The Department of Liturgy & Music presented the annual retelling of the Nativity with *The Christmas Story* Friday, December 18. With selections from the gospels of Matthew, Luke, and John, accompanied by reflections written by Fr. John, dozens of young people from the parish reenacted the wonder and beauty of the Incarnation of our Lord. Brigid Wallace portrayed Mary, while

Francesco D'Agostino portrayed Joseph. There was plenty of music, both new and classic, featuring several young soloists and instrumentalists, as well as ensembles, including our Adult Choir, the Contemporary Ensemble and the Children's Choir under the direction of Tom Oram, pastoral musician, and Ellie Roberts, choir director. Also featured for the first time was the newest children's choir from Our Holy Family School Support, a home-school coop hosted by St. John.

Manifest Destiny: Life Center and Programs Start in 2016

Happy 2016!

This is a very big year for Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church. Due to all of your generosity, we will be breaking ground on our new Life Center this year. Additionally, those gifts have helped us begin developing new programs that will help us all live out Our Holy Father's call for us to improve the world around us, beginning with our own community.

This gives us an opportunity now to engage all the members of our Parish Family with additional details on what else we are looking forward to accomplishing if those who have not pledged yet would prayerfully consider giving.

- Church Renovation: As a nearly 27-year-old building, our church needs significant renovation support. From clearing away the old skylight that has been covered for years to creating handicapped accessible options for our altar, our church has several priorities. Additionally, we want to implement some essential components to our church, like more traditional confessionals.
- PLC Renovation, including Ballroom: Our Ballroom and other parts of the Parish Life Center require significant work in order to reinvigorate their capabilities for our Parish Family and the community. From new floors to increase the danceable space since Big Band dances and Sock Hops have people dancing between the tables, to appropriate window coverings to allow for videos to be shown during the day, and our beautiful view to the outside in the evening, we have a significant investment to make.
- **Grounds:** We have several plans for the grounds of the campus to assist our Parish Family, including adding covered parking, especially for the handicapped spaces, so people can arrive and leave church without getting wet during the downpours so common here in Southwest Florida. This would also allow us to "go green" by giving us additional locations for solar panels, saving the church in the long run on our power bills.

These are just a few of the plans we have. Please help us make these and other improvements a reality. While we have begun the work our current blessings have allowed us to accomplish for the **Build Our Future**, **Serve Our Past** capital campaign, we still need our entire Parish Family to give in order to reach our additional goals. *Please see page 10 for a pledge card*. SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToLove — Love, Peace, and Mercy

Our Holy Father released his message for 2016, on the Celebration of the World Day of Peace, January 1. This past year has illustrated the desperate need around the world for not only the Catholic message of love, healing, and mercy, but our direct actions to directly combat hatred and fear with understanding, collaboration, and joy. Pope Francis calls on us to live our faith outwardly to create peace by way of love and mercy:

I want to invite the Church to pray and work so that every Christian will have a humble and compassionate heart, one capable of proclaiming and witnessing to mercy. It is my hope that all of us will learn to "forgive and give", to become more open "to those living on the outermost fringes of society - fringes which modern society itself creates", and to refuse to fall into "a humiliating indifference or a monotonous routine which prevents us from discovering what is new! Let us ward off destructive cynicism!"

There are many good reasons

to believe in mankind's capacity

to act together in solidarity and, on the basis of our interconnection and interdependence, to demonstrate concern for the more vulnerable of our brothers and sisters and for the protection of the common good. This attitude of mutual responsibility is rooted in our fundamental vocation to fraternity and a life in common. Personal dignity and interpersonal relationships are what constitute us as human beings whom God willed to create in his own image and likeness. As creatures endowed with inalienable dignity, we are related to all our brothers and sisters, for whom we are responsible and with whom we act in solidarity. Lacking this

relationship, we would be less human. We see, then, how indifference represents a menace to the human family. As we approach a new year, I would ask everyone to take

stock of this reality, in order to overcome indifference and to win peace...

This then is why "it is absolutely essential for the Church and for the credibility of her message that she herself live and testify to mercy. Her language and her gestures must transmit mercy, so as to touch the hearts of all people and inspire them once more to find the road that leads to

the Father. The Church's first truth is the love of Christ. The Church makes herself a servant of this love and mediates it to all people: a love that forgives and expresses itself in the gift of oneself. Consequently, wherever the Church is present, the mercy of the Father must be evident. In our parishes, communities, associations and movements, in a word, wherever there are Christians, everyone should find an oasis of mercy."

We too, then, are called to make compassion, love, mercy and solidarity a true way of life, a rule of conduct in our relationships with one another. – Pope Francis, Message for the Celebration of the XLIX World Day of Peace, 1/1/2016

Saint John the Evangelist is committed to this message and our Mission. 2016 is going to be such an exciting year of

The Fourth Gift of the Magi

oday we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. The word "Epiphany" literally translated means "manifestation of the Lord". We recall on this day how Jesus was revealed to the world through the visit of the magi. Much has been written about the arrival of the magi. We know that they came from countries from the east. Some say they were kings, others astrologers. It is more likely that they were astrologers because kings of that time could not simply enter the Kingdom of another monarch. It would have been considered an intrusion and a threat against the king. In the account of the gospel, we find that Herod was troubled at the announcement of the birth of the newborn

king of the Jews. He, after all, was the king. However, Herod is frightened by the fact that what these men had observed was the fulfillment of prophecy. His request made to the magi of sending word of where Jesus was so he could do Him homage was not a gesture to bless Jesus' presence in the world, but to destroy it! Listening to a dream, these men avoid Herod and return using another route.

