Catholic dioceses and parishes across the United States are once again encouraged to raise awareness for domestic and international religious freedom concerns during the third annual Fortnight for Freedom, June 21 - July 4. The two-week celebration will focus on the theme,

"Freedom to Serve," emphasizing the link between religious liberty and service to the poor and vulnerable.

During the **Fortnight for Freedom** Bishop Frank J. Dewane encourages the faithful to reinforce their commitment to prayer, to study the Church's teaching, and to participate in peaceful public action during the Fortnight. Before each Mass at St. John we will pray the Prayer for the Protection of Religious Liberty. *(See picture of prayer card at left; prayer on right. Please take one!)*

Each day, after daily Mass, and after the 5:00 p.m. on Sundays, we will have a Holy Hour with Eucharistic Adoration and the Rosary. Please join us.

To conclude the fortnight of events, Cardinal Donald W. Wuerl of Washington will celebrate Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington on July 4, at noon EDT.

USCCB President Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, will be the homilist at the July 4 Mass. The Mass will be televised nationwide on EWTN.

Spiritual Adoption Program Continues With Month Three

The Spiritual Adoption Program is heading into the third month. Your commitment is to pray a short prayer daily through Christmas.

MONTH 3 - Developing Baby – I can suck my thumb!"

Your spiritually adopted baby is quite active in the womb



now – although his mother won't feel him for another couple of months. If his mother's womb had a window, you could watch your spiritually adopted baby squint, swallow and move his tongue. He can make a tight fist if you touch his palm. He is breathing amniotic fluid which continues until birth, although he obtains the oxygen his body needs through the umbilical cord. The baby you are praying for weighs one ounce. Early this month – at just 9 weeks – he began to suck his thumb.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow – Mission Is Our Mission

Pope Francis released his message for World Mission Day this week. In it, he declares that all members of our church are called to evangelize and spread the joy of our faith through good works. That is the primary function of our Family Mission. His focus on Mission as the primary function of Catholicism and our church is echoed in his words:

Today vast numbers of people still do not know Jesus Christ. For this reason, the mission ad gentes continues to be most urgent. All the members of the Church are called to participate in this mission, for the Church is missionary by her very nature: she was born "to go forth". World Mission Day is a privileged moment when the faithful of various continents engage in prayer and concrete gestures of solidarity in support of the young Churches in mission lands. It is a celebration of grace and joy. A celebration

of grace, because the Holy Spirit, sent by the Father, offers wisdom and strength to those who are obedient to his action. A celebration of joy, because Jesus Christ, the Father's Son, sent to evangelize the world, supports and accompanies our missionary efforts. This joy of Jesus and missionary disciples leads me to propose a biblical icon, which we find in the Gospel of Luke (cf. 10:21-23). ...

Many parts of the world are experiencing a dearth of vocations to the priesthood and the consecrated life. Often this is due to the absence of contagious apostolic fervour in communities which lack enthusiasm and thus fail to attract. The joy of the Gospel is born of the encounter with Christ and from sharing with the poor. For this reason I encourage parish communities, associations and groups to live an intense fraternal life. grounded in love for Jesus and concern for the needs of the most disadvantaged. Wherever there is joy, enthusiasm and a desire to bring Christ to others, genuine vocations arise. Among these vocations, we should not overlook lay vocations to mission. There has been a growing awareness of the identity and mission of the lay faithful in the Church, as well as a recognition that they are called to take an increasingly important role in the spread of the Gospel. Consequently they need to be given a suitable training for

Gospel. Consequently they need to be given a suitable training for the sake of an effective apostolic activity. ...

Dear brothers and sisters, on this World Mission Day my thoughts turn to all the local Churches. Let us not be robbed of the joy of evangelization! I invite you to immerse yourself in the joy of the Gospel and nurture a love that can light up your vocation and your mission. I urge each of you to recall, as if you were making an interior pilgrimage, that "first love" with which the Lord Jesus Christ warmed your heart, not for the sake of nostalgia but in order to persevere in joy. The Lord's disciples persevere in joy when they sense his presence, do his will and share with others their faith, hope and evangelical charity. – Pope Francis 2014-

Re-Establishment of Marriage Process Changes; Processing Fee Increases to \$500 Effective July 1

For a divorced person to re-establish his or her freedom for a new marriage in the Catholic Church after a divorce, it is necessary to obtain two concordant affirmative decisions on the sacramental validity of the previous marriage.

