SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow — Field Hospital Church: Directive from Pope Francis for the Behavior and Focus of the Catholic Church

How many of you have ever watched the television show, M*A*S*H? I was always taken with that show, a mix of comedy, intense drama, and a group of very different people with different ideas, all working together to save lives on the front lines of a war zone. That show, the flawed but loving characters, and most importantly, the mission of true field hospitals (and the brave real-world men and women who saved so many of our soldiers) has been etched in my soul, especially after this past week's World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia. We were called to make the Catholic Church a "Field Hospital" by bishops and cardinals during the meetings, illustrating the direct action we are expected to take as Catholics in the world around us. We are not supposed to shut ourselves off from the world, but focus on healing it.

But, what does being a field hospital mean? To me, I look back at Pope Francis' first thoughts on the Catholic field hospital:

The thing the church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the faithful; it needs nearness, proximity. I see the church as a field hospital after battle. It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol and about the level of his blood sugars! You have to heal his wounds. Then we can talk about everything else. Heal the wounds, heal the wounds. ... And you have to start from the ground up.

- Pope Francis 9/19/13

Catholic Churches, and our Parish Family in particular, must focus on the love and joyous nature of our faith to be ready to welcome, heal, and enliven those around us, Catholic and non-Catholic alike. Instead of acting like a large medical hospital, with so many forms, procedures, and lots of "no, we don't do that", we need to be the field hospital, taking in all, understanding their unique and deep wounds and gifts (Cura Personalis, for those of you keeping track). We need our faith to warm and care for everyone, even people we do not agree

with. We also must work together as a team to make this happen. There is no "hot shot" doctor who can save someone all by themselves.

And we need to be a field hospital in a happy and bright way. Cardinal Tagle of Manila was one of the keynote speakers at the World Meeting of Family and he hit on this topic several times (EWTN has the video at: http://bcove.me/gy7mivjr about 28 minutes



into the link). How can we have a chance to heal someone if they get a grumpy face or a bunch of paperwork as the first thing they see when they are coming to our church, potentially in deep pain? In particular, Cardinal Tagle says:

Infuse the field hospital with hope. We cannot be healers if we look desperate. – Cardinal Tagle 9/28/15

Let's all head the call of our church to renew our Mission as a Field Hospital with love, joy, and acceptance.

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe — Ministry Spotlight: Knights of Columbus

many countries around the world.

If you are looking for a way to get involved in service to the Naples and larger community, there is no better way at St. John than to join the Knights of Columbus. From the tens of thousands of dollars raised for the soup kitchens and food pantries, to running our upcoming Thanksgiving in the Park program, feeding the community of Immokalee, to supporting our veterans with electric wheelchairs and the Honor Guard, this ministry is alive with action. They also know how to have a good time, as seen at the recent Doo Whop Night and this weekend's Oktoberfest. 



to the problematic questions of the moral law. The Pharisees were hoping that Jesus would err in his understanding of the Mosaic tradition. Jesus' response does two things for the listeners of his day. Firstly, he affirms the tradition of the prophets and upholds the laws regarding marriage. Secondly, he challenges the Pharisees to recognize the importance of commitment. The reason for this challenge was due to a loophole in the law which would permit Jewish men to divorce at will. Jesus suggests that the challenge to meet the obligations of marriage is equally the responsibility of both the man and the woman. Jesus is clearly telling us about the importance of the bond of marriage. "What God has joined, no one should separate." Jesus is not merely making a human observation, but emphasizing God's thought on the subject. He is basically pointing out the promises made in the marriage


Our world today is changing so rapidly. We are told that two out of three marriages are now ending in divorce. Children suffer as they are pulled between the tensions of those who are involved in custody battles. While some tragic and abusive marriages must ultimately end in divorce for the sake of human survival, others end due to the lack of commitment and discernment. The sacrament of marriage when taken seriously communicates the presence of Christ in the way that a couple shares in the marriage covenant. The age of communication and technology has brought us so far is so short a time. We live in a world of immediacy. People want instant results. The attention span of individuals is now becoming very short with all the distractions that the secular world has to offer. As soon as some marriages start to experience difficulty, there is often a tendency to walk away from the immediate problem and couples forget about the long term commitment they had made — "I take you, for better, for worse, for richer or poorer, in sickness or in health, until death...' Movies talk to this, often gnawing away at the moral fiber of the Sacred Scriptures handed down to others, as the deceit and betrayal of married persons. There is almost a desensitization of the heartbreak of divorce when

someone in a story finds new love, even though they have already made a commitment to be married for life.

Jesus also recognizes the dignity of a child in today's gospel. Children were not given a prominent place within the society of his day. Parents looked forward to the day when the child would grow into maturity and bring resources from the work of their hands into their home. Jesus knows that in the gift of childhood is contained the simplicity in which a child simply trusts and feels protected by his or her family. Jesus reminds

his listeners that unless they become like a child (in which the child has yet to build walls and is quick to forgive), then we will be slow to enter into the kingdom of heaven which does not build obstacles between its members and which is a place of pure love.

It is always around this time of year that the Catholic Church asks us to observe "Respect Life" endeavors. We take the words of the gospel to heart in recognizing that children have a special place in the heart of God and in the life of the church. Afterall, it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs. Abortion can never be justified in our reasoning – our fundamental position is that God creates life, restores it, and then takes it back to Himself. The destruction of human life whether inside or outside of the womb is contrary to the very Scriptures proclaimed from the pulpit every Sunday. Abortion, euthanasia, embryonic research, capital punishment, exploitation of the poor, unjust wars, violence, and the high volume of divorce, disrespect what is precious to God. We are asked today to give witness to the very belief that all life is sacred from conception to natural death. We are asked to help single mothers and encourage them in their roles, assisting them as best we can. We are called to work for peace and justice – always defending the rights of the poor. Last, but not least, let us pray that all life will be held sacred and uphold the institution of marriage life!

Lord, may we be open to your Sacred Word. Encourage us to keep the commitments that we have made in love. Let all of those who share in the sanctity of marriage be blessed in the way they live their covenant love. As the world continues to progress, we pray also for a return in our decision making process to the dignity of all human life. Amen.

Wisdom of the Fathers

"The wealth of any country is found primarily in its inhabitants. The country's future depends on them, individually and collectively, as does its capacity to work for peace. A commitment to peace is possible only in a unified society. Unity, on the other hand, is not the same as uniformity. Social cohesion requires unstinting respect for the dignity of each person and the responsible participation of all in contributing the best of their talents and abilities. The energy needed to build and consolidate peace also demands that we constantly return to the wellsprings of our humanity. Our human dignity is inseparable from the sacredness of life as the gift of the Creator. In God's plan, each person is unique and irreplaceable. A person comes into this world in a family, which is the first locus of humanization, and above all the first school of peace. To build peace, we need to look to the family, supporting it and facilitating its task, and in this way promoting an overall culture of life. The effectiveness of our commitment to peace depends on our understanding of human life. If we want peace, let us defend life! This approach leads us to reject not only war and terrorism, but every assault on innocent human life, on men and women as creatures willed by God. Wherever the truth of human nature is ignored or denied, it becomes impossible to respect that grammar which

is the natural law inscribed in the human heart (cf. Message for the 2007 World Day of Peace, 3). The grandeur and the raison d'être of each person are found in God alone. The unconditional acknowledgement of the dignity of every human being, of each one of us, and of the sacredness of human life, is linked to the responsibility which we all have before God. We must combine our efforts, then, to develop a sound vision of man, respectful

of the unity and integrity of the human person.
Without this, it is impossible to build true peace."


