

### Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:15 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

# #ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe — Lenten Message from Pope Francis: "Make Your Hearts Firm"

In our continued efforts to invigorate St. John programs and March is roaring in like a lion! With our Ministry Parade next weekend, the Parish Picnic and Ministry Fair the next, and Lenten events every single week, we are engaging our active Parish Family with fun, faithful events to capture and showcase the joy of our Catholic Community. And with dual Masses for Palm Sunday in both the Church and the Ballroom, we will be making sure March goes out like a lion as well.

There is so much going on here at St. John, from the physical renewal in the church to the operational changes to ensure transparency and efficiency to the pastoral focus to make serving our Parish Family and the Community around us the top priority, that sometimes we can get lost in the details of those efforts. We need to step back every once in a while and appreciate the gift of our faith and deeply connect with

the joy it provides to us, if we let it. So, instead of boring you with details of the church operations this week, especially this first Lenten weekend, when we will be focusing all our effort on our Capital Campaign and New Life Center, I wanted to step back. Pope Francis has provided us with his Lenten Message for this year, and it is core to our Catholic Community, providing three steps we should all take this Lenten Season:

Lent is a time of renewal for the whole Church, for each communities and every believer. Above all it is a "time of grace" (2 Cor 6:2). God does not ask of us anything that he himself has not first given us. "We love because he first has loved us" (1 Jn 4:19). He is not aloof from us. Each one of us has a place in his heart. He knows us by name, he cares for us and he seeks us out whenever we turn away from him. He is interested in each of us; his love does not allow him to be indifferent to what happens to us. Usually, when we are healthy and comfortable, we forget about others (something God the Father never does): we are unconcerned with their problems, their sufferings and the injustices they endure... Our heart grows cold. As long as I am relatively healthy and comfortable, I don't think about those less well off. Today, this selfish attitude of indifference has taken on global proportions, to the extent that we can speak of a globalization of indifference. It is a problem which we, as Christians, need to confront...

God's people, then, need this interior renewal, lest we become indifferent and withdraw into ourselves. To further

this renewal, I would like to propose for our reflection three biblical texts.

1. "If one member suffers, all suffer together" (1 Cor 12:26) – The Church

Lent is a favourable time for letting Christ serve us so that we in turn may become more like him. This happens whenever we hear the word of God and receive the sacraments, especially the Eucharist. There we become what we receive: the Body of Christ. In this body there is no room for the indifference which so often seems to possess our hearts. For whoever is of Christ, belongs to

> one body, and in him we cannot be indifferent to one another. "If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honoured, all the parts share its joy" (1 Cor 12:26).

The Church is the communio sanctorum not only because of her saints, but also because she is a communion in holy things: the love of God revealed to us in Christ and all his gifts. Among these gifts there is also the response of those who let

themselves be touched by this love. In this communion of saints, in this sharing in holy things, no one possesses anything alone, but shares everything with others. And since we are united in God, we can do something for those who are far distant, those whom we could never reach on our own, because with them and for them, we ask God that all of us may be open to his plan of salvation.

2. "Where is your brother?" (Gen 4:9) – Parishes and Communities

All that we have been saying about the universal Church must now be applied to the life of our parishes and communities. Do these ecclesial structures enable us

to experience being part of one body? A body which receives and shares what God wishes to give? A body which acknowledges and cares for its weakest, poorest and most insignificant members? Or do we take refuge in a universal love that would embrace the whole world, while failing to see the Lazarus sitting before our closed doors (Lk 16:19-31)?...

Her mission is to bear patient witness to the One who desires to draw all creation and every man and woman to the Father. Her mission is to bring to all a love which cannot remain silent. The Church follows Jesus Christ along the paths that lead to every man and woman, to the very ends of the earth (cf. Acts 1:8). In each of our neighbours, then, we must see a brother or sister for whom Christ died and rose again. What we ourselves have received, we have received for them as well. Similarly, all that our brothers and sisters possess is a gift for the Church and for all humanity.

Dear brothers and sisters, how greatly I desire that all those places where the Church is present, especially our parishes and our communities, may become islands of mercy in the midst of the sea of indifference!