The Metropolitan Court of Miami has notified the dioceses of Florida that as of July 1, an increase in processing fees will take place for appeals by litigants of diocesan first instance tribunal judgments. The new fee is \$500 for a formal appeal of Affirmative or Negative decisions. Payment of the fee is to be made by the petitioning litigant directly to the Archdiocese of Miami Appeal Tribunal at the time of appeal.

In particular cases, depending on the circumstances, a payment plan may be allowed by the appeal court. For more information about the process and fees, please contact the Diocesan Tribunal at 941.484.9543.

Death Penalty Prayer Scheduled for Vigil July 10

How much do you love? Do you live out Our Lord's command "love your enemies?" On July 10 you will have an opportunity to do just that. Eddie Wayne Davis is scheduled to be the seventh person executed by lethal injection here in the State of Florida in 2014. You are invited to participate in a prayer vigil for Mr. Davis, his victim and the affected families, as well as for an end to the use of the death penalty.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#2267) states "If, instead, bloodless means are sufficient to defend against the aggressor and to protect the safety of persons, public authority should limit itself to such means..." This is not a call to acquit the guilty, rather it is a call to love as Christ loves, to love even the guilty and seek their conversion. Such charity is a powerful Catholic witness in an increasingly violent and hatefilled society.

Did you know that this Saturday, June 21 (6:51a.m.) is the **first day of summer**? Although our summer in Naples began quite some time ago, the summer solstice marks the true beginning. For those interested, I have included a little information on the solstice.

A solstice occurs when the sun's zenith is at its furthest point from the

equator. During the June solstice it reaches its northernmost point and the Earth's North Pole tilts directly towards the sun, at about 23.5 degrees. It is also known as the northern solstice because it occurs when the sun is directly over the Tropic of Cancer in the northern hemisphere. If the Earth's rotation was at right angles to the plane of its orbit around the sun, there would be no solstice days and no seasons. The June solstice marks the first day of the summer season in the northern hemisphere. The word solstice is from the Latin word "solstitium", meaning "sun-stopping", because the point at which the sun appears to rise and set stops and reverses direction after this day. On this day, the sun does not rise precisely in the east, but rises to the north of east and sets to the north of west allowing it to be in the sky for a longer period of time. In the southern hemisphere, the June solstice is known as the shortest day of the year. It is when the sun has reached its furthest point from the equator and marks the first day of winter.

This past week began the installation of **six new air conditioning units** in the Parish Life Center. Many of the

old "curbs" had to be retrofitted to accommodate the new units which caused more than a bit of angst. Due to these unforeseen issues, the installation process will certainly drag into this coming week. We apologize for any inconvenience caused by the installation process as we have had to redirect numerous groups utilizing



the facilities. Ultimately, we will have a more efficient AC operating system.

As many of you remember, we administered a second collection in March to be used for **Capital Reserves**. We plan to continue this second collection every March in an effort to build reserves to be used for items such as the above referenced air conditioning units. Until this year, we have had no reserves to be used for these capital purchases. Instead, all of the funds necessary to accommodate Capital expenditures were recognized in our operating budget. Under the direction of Paul DellUomo, we have assembled a subcommittee comprised of members of our finance and buildings and grounds committees to oversee a special three year ongoing capital budget.

