Apart from achieving academic success, I developed a strong sense of spirituality while attending these schools. I really began to love

the Lord and committed my life to Him through baptism and equally important, I developed an attachment to the Catholic Church.

I am currently pursuing a Master's degree in Government at the University of the West Indies in Kingston, where I am also

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

A New Day Dawning

ne of the most beautiful things to see in nature is the dawning of a new day. You wait in darkness and everything is devoid of shape and form. Then the light appears — painting the landscape before you, illuminating it with the great possibilities that God puts in place. The dawn of a new day lights the way, revealing to us the great possibilities which may present themselves.

Reflection Questions

- 1. What does it mean to walk in darkness?
- 2. What did the early disciples sacrifice in order to follow Jesus?
- 3. What does the light of Christ represent?
- 4. Where does darkness exist today?
- 5. Where can we find light to dispel the darkness of sin and fear?
- 6. How is Jesus calling you to follow him?
- 7. How can the Church be effective in lighting the way for others?
- 8. Are you willing to join in the Church's mission to light the way?

In the first reading, we hear wisdom from the prophet Isaiah. We are told about how the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. Why? It is because the story of God's love is *continually* dawning upon the world. The presence of Jesus is the ultimate light that the world will ever see. Isaiah prophesies about the time when burdens will be lifted off people's shoulders and the world will be ecstatic with joy. As we journey now through the gospel of Matthew, we see how Jesus' wisdom illuminates our way to the Father in heaven. Jesus invites the people in the gospel to repent for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. Such a call had a sense of immediacy about it. As soon as Jesus sees the fishermen at work, he calls them to follow him *immediately*. The men respond to that call. Why did these men go so willingly with Jesus journeying into the unknown? Only interpretation will half answer that question. However, human experience probably tells us that these men were looking for something more and saw something in Jesus that day as he called them to a life and future, full of possibilities and hope. Immediately they witnessed the proclamation of the kingdom and the realities of the healing power of Jesus' love in the way he cured disease and illness among the people.

We are called to follow this same Jesus as we listen to the gospel proclaimed today. There are so many ways in which we are asked to bring light to the dark realities of the world. As we reflect upon the terrible atrocities that continue in Kenya, we have no trouble in recognizing the powers of darkness. Children are left orphaned because their parents have been shot or killed with machetes. Thousands of people

are now homeless because rebels abuse their physical power by creating havoc in what were once peaceful villages and towns. Lowly and humble lives that for many years have been left unrecognized are now only given a face by the sensationalism of media frenzies. The Middle-eastern conflict continues to witness violence betting violence. Hearts are being torn through the senseless murders and violence that occur. It seems that darkness has overcome

the light in areas where the prophets and Christ once walked.

Closer to home we can think of some of the trouble neighbourhoods of our large towns and cities where gang warfare is common place and where the world of vice becomes the way to fill that insatiable appetite that yearns for something more. The psychological world continues to try to heal damaged and fragile individuals who honestly cannot recognize the gift that is set before them. Even in the midst of this tremendous darkness, every day the dawn comes to visit us from on high to remind us to be light for the world. The people that we choose to elect have the power granted to them to help change national and international conflicts. Those who represent our nation should be beacons of hope for a world yearning for the same kind of freedoms afforded to us. Each one of us can offer the light of Christ which is truth of equality, mercy, and justice. We give witness to the light through the choices we make and the lives we lead. We have a choice to follow after Christ so that others may recognize his footprints through the steps that each of us take.



Prayer

Lord, light the path before us. Illuminate the darkness of our world with the dawning of your love. May we learn to always follow you in all ways and above all things. As we journey on to the kingdom, may we become the children of light. Amen!

Wisdom of the Fathers

In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the People of God have become missionary disciples (cf. Mt 28:19). All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization, and it would be insufficient to envisage a plan of evangelization to be carried out by professionals while the rest of the faithful would simply be passive recipients. The new evangelization calls for personal involvement on the part of each of the baptized. Every Christian is challenged, here and now, to be actively engaged in evangelization; indeed, anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love. Every Christian is a missionary to the extent that he or she has encountered the love of God in Christ Jesus: we no longer say that we are "disciples" and "missionaries", but rather that we are always "missionary disciples". If we are not convinced, let us look at those first disciples, who, immediately after encountering the gaze of Jesus, went forth to proclaim him joyfully...

...Of course, all of us are called to mature in our work as evangelizers. We want to have better training, a deepening love and a clearer witness to the Gospel. In this sense, we ought to let others be constantly evangelizing us. But this does not mean that we should postpone the evangelizing mission; rather, each of us should find ways to communicate Jesus wherever we are. All of us are called to offer others an explicit witness to the saving love of the Lord, who despite our imperfections offers us his closeness, his word and his strength, and gives meaning to our lives. In your heart you know that it is not the same to live without him; what you have come to realize, what has helped you to live and given you hope, is what you also need to communicate to others. Our falling short of perfection should be no excuse; on the contrary, mission is a constant stimulus not to remain mired in mediocrity



but to continue growing. The witness of faith that each Christian is called to offer leads us to say with Saint Paul: "Not that I have already obtained this, or am already perfect; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own" (*Phil* 3:12-13)."

REFLECTION

The Bible readings today have geography lessons in them. Galilee is the part of Israel where Jesus grew up and began his ministry. The region had different names, depending on who lived there. This is like calling the brick house on the corner the Adams' house while the Adams live there and then the Barnett house when the Barnetts move in.

In very ancient times people called the land of Galilee by the names of the tribes that lived there. Galilee was the land of the tribes of Zebulon and Naphtali. The Assyrians invaded and conquered Galilee and divided the region into three with new names: Way of the Sea, Beyond the Jordan, and Galilee of the Nations.

In Jesus, God becomes human and lives in one time and place. Galilee is a rural region where people farm and fish for a living. The lake provides Jesus easy transportation. Jesus uses the lilies of the Galilee hills as an example of God's care. Jesus teaches in the synagogues of Galilee and lives in a small house in the village of Capernaum.

Galilee has one other important feature: highways. The most important trade routes to other nations crisscrossed Galilee. Jesus began and ended his ministry in Galilee, crossroads to the world.

Matthew: 4:12-23 Follow the Leader
