St. John Welcomes 333 New Families to the Parish in 2015

We have been blessed in this past year to experience significant growth in our Parish Family. While many churches in this country are struggling with attendance and shrinking parish environments, St. John has had another banner year of engagement. To a Catholic Church, a "Family" can mean a single individual, including a widower. It means couples that have retired and may have children and/or grandchildren living elsewhere. Interestingly enough, of our 333 new Families, 160 of them (48%) have children under the age of 16 in their household. That is a very telling number here in Naples, a town that continues to have a strong seasonal presence, and now grows a full-time workforce and community as well. This multi-generational parish of St. John is a clear illustration of the Presentation of the Lord, where Jesus is brought to Jerusalem as a baby and is met by the elders Simeon and Anna, who recognize this baby as Christ. All of us are a family together.

Our Life Center, and the programs and initiatives of our Capital Campaign to **Build Our Future, Serve Our Past**, is also directly aligned with the growth in the area of all age groups. We want to be able to serve the experienced with Catholic Adult Organization wellness activities and social gatherings every day, especially for those dealing with loss in their life. We want to have the first, active Catholic Youth Organization in Florida, providing after-school support in a safe and protected environment, as well as sports programs that instill the virtues of our faith as much as athletic achievement.

These are just a few of the plans we have. Please help us make these and other improvements a reality. SACRAMENTS OF THE CHURCH

Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow — Parking Lot Changes for Safety

Over the past several months, St. John has been working hard to create a safe, engaging, warm, loving, and healing environment. From the moment you step onto our campus here, whether that is to attend Mass, for a community support group, or for a dance, you should feel the joyous and protective care that is the Catholic Church all around you. Some of these changes are not highly visible, like our new maintenance procedures and fire alerting systems. Some are organizational, like our enforcement of the Safe Environment to protect the young and old alike with appropriate background checks for those active in ministry. And some are highly visible. I would like to spotlight one of these visible ones, especially now with our entire Parish Family now in the area: Parking Lot Safety.

In past articles, I have requested that we all take into account the safety of our community when we park on our campus, especially during Mass and with major programs like Faith Formation. It is completely understandable that people want to park as close as possible to the church. Some of our Parish Family have challenges with mobility, and we want to prioritize their ability to celebrate the Sacraments with close parking. Additionally, we have placed signs in key locations, designating those locations for expectant mothers and several veterans. Other signs have been

posted to clearly show spots where we cannot have parking. Those throughways are essential for the safety of our entire Parish Family. We need to have clear access for fire trucks and ambulances, in case of a medical incident.


Recently, however, we have seen individuals parking in locations that limit those throughways and could cause significant issues in an emergency. In particular, we need to have no parking on the driveway between St. John and the Naples Park Elementary School next door. Additionally, the gravel areas in the parking lots are not for parking. Those

> are walkways for pedestrians, so they can safely walk to church. In order to ensure these spaces are used for walkways, we have installed new safety posts with solar lights. This will help those who are walking on campus during the early morning and later evening, lighting their way. It will also illustrate where people cannot park so we can keep those driveways clear and safe.

This past weekend, during the rain, we also noticed a backlog of parking issues during the Faith Formation drop-off and pickup times. The parking lot and

driveway around the Claussen Family Center does have clear signs for where parking can be used during those times, but we cannot have parents sitting in the driveway areas, blocking traffic. Please utilize the back parking lot for parking and walking your family into our facilities. The last thing we

#ToServe — Supporting Refugees With Shelter Box: February 6-7

There is no clearer focus for Catholics that Our Holy Father has laid out for us during this Year of Mercy than to perform good works to those in need around us, both locally and around the world. The St. John Parish Family lives out his call on a daily basis, from our Immokalee Missions Team, the Simple Gesture program, to the Ladies of Charity, Saint Vincent dePaul Society, and the Knights of Columbus, who all focus on the needy here in Naples and Collier County. Groups like the Jamaican Outreach Program and Pontifical Missions deal with issues internationally. One of the largest issues today that we must confront as Catholics is the refugee crisis, which encompasses everyone from those crossing into the United States from Latin and South America as well as African and Middle Eastern crises as people flee persecution for their religious beliefs and starvation from droughts. Pope Francis said this week:

Migrants are our brothers and sisters in search of a better life, far away from poverty, hunger, exploitation and the unjust distribution of the planet's resources which are meant to be equitably shared by all. Don't we all want a better, more decent and prosperous life to share with our loved ones?

