WHY: Why 40 days? God used the number "40" to represent a period of testing or judgment...as a necessary length of time to accomplish a part of

God's plan. Examples:

- Lent is 40 days
- During the Great Flood, the rains fell for 40 days and nights
- Israel wandered in the desert and ate manna for 40 years
- Moses was with God on Mt. Sinai for 40 days
- Jesus fasted and was tempted in the desert for 40 days
- Jesus remained on earth for 40 days after His Resurrection
- Women are pregnant for 40 weeks

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Are you finding this season more congested than any in recent memory? As a meteorologist, I will once again blame the weather for our massive influx of seasonal visitors this year. the common good for all. The book is an exposition of human nature which evokes the ultimate question, "What is common good?" Laws are created most often than not for the common good. To abide by the law of the land is to create an environment that is stable and ordered. Laws are created, by enlarge, to protect individuals and keep them safe. Sometimes legislation can be lawful, but unjust. Take for example the law created from the Woe vs. Wade case. The Supreme Court created a law to enable women to choose abortion – something that is lawful, but immoral.

The Law of God presented in the Decalogue (10 Commandments) points to the very essence that establishes a common good in which rights of individuals are protected and where dignity is cherished. Such is God's desire for humanity – that all will be loved, honored, and protected. The wisdom of Jesus embodies God's law and fulfills it. Christ makes it abundantly clear that he did not come to abolish the law rather to fulfill it! His strong words in today's gospel tells the listeners of yesterday and today that there is an expectation from the Lord and an obligation on our part to hold sacred that law which has been gifted to us, the Church. Jesus also tells us that if we knowingly and willingly lead others from God's law, there will be divine consequences.

The wisdom of today's gospel tells us to be clear in our resolve to follow the Lord. If problems arise between us, the Christian is called

to reconcile with their brother or sister with whom they have a difficulty. The powerful words of Jesus remind each one of us that the true gift offered at the altar is one offered by the hands of those who live the reality of God's love and forgiveness. Many of us often come to Mass burdened with resentments or memories of fractured relationships. Our lives can often be bruised by painful rejection or hurtful actions of others. The Christian way is challenging and calls us to transform what is broken rather than just constantly transmitting it.



God's laws point beyond themselves and draw our attention to the importance of right-relationship. When observing the 10 Commandments, we are called to live in right- relationship with God, others, and to truly understand ourself – one made in the image and likeness of God. We are called to love one another unconditionally. Every decision that we make individually must always consider the common good. The law of God has tremendous implications on the social, political, and spiritual world. We could take the 10 Commandments one by one and analyze the profound challenge they pose in our world today. From faith perspectives and honoring God, to the realities of corporate and structural sin, and to the various media coverage on personal lives... these commandments, these laws, call all of us with no exceptions to love and honor all with dignity and respect. They point beyond themselves and reveal the heart of God!



Wisdom of the Fathers

"The Ten Commandments are a gift of God. The word "commandment" is not fashionable; it reminds the man of today of something negative, the will of someone who imposes limits, who puts obstacles to life. And unfortunately history, including recent <history>, is marked by tyrannies, ideologies, logics that have imposed and oppressed, which have not sought man's good, but rather power, success, profit. But the Ten Commandments come from a God who has created us for love, from a God who has forged a close alliance with humanity, a God who only wills the good for man...

...The Ten Commandments indicate a path of liberty, which finds its fullness in the law of the Spirit written not on stone tablets, but in the heart (cf. 2 *Corinthians* 3:3). ... We must not see the Ten Commandments as limitations to liberty. No, they are not this, but we must see them as indications for liberty. They are not limitations but indications for liberty! They teach us to avoid the slavery to which the many idols reduce us that we build ourselves – we have experienced this so many times in history and we are experiencing it also today. They teach us to open ourselves to a dimension that is larger than the material, to live respect for persons, overcoming the avidity for power, for possession, for money and to be honest and sincere in our relations, to protect the whole of creation and to nourish in our planet lofty, noble and spiritual ideals...his is the most profound meaning of the




Ten Commandments: the commandment of Jesus that bears within it all the commandments, the Commandment of Love. That is why I say that the Ten Commandments are Commandments of Love. Here is the heart of the Ten Commandments: the Love that comes from God and that gives meaning to life, love that makes us live not as slaves but as true sons, love that animates all our relations: with God, with ourselves – we often forget this – and with others. True liberty is not to follow our egoism, our blind passions, but to love, to choose what is good in every situation. The Ten Commandments are not a hymn to "no," but to "yes." A "yes" to God, a "yes" to Love, and because I say "yes" to Love, I say "no" to non-Love, but the "no" is a consequence of that "yes" that comes from God and makes us love."

REFLECTION

"Do you promise to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God?" We've all seen court scenes where a bailiff asks a witness to place one hand on the Bible and the other hand in the air and take an oath of honesty. In some ways it's a lot like Jesus' instructions for us in this week's Gospel.

Imagine that you and your friends are goofing around. You dare your friend to swipe a basketball out of your neighbor's yard. Your friend takes your dare, steals the item, and you both play with it at your friend's house. You hide it in your friend's garage.

The next day, your parents get a call from the neighbor saying their basketball is missing, and they saw you leaving their yard with a friend. They think you took it. When your parents ask you if you stole it, you say no you didn't. Technically, that is the truth. You didn't steal it; your friend did. In your head, you know that you are answering the question completely. However, in your heart you know that you are part of the theft, and by not saying any more, you are also part of a lie.

That is what Jesus is talking about in this week's Gospel. The Ten Commandments instruct us not to kill. Jesus says that is not the complete message. Not only don't kill, but don't be violent. Not only don't be violent, but don't even think violent thoughts against one another.

The same is true of other commandments. It is not enough to follow through by not stealing. We are not to be jealous of what others have. We are not to think about taking something that is not ours.

We are to live honestly with both our heads and our hearts. Jesus asks us to live "the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth."

Helping children to learn how to behave is a slow process. Once they understand language, we tell them no without bothering with an explanation.

When they are a little more advanced and ask why, we might rely on the trusted "Because I said so."

Later we explain that they should treat others as they would want to be treated.

If these efforts meet with success, we might finally tell them to behave with compassion for others because they love them—or should.

Today's Gospel traces a similar progression in moral thought. The Law of the Old Testament may have seemed a list of prohibitions—things to avoid in order to escape divine punishment.

The law Jesus offers is that we stop trying to avoid evil and instead seek out opportunities to do good. Our faith and actions shine brightest when we act out of love rather than fear.




