Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Fr. Jim Finds New Home With Saint John the Evangelist Parish

Editor's Note: This is a re-print of the article that ran in the June 16 parish bulletin following Fr. Jim's appointment to St. John. We thought our seasonal parishioners would enjoy reading a little bit about his background.

It did not take long for Fr. Jim Simko to get into the spirit of Saint John the Evangelist as he mesmerized the Vacation Bible School children when he gave them a short lesson this past summer, Tuesday, June 11. Fr. Jim, age 59, comes to us directly from St. Francis Xavier parish in Fort Myers, where he served the parish from 2009.

Born in Springfield, IL, Fr. Jim is one of four siblings. He has a brother who resides in Atlanta, a sister in Mobile, AL and another sister in Brisbane, Australia.

Fr. Jim and his family moved to Bradenton, FL in 1971, when he was just 16 years old. "I was a parishioner at St. Joseph's in Bradenton where Fr. Rourke served as pastor in 1974." The two reminisced over a Staff Welcome Lunch Tuesday, June 11, here at St. John.

After graduating from Metropolitan State College in Denver in 1976 with a degree in Business Management, Fr. Jim worked in various retail and restaurant venues until 1985 when he entered the seminary. He was ordained a priest in 1991 for the Archdiocese of Denver. He served in parishes in the Denver area and was the pastor at Our Lady of the Mountains in Estes Park, CO from 1996 to 2002. A year later Fr. Jim returned to Southwest Florida.

Fr. Jim says he enjoys traveling and "everything Florida has to offer as well as my Terrier-Schnauzer."

I would like to make a very exciting announcement about an upcoming addition to our campus and more importantly, to our Veterans' Memorial. In the grassy area (picture) immediately adjacent (east) to the existing Veterans'

Memorial, we will be creating a rose garden. The centerpiece of the rose garden will be a magnificent granite pedestal

featuring all branches of the armed services. Many of you remember our prior discussion about engraving the emblems on the benches currently in place. After further discussion, it was determined that this location would not be an appropriate place to recognize the branches of our armed services. The pedestal will be in the shape

If the old markers are not picked up within 60 days, the granite will be thrown away and

the bronze marker will be sold for scrap. Thanks for your understanding.


The Gift of Blessing

s we gather to listen to God's Word today, our attention is drawn to Christ's teaching on the Sermon on the Mount. The Beatitudes offer us a sacred teaching moment where God tells us that he is capable of turning weak experiences into moments of blessing. The non-Christian would probably view the Beatitudes as a strange concept. How can we be blessed when we struggle or experience suffering and injustice? For people who look upon the gospel with faith, the beatitudes urge us to put on the mind and heart of Christ in our everyday experiences. The day that Jesus gave us these teachings on the Sermon on the Mount,

was a day in which he showed us that all of life can be lived as a blessing regardless of how positive or negative it may be. What makes this possible? All of this is made possible if we live in the hope of resurrection. Jesus shows us that we can overcome suffering and death by his rising from the dead. God's initiative is to be with the poor, the vulnerable, and the weak and to redeem their lives.

Throughout Jesus' ministry we are shown glimpses into the very desire of God. Jesus redeems what is broken, sinful and disturbed. He does what is right, but he is criticized for it. Jesus instills within his listeners the importance of hungering and thirsting for God through acts of compassion, justice, peace, and mercy. However, the "religious" people are disturbed with the whole notion of God reaching into the depths of humanity, living in close relationship with those who are broken, meek, poor, and persecuted. For those who strictly observed the law in order to be close to God, such a concept of finding God in the midst of weakness was too radical. Jesus is led to his death because the religious leaders of his time could not comprehend the blessings of God in all people and in all things.

Today, we are invited to see our lives as a blessing. For those of us who live in hope of the resurrection, we are called to a deeper reality. When we are faced with poverty of spirit the blessing comes when we realize that God has put others our way to lift our spirits and when we recognize Christ as our reason to have hope. The Church constantly encourages us through Word and Sacrament to be still and know the Lord is in our midst. Blessing also occurs when we let go of those we love in death, knowing that we will see them again when we journey through death ourselves. The way in which we honor God in the small things will ultimately lead us to the greater inheritance of the kingdom. Our gentle approach with one another through our mercy and our work for peace will gift us with His mercy and peace. All we have to do is simply love as Jesus loves. Living with such an attitude will bring us and others grace and our lives will become God's blessing.



Those of us privileged to raise children have a special kind of magical thinking. We delight over that infant bundle as the child struggles to learn to do all those things we do without thinking. We must teach her to eat, serving spoonsful of mush through a toothless grin. We must teach him to walk, shuffling along with uncertain steps. We must train her to use the toilet, gushing with praise at each improvement. Despite the evidence we see, we are certain that this child will do great things one day.

At the same time, many of us wrestle with a dark view of our own capacity. As adults, presumably responsible for our own progress, we convince ourselvers again and again that we can't possibly make the grade.

Today's Gospel tells us that we're much closer to that child with infinite capacity than to the adult washout we imagine ourselves to be. No matter what his neighbors thought, Jesus was no mere carpenter's son from Nazareth. He followed his calling to a destiny beyond dreaming and he asks us to do the same. It takes only one shaky step at a time to follow Christ to a glorious future.