... The Church stands at the side of all who work to defend each person's right to live with dignity, first and foremost by exercising the right not to emigrate and to contribute to the development of one's country of origin. This process should include, from the outset, the need to assist the countries which migrants and refugees leave. This will demonstrate that solidarity, cooperation, international interdependence and the equitable distribution of the earth's goods are essential for more decisive efforts, especially in areas where migration movements begin, to eliminate those imbalances which lead people, individually or collectively, to abandon their own natural and cultural environment. In any case, it is necessary to avert, if possible at the earliest stages, the flight of refugees and departures as a result of poverty, violence and persecution. – Pope Francis 2016 Message for World Day of Migrants and Refugees (http:// en.radiovaticana.va/news/2015/10/01/2016 message for world day of migrants and refugees/1176013)

In order to directly engage Pope Francis' call for supporting refugees in their country of origin and help them rebuild their lives, St. John is partnering with the Naples Council of World Affairs and Shelter Box, a non-profit that provides immediate shelter and supplies for displaced families around the world, in particular in urgent refugee locations, like Syria currently. We will have the Shelter Box, including the family tent, outside our Masses on February 6-7 to showcase this function and provide you an opportunity to learn more about their mission, which truly saves lives.







The Divine Drama Unfolds

s we recall the event of the wedding feast at Cana, we can almost imagine ourselves there. Weddings are usually beautiful affairs. Cana was no exception. The music was playing. People had gathered to honor the love of a couple. The dancing and festival were underway and the wine was flowing — so much so that they ran out of it! On the surface, the wedding feast of Cana sounds like any other wedding. However, for the author of John's gospel, Cana sets the stage for a divine drama to unfold. The mother of Jesus approaches her son to tell him there is no more wine. It appears that Mary wants her son to do something about the lack of wine, saving her hosts from embarrassment. We can ask ourselves whether or not something stirred in Mary that day telling her that it was Jesus' time to reveal the power of God within him. The interchange between Jesus and Mary seems to be quite intense. Jesus inquires why this embarrassment should be of concern to him. Mary knows that her intercession with her son would ultimately lead him to provide. This intensity culminates in the powerful sign of changing water into wine. The abundance of wine points to the generosity of God through the ministry of Jesus. Jesus changes the water, used for Jewish ceremonial washings, into wine. Using the fruit of the vine, Jesus reveals God's bounty, through himself, as the essential purification. The knowledge that God provides for us inspires us to lead holy and pure lives.

This same generosity is gifted to us in our Christian experience. Jesus' ministry, recorded in the gospels and the scriptures, reveals God's great love for humanity. The miracles, parables, and teachings communicate that our God wants to enter into deeper relationship with all of us. Mary's words are just as important to us today as they were 2000 years ago — we must do whatever Jesus tells us to do and follow his example of love and concern. God can bear fruit through us. We can experience God's generosity every time that we reach out to others in love. As Christians we must do what the Lord told us to do in the gospel and follow his example.

Our second reading points out that each of us have been given different gifts to express our love and concern. But it is the one Spirit and the one God who provides us with these realities. When we consider peoples of different Christian traditions and other faiths, we find that God's spirit of truth is immeasurable and quite abundant. We believe as Catholics that we have been given the fullness of God's truth through scripture and tradition, but we are called to recognize the

presence of God in those who are not of our faith and strive for unity. Likewise, we are asked to bestow God's generosity on those who do not share the same faith that we do.

Prayer

Lord, as we journey through life, make us more aware of your presence among us. May we never fail to see the signs of your love in the reality of those around us. Help us to cherish your divine spirit that exists in all people of different faiths, cultures and ways of life. As we encounter those around us, may we always be attentive to the voice of your Son. Amen.






