturgy that will be taped at that time is for the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time which is also Mission Sunday. The celebrant will be Fr. John. The taped liturgy will air on Sunday, October 20.

The second liturgy that will be taped is for the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time. The celebrant for that liturgy will be Fr. Jim. The taped liturgy will air Sunday, November 17.

All parishioners are invited to participate in the tapings as a congregation. Arrive around 12:45 p.m. Snacks and drinks will be served after the second taping. The tapings will take about 90 minutes including a short break between the two Masses.

The Sunday Mass on Television is an outreach of the Diocese of Venice Department of Communications and is supported by the donations of viewers. According to the Department of Communications, "This outreach serves those who, for reasons outside of their control, are unable to attend Sunday Mass in one of the parishes of the Diocese. For many homebound individuals, this outreach reminds them that they are loved by their brothers and sisters in Christ throughout the Diocese of Venice, and that they remain a vibrant and loved part of our faith community."

As I mentioned last week's column, I recently attended the International Catholic Stewardship Conference in Dallas, Texas. One of the highlights of the Stewardship Conference is the presentation of the Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy Award. This award is presented to a parish for its outstanding work in Christian stewardship formation in

honor of the late Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy. Archbishop Murphy was an ardent supporter of ICSC and a passionate promoter of Christian stewardship. He died in 1997, and this award is a fitting tribute to his memory.

The award this year was presented to Saint Paul Catholic Church in Valparaiso, Indiana. Saint Paul Catholic Church began as a community of German, French and Irish settlers, served by Holy Cross Fathers who traveled dirt roads to bring the sacraments from the small college that is now the University of Notre Dame. Mass was initially held in a grove of oak trees, eventually moving to a courthouse basement and then a blacksmith shop.

The church was established in 1858, then in the Diocese of Fort Wayne, Indiana. By the 1870s, a pastoral residence, a school, Saint Paul Academy, and a cemetery were established. The present church, the community's third structure, was dedicated in 1967 with 2,000 members. The parish is now part of the Diocese of Gary, Indiana

A Newman Center was established at Valparaiso University in 1973 and the parish opened Saint Timothy Center in 1994,

providing a preschool program, a day care and a kindergarten. A church renovation was completed in 1994, and in 1997 Saint Agnes Center was established. It provides respite to caregivers of the elderly.

With Father Joseph M. Pawlowski's arrival in 1998, a deeper stewardship commitment began. The parish welcomed a pastoral associate for stewardship and a stewardship committee. The first ministry fair was hosted in 2002. The parish expanded a free clothing center for the needy and in 2006 completed the new Saint Paul Education Center and school with parishioners' gifts of \$11,000,000.00.

The community received a bequest in 2008 for over \$212,000 from a parishioner's estate to be used to assist seniors through the Marjorie Clifford Senior Circle. Saint Agnes Center received an endowment of over

\$722,000 to provide tuition help for seniors unable to pay for their day care.

Other areas of ministry outreach include a food pantry which delivers 10 tons of grocery items yearly and a family mission trip to Kentucky, now in its third year. Celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2008, the parish community of some 2,670 now has over 700 parishioners involved in more than 60 parish ministries.

It just so happens that one of our very own staff members used to be an employee at Saint Paul Catholic Church and actually grew up in the parish. Tom Oram, our Director of music and liturgy, served under Fr. Pawlowski for several years as the assistant director of music before entering the seminary. Considering that many of our seasonal parishioners are from this area, I would imagine that more than a few of you are familiar with Fr. Pawlowski and Saint Paul Parish.

I think about the 150 year history of Saint Paul Parish and immediately think about our 25 year history. Although we are a very young parish, we have grown exponentially and accomplished many accolades in our brief history. With our countless ministries, outreach programs and developing stewardship program, I can see St. John the Evangelist Parish receiving the Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy award at some point in the near future.



