

Second Collection Next Sunday to Build Facilities Maintenance Reserve

Dear Friends of Saint John the Evangelist,

Over the past few years, St. John the Evangelist Parish has undergone dramatic improvements to its complex. Managing an operation as large as St. John is no easy task. It involves the collaboration of both staff and volunteers. Our facilities and grounds are in use at all times during the day and every day of the week. The constant upkeep of our facilities is very time consuming and somewhat costly. The creation of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the expansion of the Finance Council have proved very beneficial in our short-term efforts and long-term planning. The expertise these women and men bring to the table allow us to prioritize projects that require attention.

Both groups have petitioned for a Facilities Maintenance Reserve. On March 23, 2014 (next weekend), we will take up a second collection to build this fund. Such a fund has a threefold purpose:

- ✓ To provide funds for unanticipated emergency repairs.
- ✓ To plan capital improvements.
- ✓ To aid ongoing parish improvements and maintenance projects.

During any fiscal year, up to 50% of the funds raised would be available, subject to Finance Council approval, for repairs and ongoing parish improvements. The remaining balance will be restricted to a Reserve Fund, to be used only for future emergencies and capital improvements. It is my goal, over time, to build a significant reserve through this annual collection. As pastor of my previous parish, St. Charles Borromeo in Port Charlotte, I experienced first hand the devastation of Hurricane Charley. The insurance payouts were not enough to rebuild our facilities to current building codes. As you could imagine, asking parishioners to contribute in the midst of their personal losses was a daunting task. We simply need to prepare ourselves for such an event at St. John.

Last week, a letter from the Buildings and Grounds Committee and Finance Council illustrated the many accomplishments they have achieved through their collaboration. Scott's Corner also made note of the important contributions that these parishioners have made in creating a more beautiful parish complex and improved financial management. In his comments this week, our General Manager reviews the many capital improvements that will be necessary in the next several years.

I look forward to your support to establish this Reserve, and wish to thank again, the Finance Council and Buildings and Grounds Committee for their hard work and dedication on your behalf.

Sacrament of Baptism

Fighting Hunger, Feeding Hope!

The Jamaica Outreach Program (JOP) is a local nonprofit organization that began in 1997 at St. John the Evangelist Church in Naples Florida. Its goal is to make a difference in the lives of the poor in its sister parish, St. Pius X, located in a desperately poor section of Kingston.

Annually the JOP replenishes a Food Pantry on the grounds of St. Pius X church. This year the Food Drive at St. John will be held March 22-23. The shipping container will hold up to 1000 cartons of food. The challenge is to fill it to its doors.

Where do your donations go?

The Food container travels from Naples to Coconut Creek, FL, where *Food for the Poor* puts it on an ocean-bound ship. From there the container is dropped on the docks in Kingston, and, after it passes "muster" with Jamaica Customs, is transported by truck to *Food for the Poor's* warehouse in Spanish Town, just outside Kingston. The contents are confirmed as to destination and, finally, the container with its contents is delivered to the St. Pius X Food Pantry. The parish staff and volunteers unload the container into the food pantry storage area; later they divide the food into family portions. Twice per month the St. Pius Food Pantry distributes food as available to up to 500 families. To those who donate, we extend heartfelt thanks for your willingness to help those among us who have the very least.

On the front page of this bulletin, Fr. John does an amazing job of succinctly explaining the need for a legitimate **Capital Reserve Fund** and the justification for a second collection next week in order to begin accumulating funds for this purpose.

What capital improvements are needed on campus? The list is long and will continue to grow as the buildings and infrastructure age over time. Large scale items on the short term radar are the replacement of the roof on the church, replacement of the flat roof (membrane) on the Parish Life Center, AC units in the PLC and new asphalt in the parking lot. The now 17 year old Parish Life Center is certainly beginning to show its age and in need of many smaller scale capital improvements. New ballroom carpeting, office carpeting, draperies in the ballroom and library, new tables and chairs, classroom bathroom renovations, just to name a few.

Historically we have handled capital improvements "on the fly" if you will, simply addressing and implementing when additional operating funds were available. This strategy is one we look to move away from as it is not fiscally responsible. We hope you will appreciate the fact that we are planning proactively moving forward. In order to accomplish our goals and keep our campus looking great into the future will require the help of our parishioners. Please prayerfully consider giving generously to the second collection next week so that we may begin the capital reserve fund with a "bang." You still have one more week to contemplate, discern and pray with regards to what you would like to contribute.

Did you attend the Second Annual Family Fun & Ministry Day last Sunday? If you didn't, I can honestly say that you missed an incredibly special event. Family Fun & Ministry Day was once again everything we thought it could be and more. I have to say that this event was a tremendous success and very well coordinated on all accounts. The Men's Club and their wives did an amazing job in serving food to over 950 guests with very little wait time. The food was very good and we did not run out. It is estimated that the Men's Club served 1,356 sandwiches — not to mention all of the accourrements. All of the ministry booths were located in the ballroom this year which was filled to capacity the majority of the day giving those ministries plenty of visibility. Outside of the ballroom, we had activities galore for the kids. There was a popcorn stand, a cotton candy stand, a snow cone stand, a craft stand and a cake walk tent all within twenty feet of the PLC. We had a beautiful tent setup in the field which provided additional seating for 300. The giveaways (bags and license plate frames) were located in the tent as well as a bar and a band performing everything from Bob Marley to Michael Jackson. There was a dunk tank, a rock climbing wall, a wrecking ball, a bungee run race, an obstacle course, two bounce houses and a wood

workshop. Suffice it to say, there was something for everyone. And now for the thank you's and there are a lot to go around.

