Needless to say, his gifts and talents have been very much appreciated and will be missed. On a personal note, I will certainly miss working with him.

So where do we go from here? I have asked Scott to assist with this transition. Both Scott and his wife Shelley have agreed that he would stay with us through October to help educate and offer insights to the person who will replace him. I am happy to announce that Jean-Paul Boucher, the Director of Family Mission, will replace Scott as the General Manager. Jean-Paul will continue to direct the Family Mission as well as oversee the operations and management of the parish. The parish will be conducting a search for a bookkeeper to take care of the parish finances and payroll.

It is never easy to say goodbye to people who have served you well. Let us pray for Scott and his family as they move to Scottsdale, Arizona, and let us send our warm wishes for their future.

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

#ToKnow – Pope Francis' Top 10 Secrets to Happiness

In an interview this week, Our Holy Father provided the tidbits of how he lives his life, trying to be loving and joyous to all around him. Some of his insights are simple, but they are so true for all Catholics, Christians, and all of humanity. If people could live by these tenants, the world would be a happier, engaged place.

- 1. "Live and let live." Everyone should be guided by this principle, he said, which has a similar expression in Rome with the saying, "Move forward and let others do the same."
- 2. "Be giving of yourself to others." People need to be open and generous toward others, he said, because "if you withdraw into yourself, you run the risk of becoming egocentric. And stagnant water becomes putrid."
- "Proceed calmly" in life. The pope, who used to teach high school literature, used an image from an Argentine novel by Ricardo Guiraldes, in which the protagonist -- gaucho Don Segundo Sombra -- looks back on how he lived his life.
- 4. "A healthy sense of leisure." The pleasures of art, literature and playing together with children have been lost, he said.
- 5. Sundays should be holidays. Workers should have Sundays off because "Sunday is for family," he said.
- 6. Find innovative ways to create dignified jobs for young people. "We need to be creative with young people. If they have no opportunities they will get into drugs" and be more vulnerable to suicide, he said. "It's not enough to give them food," he said. "Dignity is given to you when you can bring food home" from one's own labor.

- 7. Respect and take care of nature. Environmental degradation "is one of the biggest challenges we have," he said. "I think a question that we're not asking ourselves is: 'Isn't humanity committing suicide with this indiscriminate and tyrannical use of nature?'"
- 8. Stop being negative. "Needing to talk badly about others indicates low self-esteem. That means, 'I feel so low that instead of picking myself up I have to cut others down,'" the pope said. "Letting go of negative things quickly is healthy."
- 9. Don't proselytize; respect others' beliefs. "We can inspire others through witness so that one grows together in communicating. But the worst thing of all is religious proselytism, which paralyzes: 'I am talking with you in order to persuade you, 'No. Each person dialogues, starting with his and her own identity. The church grows by attraction, not proselytizing," the pope said.
- 10. Work for peace. "We are living in a time of many wars," he said, and "the call for peace must be shouted. Peace sometimes gives the impression of being quiet, but it is never quiet, peace is always proactive" and dynamic. — Pope Francis 7/27/2014 (http://www.catholicnews. com/data/stories/cns/1403144.htm)



In contemplating what we would do with the loss of her position, she was approached by a team from Arizona and offered an opportunity which was too good to pass up. This is literally a dream job for Shelley, and I have chosen to support her in her endeavors by moving our family out west.

I must say that notifying Fr. John of my plans was one of the toughest things I have had to do in my life. I have grown to respect and trust Fr. John on a personal, professional and spiritual level. He has been very good to me, and I believe we made a very good team working together.

I was often asked why I didn't choose to do something different over the years and my answer was always that "I love my job and I love this parish." This is certainly the truth, although there were many times during the height of season that I wondered what in the world I was doing.

We have had our share of ups and downs over the years especially with the transition from our founding Pastor, Fr. Glackin, to Fr. John, however, we always weathered the storm and emerged stronger than ever. Fr. John asked me what I was most proud of during my tenure and my answer was keeping the parish fully engaged during the aforementioned transitional period. People do not like change and that was a big change. I spent many months meeting with parish families one on one explaining the TRUTH about what happened and setting the record straight. Although we lost some parish families during that time period, the majority of those who met with me chose to stay and are definitely glad they did.

Many professional athletes always claim to want to retire at the pinnacle rather than dragging out their careers and retiring as a backup. I can honestly say that I am leaving you with a great team of clergy and staff. As I alluded to several weeks ago, this is the best compilation of clergy and staff that have been assembled in my 17 years here.

Although my heart is broken to be leaving all of you, I know that this is a great move for my family and their well-being. Since I am a self-proclaimed "straight shooter," allow me to once again set the record straight. I am making this decision on my own and not under any type of coercion.

