SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

Marty is one of the smiling faces that greets you at Mass as an Usher (at several different Masses on Saturday and Sunday). He is responsible for the gorgeous woodwork around the church, including our new Processional Cross (which is a duplicate of the crucifix above the altar and is far more sturdy than our previous Cross), and for nearly a year, he has filled in as our Facilities Manager. This parish owes him a tremendous thank you for all the effort he has expended in moving our facilities and grounds forward in the face of the tremendous issues we still are working to resolve. From walking the roofs to see where the leaks are coming from to implementing new cooling systems for our comfort, Marty has been an integral part of our progress.

In an effort to help Marty enjoy his retirement, marriage, and life, we have combed over a large set of prospective Facilities Managers. With the help of the Buildings and Grounds Council

members, Fr. John and I have chosen an individual who brings tremendous experience and capability to the position, John Levering. From his time as a Maintenance Supervisor for Army Cobra Gunships to his 15 years of experience with volunteers and service



as a manager at hospice and healthcare facilities, he will bring both the structure and process needed for our complex environment as well as a deep understanding of our mission to serve our Parish Family.

#ToKnow – Parking Safety

Speaking of our facilities and grounds, there are several safety concerns I wanted to address, in particular within our parking areas. As all of our Parish Family and guests arrive for Masses and events on our campus, people are looking for parking spots. I understand that finding a spot where you want to park can be difficult, but we want to ensure we have a safe environment to enjoy Mass:

- There is an entrance between the church parking lots and Naples Park Elementary, the school next door, where it is dangerous for both cars and individuals to be parked on that single-lane area. This is a fire lane for both locations, so it must be kept clear.
- There are gravel spots near walkways into the churches
 that are not parking spots. Those are in place to give
 our parishioners a place to walk out of the way from the
 moving cars so they will not be in harm's way. Please do
 not park on the gravel spots.
- Our church has a back road behind it, adjacent to the cemetery. Please do not park along that road or at the exit

of it. Not only is this a utility road, it also is an emergency vehicle route for when we have a medical condition in the church. We would not want someone's life-saving support to be delayed due to a car blocking the road.



Honoring Our Nation's Deterans





The day was beautiful and over 400 were in attendance at this year's Veterans' Day Remembrance Mass on Saturday November 7. Fr. Jim celebrated the Mass, along with Deacon Frank Paniccia. The Mass began with a young Bagpiper from the Naples Fife and Drum led the Marine Corps League of Naples as they posted the colors, and the attendees were led in the Pledge of Allegiance to our "Stars and Stripes". The St. John Knights of Columbus Arthur J. Corr (AJC) Assembly Color Guard led the opening procession of the Mass.

The St. John Choir sang the National Anthem and a number of patriotic songs to bring out the pride and honor felt by those in attendance. In his homily Fr. Jim reflected on the veterans

> and the power of prayer to address the fears and challenges they face when they serve, and when they return.





AJC Faithful Navigator, Sir Knight Gary Ray, noted in his remarks that, "We are in awe at the eternal debt which we owe...to the untold number of American Veterans...who chose to set aside... their personal ambitions and dreams...in order to assure the wellbeing of our great nation. We, the living, are indeed the beneficiaries of those who made the tremendous sacrifices for the advancement and surety of our liberty. To all our veterans...we have a simple yet heartfelt message — thank you — thank you for your unwavering service in peacetime and war, here in this nation... and throughout the world."

Following the Mass, parishioners joined Fr. Jim in a prayer of remembrance at the "Lest We Forget" statue outside the church. Parishioners Madeline and Jack Gaffey laid a wreath at the foot of the statue, as the Marine Corps League followed with a dramatic twenty-one gun Salvo. WWII Army Air Corps Sgt. Robert McDonald took out his bugle and played an emotional "taps" to close the ceremonies. A heartwarming conclusion to a great day.

Parishioners were treated to refreshments following the ceremonies in the Parish Life Center,

which was sponsored by the Arthur J. Corr Knights of Columbus Assembly.

Later on that evening, AJC Assembly Color Corps joined thousands of others at Fort Myers International Airport to welcome WWII and Korean War Veterans back from their "Honor Flight" trip to The WWII Memorial in Washington, D.C. AJC Assembly Color Corp Commander Bill Warvel watched as these 74 American Heroes, all in wheelchairs, were helped from the plane in a moving and proud display of what embodies the American Spirit.