First, I would like to thank you, our parishioners, for attending. Secondly, I would like to thank our ministries for your participation in this year's event. We had over 30 ministries around the perimeter of the ballroom, which was a substantial increase over last year. I would also like to thank the plethora of volunteers who came forward to help me man all of the special events and activities. These volunteers included members of the Knights of Columbus, Ladies of Charity, Finance Council and many more parishioners who just wanted to lend a hand.

Next, I would like to thank my maintenance staff for their tireless work in preparing the grounds and facilities for this event. They put in a ton of hours and, as a result, everything looked great and flowed very well. Although I already recognized the Men's Club, I would be remiss for not doing so again. They really made this event a success with great planning and coordination.

Now for those outside the parish: Thanks to Nick Kouloheras (parishioner and Habitat for Humanity liaison for St. John) for arranging with Home Depot to provide the wood workshop which the kids really liked. All said, our kids built over 200 wooden birdhouses and race cars. Finally, I would like to thank the Collier County Sheriff's Office for providing the rock climbing wall completely free of charge. The rock wall was a huge hit and there was a waiting line virtually all day. In addition to providing the wall, three deputies "manned" the wall for the entire event.

Assuming you are reading this bulletin in Mass, the date is either March 15 or 16. What does this mean? It means that there are only two weeks remaining until the **Reverse Raffle**. 



Lord, It Is Good That We Are Here

oday's gospel recalls the event of the Transfiguration. We are told something changed in Jesus' appearance the day in which he ascended the high mountain with Peter, James, and John. Was this a taste of what was to come in the resurrection? The Transfiguration event reveals the true nature of Jesus as God and man. The divinity of Jesus shone through his humanity and illuminated the world of the three apostles. When Moses and Elijah appeared, it was a confirmation that the consolation of Israel had finally arrived. God's voice coming forth from the cloud was the crowning of the theophany (experience of God), revealing the Father's pleasure in His Son and giving the apostles the command to listen to Jesus.

The story of the Transfiguration might appear to be out of our reach. However, we are reminded today to look for Jesus' presence in society today. Hidden in the fabric of everyday life is the presence of the one who calls us to imitate him — the Lord of life with whom the Father is well pleased. We are called to listen closely to Jesus' request and pay attention to his summons in the needs of the world around us. When we are challenged to reach out to someone in our family or neighborhood, we have the opportunity to transform the broken realities that we encounter. It is then that Jesus is made manifest through us. Our acts of love can make all things possible. Once we open ourselves to the forgiveness and healing of God in the way that we interact with one another, God is truly pleased with us.

The reality Jesus offers us an optimistic overview of life. Jesus never makes any judgment against the sinner; rather he sees their situation as an opportunity for redemption and transformation. When he meets the disturbed, the sick, or the outcast, Jesus sees this as an occasion for God's glory to shine through the brokenness.

The Transfiguration revealed the presence and glory of God to Peter, James, and John. It is a reminder that there is a deeper reality at work in the world. The apostles were simply regular people who experienced extraordinary things. These men chose to journey with Christ by setting everything aside to follow him. In this event, Jesus' image is transfigured into the brilliance of light — a sight the apostles would recall after the resurrection. During this Lenten season, we too are invited to set aside those things which are nonessential so that may allow God to lead us to the recognition of his presence in our experience. We are also invited to "transfigure" ourselves as we give witness to our transformation through the gospel.



Prayer

Lord, transform our lives with the light of your presence. May we recognize you in the fabric of life. When we face the hardships in our home or in society, may we see these as opportunities to encounter you. Once we embrace this gift, let our response be to you: Lord, it is good that we are here. Amen.






REFLECTION

Jesus calls us to shine. When we shine at something, we do well. Our real selves and real abilities come through. The word "shine" can help us understand the meaning of Jesus' transfiguration.

In Sunday's Gospel Jesus shines. Jesus is transfigured before his friends. His face becomes as dazzling as the sun; his clothes radiate bright light. This Gospel is a vision of Jesus' divinity shining through his humanity.

In this vision Peter, James, and John see Jesus is one of Israel's great prophets, standing with Moses and Elijah. They glimpse for a moment who they are following as they journey to Jerusalem where Jesus will face conflict. We remember on the 2nd Sunday of Lent the whole of Jesus' story. In Jerusalem he suffers, dies, and on the third day rises to new life.

This vision of Jesus' transfigured in glory tells all of us to remember Jesus' risen, shining self. Jesus calls us and gives us the power to shine like him, now and forever. We are God's beloved sons and daughters, too.

Follow Francis

The word *Lent* comes from the Old English word for Spring. The goal of Lent is not the crucifixion on Good Friday but the ressurrection on Easter Sunday. We often stress the penitential aspects of Lent to the exclusion of the baptismal side.

The true purpose of our Lenten disciplines, then, is to prepare us to renew our baptismal commitments. We're washed clean once again of those things that obscure the glory of God shining through our lives. On this feast of the transfiguration, it's good to remember this dazzling reality.

St. Francis never lost sight of the joy of the ressurrection, even in the midst of the penances he undertook for the sake of his spiritual life. Even his crowning experience of the stigmata, the visible representation of the wounds of Christ, brought him a deep sense of joy and union with the crucified savior.

The more we know God's love in our lives, the more we want to live up to the demands being made on us. We know our sins, our weaknesses, but we also know God's grace. If we keep the Risen Lord in our sights, we too will know what it means to experience the loving approval of our God.