This is not the final Scott's Corner as there will be plenty to discuss for the next three months. This is, however, the end of an era and I am thankful to all of you for the love you have shown over the years.

As an aside, I have a business opportunity setup for myself in Arizona which looks to be a great opportunity as well. I have also located a great Catholic Community where I plan to enroll my children in school and attend Mass.

Thank you again for your support, patience and love during my tenure here at Saint John the Evangelist.

It is a 16-day festival running from late September to the first weekend in October with more than 6 million people from around the world attending the event every year. To the locals, it is often simply called Wiesn, after the colloquial name of the fairgrounds (*Theresienwiese*) themselves. The Oktoberfest is an important part of Bavarian culture, having been held since 1810. Other cities across the world also hold yearly Oktoberfest celebrations, modeled after the original Munich event.

The Saint John the Evangelist Knights of Columbus Council #11281 will follow in their footsteps sponsoring the first Oktoberfest at St. John on Saturday, October 4, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Planned are rides, exhibits, German food and drink, all of which are part of the traditional celebration of Oktoberfest. In addition, Bavarian style musical entertainment will be on hand to ensure a lively celebration. Bavarian dress will be worn and local event sponsors will be recognized for their support of the Oktoberfest and exhibits.

Proceeds from the Oktoberfest event will help those in need in the Immokalee areas. The Knights of Columbus have been supporting the food pantries, health clinics, Habitat for Humanity, and people of the area for years (see April 27 Saint John the Evangelist bulletin article). The proceeds will help the Knights and Saint John the Evangelist continue to provide the support for the neediest in our community.



Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year A

Isaiah 55:1-3 Psalm 145:8-9, 15-16, 17-18 Romans 8:35, 37-39 Matthew 14:13-21

Blessed, Broken and Shared

n our readings today, we encounter a vast range of emotions. In the gospel message, Jesus had just learned of the death of John the Baptist. Traditional interpretation of the scriptural texts indicates that John was Jesus' second cousin. Since family bonds are very important, this loss must have been difficult to deal with for Jesus. Moreover, John the Baptist was the herald of Jesus' coming and the last of the great prophets — Jesus must have known how important John's witness was to salvation history. Jesus seeks solitude in the midst of his sorrow. However, he is soon confronted with a need much greater than his own. When he returns from the deserted place, he experiences a hunger and thirst beyond words. His heart is moved with pity at the sight of the crowds and he heals their illness, suffering, and pain.

Reflection Questions

- 1. How does Jesus deal with the death of John the Baptist?
- 2. How can you learn from Christ's example in your own experience?
- 3. Why do you think people sought Jesus' company?
- 4. Why was Jesus' heart moved with pity for the crowds?
- 5. Name the ways in which you hunger for God's presence in your life?
- 6. How does God provide for you?
- 7. What are the signs of a hungry will and how does God respond to such hunger?
- 8. Do you feel filled with God's Word and nourished by His body during the celebration of the Eucharist?
- 9. How does the nourishment given to you at Mass flow out into the world?

The crowds are blessed by Jesus' healing presence.

These people had obviously heard about the miraculous events that surrounded Jesus and his ministry. The gospel account suggests that the people were not only hungry for food but for Jesus' presence as well. He provides for the people on two different levels: the physical level and the spiritual one. Jesus nourishes both the body and the soul. As he looks out at the crowd, he takes the bread, blesses it, breaks it, and shares it with the hungry souls. In this divine moment, the crowd experiences God sharing a meal with them. The miracle was brought about with merely five loaves and two fish. Yet, five thousand were satisfied. There was obviously something divine at work!

Every time we gather for the Mass, we come together to be nourished by the Word of God and to be fed by His body and blood. As we gather for prayer and worship we know that some people are carrying tremendous burdens. Illness, financial concerns, or family problems often plague some of the vulnerable souls who occupy the seats of our church. Others come to give thanks for the many blessings that life brings them. No matter who we are and what we are experiencing, whether we are blessed or broken, we nonetheless gather as one. Both the body and the soul are given strength in our Eucharistic encounters. The priest blesses, breaks, and shares the Sacred Bread just as Jesus did all those years ago. Hopefully, we come to Mass in the same way that the people of Jesus' day did, i.e., hungry for the food from heaven. As we collect our thoughts in those quiet moments before the Mass begins, we recognize the blessings of having a hunger within our souls that only God can satisfy. Without God we are nothing — our eternal life depends on Him. It is imperative that we hunger for God in this world in order to taste the delights of the world to come.



Prayer

Lord Jesus, may we come to you with hungry hearts. May we know that the blessing of emptiness within us can ultimately fill us with your life. Come to us and dwell with us — celebrate with us, cry with us, and fill us with your love. Amen.