3. "Make your hearts firm!" (James 5:8) – Individual Christians

As individuals too, we have are tempted by indifference. Flooded with news reports and troubling images of

human suffering, we often feel our complete inability to help. What can we do to avoid being caught up in this spiral of distress and powerlessness?

First, we can pray in communion with the Church on earth and in heaven. Let us not underestimate the power of so many voices united in prayer! The 24 Hours for the Lord initiative, which I hope will be observed on 13-14 March throughout the Church, also at the diocesan level, is meant to be a sign of this need for prayer.

Second, we can help by acts of charity, reaching out to both those near and far through the Church's many charitable organizations. Lent is a favourable time for showing this concern for others by small yet concrete signs of our belonging to the one human family.

Third, the suffering of others is a call to conversion, since their need reminds me of the uncertainty of my own life and my dependence on God and my brothers and sisters. If we humbly implore God's grace and accept our own limitations, we will trust in the infinite possibilities which God's love holds out to us. We will also be able to resist the diabolical temptation of thinking that by our own efforts we can save the world and ourselves...

During this Lent, then, brothers and sisters, let us all ask the Lord: "Fac cor nostrum secundum cor tuum": Make our hearts like yours (Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus). In this way we will receive a heart which is firm and merciful, attentive and generous, a heart which is not closed, indifferent or prey to the globalization of indifference.

It is my prayerful hope that this Lent will prove spiritually fruitful for each believer and every ecclesial community. I ask all of you to pray for me. May the Lord bless you and Our Lady keep you.





# Changing the Heart ~ A Noble Endeavor

h a s

he Season of Lent is here and we are called to conversion. The discipline of Lent — fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, enable us to enter the depths of our souls and to discern God's will in our lives. Conversion is not simply the changing of the mind, but also the changing of the heart. The mind can simply digress from one thing to another. It is here that opinions are formed and sin reigns supreme. Each Lent we are called to "Metanoia" which means "a change of heart". A true change of heart brings transformation to the life of the one who commits himself to be converted to Christ in this most holy season.

### **Reflection Questions**

- 1. Why does Jesus go into the desert?
- 2. What is the value in fasting and praying?
- 3. What are the temptations Jesus experiences?
- 4. How does Jesus respond to each temptation?
- 5. What does Lent mean to you?
- 6. What does Lent prepare you for?
- 7. How do you deal with the temptations in your life?
- 8. Are you willing to join the Church's call to fast, pray, and give alms this Lent? Why or why not?
- 9. What commitments are you willing to make?
- 10. What will bring you fulfillment?

In today's gospel, we hear of the temptation of Jesus. Jesus listened to the Spirit of God within himself and the Spirit led him into the desert where he underwent self-denial. The forty days Jesus spent in the desert enabled Him to look deep within himself. It was in this reality that Satan brought temptation. Jesus, however, resisted this temptation, uniting his heart to the Father in heaven. In this short passage from Mark we also hear that Jesus was "... among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him." He had to deal with both the good and the bad. Out of this test, Jesus is seen to call us to repent and believe in the gospel. He calls for a change of heart and surrender to the good news.


Each year we are given an opportunity to turn our lives back to God. We are bombarded with so much today. Goodness is all around us, but so also is sin. Materialism, indifference, discrimination, the world of sensuality and the undermining of the dignity of life, deter us from living the fullness of life. During Lent, Christ and the universal Church invite us to reflect on our lives and to return to God. This is a time to refuse to be


mastered by sin and yield to the love of God. The language of the heart allows us to let go of what is nonessential and hold onto what is essential. If we turn our hearts toward God, we can remove the negative influences that bring the stain of sin to each one of us.

Let us reflect on our lives. If there is a person or persons with whom we are in conflict, we are asked to turn away from the temptation of resentment and to grapple with the mystery of God's mercy and

forgiveness. If there is a situation that we are involved in that is seemingly unjust, immoral, or unethical, then we are challenged to transform these broken realities.

We live in a world of fragile peace — fragility exists because of sin. However, the answer to prayer for a lasting peace can be found. This hope exists in the dignity and soul of every individual. Peace can be made a reality when we allow the Prince of Peace to speak through us. This is the hope to which we are called!