As you know, we have a very talented group of maintenance personnel here at Saint John the Evangelist. **Ovidio Moreno**



is one such talented member of our staff. Although you may have never met Ovidio, you have certainly seen his amazing stone work (and other displays of carpentry and craftsmanship.) Some of the projects he has completed include the installation of a limestone veneer as a backdrop for the Blessed Mother statue and St. John the Evangelist statue, installation of travertine on the bases of the benches and statue at the Veteran's Memorial, complete renovation and

installation of travertine in the PLC bathrooms, ceramic tile in the foyer of the PLC lobby and numerous other projects. Recently, Ovidio completely rehabilitated the Men's Club

fountain at the entrance to the Paniccia Prayer Garden. He installed decorative mosaic tile in the base of the fountain which really gives a dramatic effect. Time permitting, Ovidio and his apprentice (Jesus) will begin renovation of the classroom bathrooms in

the PLC installing travertine flooring and walls to match the ballroom bathrooms. Obviously, Ovidio has allowed us to



recognize substantial savings by performing this work in house and not having to use an outside vendor. Thank you, Ovidio, for your hard work and dedication to Saint John the Evangelist. You are an asset to our staff.

Right on the heels of Vacation Bible School, this past week we hosted the divisional **Cub Scout Day Camp**. We went from a "Wilderness" theme to a "Safari" theme all in the course of a week. The Cub Scouts were actually able to use some of the props from VBS. In addition, many of the Cub Scout campers also attended our VBS the week before. Nearly 200 youngsters attended and participated in countless activities which included archery, BB gun target shooting, leather crafts, facemask painting out of palm fronds, American Flag etiquette and patriotism. In addition, representatives were onsite from

As children, many of us were taught whenever you saw the crimson light flickering in the sanctuary of the church that Christ was present, living in the tabernacle. The crimson light was a true reminder that Christ remains with us in the real presence always. Such is God's generosity that he

continues to feed us through the passage of time. God was present to the people of Israel who fled captivity in Egypt only to find themselves in desert lands, and he continues to journey with us offering us a food that will last forever.

Jesus reminds us today that He is the Bread of Life. From the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper through his death and resurrection, Jesus offers us a new covenant in his blood. Such a

> covenant cannot be broken for it is a once and for all sacrifice. When we celebrate the mass we participate in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. Our participation gives meaning to our journey of faith that culminates in eternal life. Every time that we celebrate the Eucharistic liturgy of the Church, God speaks to us in his Sacred Word and offers Himself wholly to each one of us. Transubstantiation is one of the mysteries of our faith that allows us to be physically touched by the presence of the living God. As food is necessary for life, the Holy Eucharist is necessary for our faith. Through the gift of the Mass we experience the real presence of Jesus and we are truly fed by this heavenly food.

As we read through the gospels we often find Jesus in the midst of situations of sin and division. Jesus continually brings healing to the sick, calm to the storm, comfort to the disturbed, and disturbance to the comfortable. Jesus' fundamental option is to bring others to an encounter of the divine. He leads people into the heart of the Father where mercy and transformation can be found. And so it is with the sacraments of the Church, especially the Eucharist. Jesus is truly present in the sacrament of the Eucharist. The consecrated host is not merely a symbol to remind

us of events that secured our salvation. The consecrated host is salvation made tangible — God's real gift of himself, where He is made known in the breaking of the bread. If we have faith in this tenet of our Catholic faith and allow the grace of this sacrament to penetrate our heart, mind, and soul, Jesus will continue to heal us, bring calm to the storms of our lives, give comfort in the painful experiences that come our way, and *challenge us to become what we receive*. Jesus is the living Bread that has come down from heaven. *The challenge is that our lives now become living bread for others*.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"[T]he Lord distributes for us the bread which is His body, He makes a gift of Himself. We, too, are experiencing the "solidarity of God" with man, a solidarity that never runs out, a solidarity that never ceases to amaze us: God draws near to us; in the sacrifice of the Cross He lowers Himself, entering into the darkness of death in order to give us His life, which overcomes evil, selfishness, death.

Jesus....gives Himself to us in the Eucharist, shares our same journey – indeed, He becomes food, real food that sustains our life even at times when the going is rough, when obstacles slow down our steps. The Lord in the Eucharist makes us follow His path, that of service, of sharing, of giving – and what little we have, what little we are, if shared, becomes wealth, because the power of God, which is that of love, descends into our poverty to transform it.

Let us ask ourselves this evening, adoring the Christ truly present in the Eucharist: do I let myself be transformed by Him? Do I let the Lord who gives Himself to me, guide me to come out more and more from my little fence, to get out and be not afraid to give, to share, to love Him and others?




Prayer