Bill noted, "Americans will pause this Veterans Day...to honor all the brave military men and women who have underwritten our freedom by their duty, honor, and selfless service.

The Passing of Time ~ Moments of Grace

ime and the world's reality are forever changing. No day is ever the same as the last. The earth is constantly witness to death and resurrection through its celebration of the changing seasons. Our relationships take many twists and turns as we try to seek who we are and where we are going. The Church ultimately tries to discern its prophetic nature as it applies Christ's teachings to the passages of time. We celebrate the Liturgical Seasons in our worship life in order to touch on the various aspects of the gospel message.

As we approach the end of the Church's year we focus our attention on the question of the "end times". Although we do not know when the world will end or when our life will end, we do know that our God accompanies us on our journey. Our relationships may fall on good and bad times alike, but we are always reminded that God will never leave us orphaned in the midst of those twists and turns. We are asked to focus on the necessary things in regard to our faith and our life. Even though our lives change, our commitment must, always and forever, be given to the God of Jesus Christ who calls us by name. We are invited through our baptism to participate in the life of the gospel.

Reflection Questions

- 1. When the Son of Man comes, will I be ready to look Him in the eye and be accountable for my life?
- 2. Am I living in a state of grace where I will be ready to meet God if He calls me today?
- 3. Does my life echo the Word I hear proclaimed on a Sunday?
- 4. What things are left unfinished in my relationship?
- 5. Where is Christ calling me to conversion and change?
- 6. Does my life witness to death or resurrection?
- 7. What is the main message in today's gospel for me?

Jesus uses nature to teach us about God's wisdom, about the passage of time, and about the end times. He reminds us of the fig tree whose leaves and tender branches announce the coming of summer. Jesus' analogy reminds us that through his ministry, God is near to all who hope in Him. Our earth is a great teacher — it teaches us that death is necessary for new life. The winter is harsh but it gives birth to new life in the spring. The liturgical seasons of our church do the same thing. As the Church journeys through the gospel, it recalls each defining moment of Jesus' ministry so that we can apply his life-giving message to our own lives. We repeat the cycles so that we can redefine and transform our lives. It is

often said that the only thing that is permanent is change itself. However, in today's Sacred Word, we are told that God's Word to us can never pass away. God's initiative can never be altered. God's love for each one of us will never change through the passages of time and space. If we are truly open to God's Word in all people and in all things, it is then we can discover these wonderful moments of grace!





Being Catholic

Is it Church or church?

Is there a difference? Why is it sometimes capitalized and other times not?

These questions arose at the recent CATHOLICISM session that discussed the Mystical Union of Christ and the Church. But it was soon understood that this was more than a semantic question. And the answer provided a deeper understanding of the important message that the capital C communicates.

Church is from the Greek, belonging to the Lord. Church is the worldwide body of Christians known as the community of disciples, the People of God. The Church is a living organism, all members who commune at the one Eucharist to become the Body of Christ

Of course this includes all the ordained clergy, but even more importantly, it includes all the laity who gather at each Eucharist. Together they are the Church.

Then what is church? Lowercase is used in phrases where the church is used in an institutional sense: *The pope said the church opposes abortion*, or when not part of the formal name of a building, congregation, or denomination: *a Catholic church*, *a church*.

One participant said, "It's a little scary to think that I am the Body of Christ, and it leads me to consider how I relate to others in this living Body."

You are invited to join fellow members of the Church who gather in the Seminar Room of the Claussen Center on **Thursday** for either the lunchtime brown bag session at 11:30 a.m. or the evening session at 7:00 p.m. to view the Documentary Film Series, **CATHOLICISM**, which displays the artistic and architectural splendor of the Catholic Faith interpreted in light of the mystery of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

This week we will explore the story of the Church, told in the examples of those men and women who dedicated their lives to knowing and serving Jesus Christ, "A Vast Company of Witnesses: The Communion of Saints." Bishop Barron gives consideration to some of the Church's greatest heroes and demonstrates how their extraordinary examples display both the passion and creative potential of the Catholic church. Highlighting Catharine Drexel, Therese of Lisieux, Edith Stein, and Mother Teresa of Calcutta, Bishop Barron tells the story of the Church as a vast company of witnesses who are called by Christ to be a Communion of Saints.