The magi offer their homage to Jesus and offer their gifts. They also followed their dreams and learned to discern signs. These people recognized how creation heralded the coming of Christ by using a star and how it led them to the place where the Holy Family was staying. The magi not only offered gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, but also the gift of tolerance. The magi were strangers in a foreign land who sought out a newborn king so they could offer their homage and respect. These discerners recognized that the world could celebrate the positive events of cosmic time. The wise men were familiar with scripture – together they reflected on the Word and acted upon it. They welcomed the great sign in the cosmos in which was brought forth a great light.

They followed that light that led them to Christ and they freely offered their gifts. Most of all, the wise men, like Simeon, recognized Jesus for who he was – they just knew.

The Epiphany of the Lord is a reminder to us that the Christ event is for the whole world. It calls us to question how we welcome Christ into our own lives and how we give of ourselves. The gift of tolerance that the magi embraced also prompts countries of the world to celebrate the gift of diversity and to come to unity. The problem with our world is that people have a desire to make a particular faith absolute to the point that it excludes and even tries to destroy others. We only have to look at the Muslim extremists and the terrorist attacks in recent years to see how people use differences to create a chasm between one another. Within Christianity we also find fundamentalism which creates division rather than unity. The witness of the magi urges us to celebrate the gift of faith holding onto our similarities rather than our differences. As Catholics, we have been given the fullness of faith and we are asked to give witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ. The magisterium of

the Church recognizes that all faiths possess something of the spirit of

truth. We are called, therefore, to open and honest dialogue.

It is the amazing true story of a man who maintained his cultural identity as a Jew even after converting to Catholicim and joining the priesthood. Lustiger was


appointed Archbishop of Paris by Pope Jean Paul II and found a new platform to celebrate his dual identity as a Catholic Jew. When nuns plan to build a convent within the walls of Auschwitz, Lustiger may be forced at last to choose his side.

This haunting film is about reconciliation, the reconciliation of two faiths, Judaism and Christianity. "The Jewish Cardinal" reminds us of the possibility for goodness if there is respect, love and forgiveness between and among cultures and those of faith.

The First 500 Years: The Fathers, Councils, and Doctrines of the Early Church

The Fathers of the Church not only helped write the words to define what Catholics have believed for millennia, they debated about these doctrines to clarify them under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Their writings and thoughts on doctrine helped shape theology as it developed over the first few centuries of the Church. If you want to know why we believe what we believe, start with the Church. This course is more than apologetics — it is a comprehensive look at the formative years of the Catholic Church. Discover where our doctrines about Mary, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit came from and understand the influence of the great saints Cyril, Pope Leo, and Augustine.

In a series of eight video lectures, Father David Meconi, SJ, discusses the development of doctrines in the Early Church. He discusses:

- The Purpose and Persons of Patristic Thought
- · The Church Under Persecution
- · Constantine, Conversion, and Councils
- The Cappadocian Fathers and the Holy Spirit
- · Theotokos: Mary as the Mother of God
- · Saint Augustine and the Beauty of Confession
- · Pope Leo the Great and Humanity's Newness in Christ
- Monks, Missions, and the Rise of Christendom

This program provides more than a few simple explanations or brief answers to frequently asked questions. It goes deep into Church history and doctrine with real theological substance and perspective.

Michael Viola, Ph.D. will facilitate this program. He is from Boston, but Naples is his winter residence and he considers St. John his "spiritual home". Mike is currently enrolled in the graduate program for Spiritual Direction at the Aquinas Institute of Theology (AIT) in St. Louis. While in Naples, he is very active promoting contemplative prayer practices, in particular "Centering Prayer".

Vatican II: The Faithful Revolution at 50, with a special focus on the Role of the Laity

The recent feast of the Immaculate Conception marked the 50th anniversary of the formal closing of the Second Vatican Council. Over twenty-five hundred bishops, theological experts, other officials and observers from around the world gathered at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome to debate the future of Catholicism.

Unlike previous councils, Vatican II was not called to combat some threat to the church such as heresy or schism. Instead, it was called to respond positively to the challenges facing the modern world, to update those aspects of the church that could be updated, and to reach out to other Christians in a spirit of reconciliation.

By placing the laity as a major issue on the agenda, Pope John XXIII set Vatican II apart from all previous councils.

The 16 documents produced by that Council are the most important texts produced by the Catholic Church in the past 400 years; they shape virtually every aspect of church life today.

Shortly after his election, Pope Francis offered his support of the work of the Second Vatican Council, saying it was "a beautiful work of the Holy Spirit." He then went on to ask "Have we done everything the Holy Spirit was asking us to do during the Council?" The answer is "No," he said.

In the mid-1990s a documentary video series was produced to keep alive the vision and spirit of Vatican II. It was shown on PBS in 1998. This material has recently been re-released in DVD format and will provide the basis for this program.

There will be a special focus on the documents that are most applicable to the role of the laity, including the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, *Gaudium et Spes* and the Decree on the Apostolate of Lay People, *Apostolicam Actuositatem*.

Susan Hamilton and Jack Kindsvater will facilitate this program. Sue has been a leader in the Christian Family Movement for over 30 years. Both have Masters Degrees in Theology.