The seasonal Flu shot is \$25, the preservative free Flu shot is \$30, High-Dose Flu shot is \$50 and the Pneumonia shot is \$65.

All vaccinations are covered by Medicare Part B and Railroad Medicare.

In addition to the Flu Shots and Pneumonia, the Visiting Nurses will also be offering Tetanus Booster and Pertussis.

# Recognizing Grace and Mercy

eople often remark that it would be much easier to believe in the unfolding events in scriptures had they lived during the time of Jesus and the Prophets. We hear several remarks in today's readings to suggest that is not the case. The prophet Amos, from whom we hear in today's first reading, warned the people not to become complacent in regards to their duties as a People of God. In Jesus' parable, he reminds his listeners that people failed to listen to the prophets. Furthermore, Jesus tells his audience that people would not be persuaded of the importance of God's message even if it were communicated through having someone rise from the dead. Obviously, Jesus was prophesying about people's reluctance to accept his message after his own resurrection (even though his listeners would not have understood this at the time). The parable tells us about a rich man who thought only of himself and vein pleasure, unconcerned about the sufferings and hunger of Lazarus. When the rich man and Lazarus find themselves on the other side of life, God comforts Lazarus because He never wished for Lazarus to suffer. The rich man was given the reward of suffering because he did nothing to alleviate the sufferings of his day – even though he had the capacity to do so.

We are indeed blessed because we look through this lens of resurrection. Each Sunday, as Catholic Christians, we come to worship on the day of resurrection. Jesus' resurrection opened wide the doors

of eternity for all of us. However, even after hearing the message, people are still reluctant to accept and be accountable to the gospel. When we look around us, what do we see? Do we see the reality of the kingdom fully realized? Are we living in complete harmony and peace? Are the rights and dignities of all people recognized and respected? If we all look around us, I honestly do not think we could say yes. There are so many areas where we need to grow and be challenged in. In so many areas of the globe, governments and systems of power have become complacent in their concern for the powerless. People go hungry – forgotten and unnoticed. People's basic rights are ignored or even taken away. The needs of the Body of Christ are unattended to. Christ suffers when others suffer.


In the parable of the poor man Lazarus, we are reminded that our lives and actions pave the way to our destiny. Our concern and acts of charity are what truly makes us rich and acceptable in the eyes of God. Right now in our community we see many families struggling to make ends meet. Likewise, we see many of our seniors living completely alone in our neighborhoods and nursing homes. This is the holy ground of the scriptures. It is in such people as these that the face of Christ can be seen. In attending to the needs of those who live in our community – we attend to Christ himself who has many guises. The encounters we have with those who suffer are moments of grace in which God's mercy may flow through us.

## **Reflection Questions**

- 1. Who are the people who suffer around you?
- 2. How are you going to attend to the needs that surround you?
- 3. Do you allow yourself to become complacent when faced with the challenge of other people's needs?
- 4. Does your life reflect the way Jesus commanded his disciples to live? Why or why not?
- 5. How will you allow God to use you?

## Prayer

Lord, help us to see the wonderful possibilities of reaching out to others in love. May the complacency of our lives diminish and our love for you increase as we contemplate the mystery of your presence in others. In reaching out to others may we recognize that it is You that is present through us, leading us on to eternal life. Amen

#### REFLECTION

In Sunday's Gospel Jesus tells us a story that is easy to understand. A rich man eats meals that are feasts with lots of leftovers. A beggar sits at the gate of the rich man's house. But the rich man never notices the beggar. The beggar is hungry. His body has sores all over. His only friend is a dog that licks his sores. It is as if there is a hole so big between the rich man and the poor man that the rich man can't see the poor man. The rich man never notices the beggar, never does the simple act of sharing his food, never catches on he could help.

At every Eucharist we eat at Jesus' table. Jesus shares his love with us. Jesus challenges us to share our riches and ourselves the same way he does. The Gospel story asks us to notice people in need who are near us - like the beggar at the rich man's gate.




