Others of you may have read the past 62 weeks of these articles I have been writing, presenting all the background, direction, and updates over this past year. We are so blessed to be able to say:

- We have met and exceeded our initial goal for the construction of the new Life Center. This building, which will house a set of constant activities for all ages, including food services, wellness programs, sports, social activities, music events and countless other functions. We have begun the construction planning. We expect to break ground this year.
- We have been granted the approval of Bishop Dewane to bring in NET Ministries (*http://www.netusa.org*) as full-time, programmatic support for our Youth Programs. This missionary group will enable us to go out where the youth of our community are and spread this joyous message while building a new focus for youth, our Catholic Youth Organization. Sacrament of Baptism

The Diocese requires that parents seeking baptism for their child attend a baptism preparation class. To schedule a baptism class, parents must be registered practicing members of St. John's for a minimum of two months. Classes are offered once a month and baptisms are celebrated on the first and third Sundays of each month after the 1:00 p.m. Mass. Please call the parish office to register for a class. Upon completion of the class and fulfillment of the godparent requirements, parents may schedule a baptism date.

Those who wish to be married in our parish must complete the Marriage Preparation Program. The Diocese requires a six month notice.

#ToKnow, #ToLove, #ToServe – St. John at Easter: A Chance for Spiritual Connection

Happy Easter to each and every one of you!

There is no doubt as you look around this church, or if you are lucky enough to have snagged a seat in the Ballroom, that the Catholic Church and our faith rooted in love, healing, and joy, is alive and well. From the excitement we all experienced with the Papal Visit this past fall, to the new programs and activities we are starting as part of the Life Center, to the over 50 people brought back to the church during our "24 Hours of Mercy", we are truly living out the mission of St. John, To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community. This Easter, we have a unique opportunity to take hold of the vision of Pope Francis, who sees our faith in action as something we should be living every single day in the world, not just here within the campus of St. John:

Evangelization is the task of the Church. The Church, as the agent of evangelization, is more than an organic and hierarchical institution; she is first and foremost a people advancing on its pilgrim way towards God. She is certainly a mystery rooted in the Trinity, yet she exists concretely in history as a people of pilgrims and evangelizers, transcending any institutional expression, however necessary. I would like to dwell briefly on this way of understanding the Church, whose ultimate foundation is in the free and gracious initiative of God...

Today, as the Church seeks to experience a profound missionary renewal, there is a kind of preaching which falls to each of us as a daily responsibility. It has to do with bringing the Gospel to the people we meet, whether they be our neighbours or complete strangers. This is the informal preaching which takes place in the middle of a conversation, something along the lines of what a missionary does when visiting a home. Being a disciple means being constantly ready to bring the love of Jesus to others, and this can happen unexpectedly and in any place: on the street, in a city square, during work, on a journey.

In this preaching, which is always respectful and gentle, the first step is personal dialogue, when the other person speaks and shares his or her joys, hopes

and concerns for loved ones, or so many other heartfelt needs. Only afterwards is it possible to bring up God's word, perhaps by reading a Bible verse or relating a story, but always keeping in mind the fundamental message: the personal love of God who became man, who gave himself up for us, who is living and who offers us his salvation and his friendship. This message has to be shared humbly as a testimony on the part of one who is always willing to learn, in the awareness that the message is so rich and so deep that it always exceeds our grasp. — Pope Francis, **EVANGELII GAUDIUM**

Our Holy Father is telling us that it is all of our responsibility to treat every person in the world with respect and love. It is through those joyous moments of encounter where we touch another person in small ways and sometimes completely transform their life. It can be as small an act as a smile in the grocery store as you pass by or as big as forgiving someone that wronged you a decade ago.

So, as you attempt to get out of our parking lot after Mass today, I hope you will keep in your heart that our faith is made to be lived every moment and take that joy and love out into the world. Jesus died and rose from the grave for the love of us all. *Love is patient, Love is kind.* – 1 Corinthians 13:4

Jamaica Outreach Program

Chronic Diseases Require Constant Treatment — Pocket Change Helps

Have you ever been in a position where your doctor tells you that you have a chronic condition that will require medications you will need to take for the rest of your life? In the United States there are programs in place that will help people who need assistance in buying medications. While

the Jamaican government does provide free medicines, the number of the government pharmacies that distribute them are few and not readily accessible to the St. Pius neighborhood.

For years now the JOP has been supplying the St. Pius medical clinic with medications for chronic conditions like asthma, high blood pressure, glaucoma, diabetes, etc. It is a budgeted item in our financial records but is seldom mentioned in our articles about the work we do in the parish of St. Pius X in Kingston. The time has come to feature that element in our

ongoing coverage of what the JOP does in Jamaica in Christ's name and yours.

Next weekend a Pocket Change collection will be held after all the Masses. The revenue from that collection will be spent on stocking the infirmary at St. Pius with medications that are

probably familiar to those of you who have chronic diseases which require constant treatment. These meds are costly necessities that are often missing in the health care of our Jamaican brothers and sisters in Christ. Last year \$20,000 worth of medicines were procured for the St. Pius infirmary. Our hope is that next weekend's Pocket Change Collection will help us meet that expenditure so that our commitment to St. Pius may continue in the area of medicinal aid. We thank you for what you do in His name, always.

Fr. Jim to Celebrate Silver Anniversary with a Special Mass




Fr. Jim was ordained a priest on June 8, 1991, for the Archdiocese of Denver.


The Gift of the Endless Possibilities

few years ago I went out to lunch with a friend of mine to a Chinese restaurant. Of course at the end of the meal we picked up our fortune cookies and mine read: What is in an empty box? Strange! My friend responded, "There's nothing in an empty box!" I jokingly told my friend that the optimist would probably say that there are *endless possibilities* in that empty box. The skeptics could draw many conclusions about the story of the tomb, but people of faith and hope can definitely open themselves to the endless possibilities witnessed at the Resurrection. The empty tomb does not just represent a vacant space, but realizes a promise of Jesus Christ – namely, that he would die and in three days rise again. The empty tomb releases us from sin and death and offers transformation to each one of us. The experience of resurrection celebrated today brings hope to all of us. Once we start to trust in the message of the Easter, it is then that we can be assured that we can rise above our experiences of pain and death. Many of us have faced the pain and reality of death as we stand at a grave of a loved one. The empty tomb reassures us of God's promise of life with him in heaven. The empty tomb reminds us that "the grave becomes the sign of hope that even promised us resurrection" (*Order of*

Christian Funerals).



The story of Easter brings us all together, reminding us that Jesus suffered greatly in order to understand us and the human condition. He died for our sins making it a once and for all sacrifice. Jesus' rising means that we too can rise above the immediate concerns and eventually to eternal life.

The Zeast of Divine Mercy Sunday, April 3, 2016 at 3:00 p.m.

Divine Mercy Sunday is originally based on the Catholic devotion to the Divine Mercy that Saint Faustina Kowalska reported as part of her encounter with Jesus and is associated with special promises from Jesus and indulgences issued by the Church.

This feast of Divine Mercy, as recorded in the diary of Saint Faustina, receives from Jesus himself the biggest promises of Grace related to the Devotion of Divine Mercy. In specific, Jesus states that the soul that goes to Sacramental Confession (the confession may take place some days before) and receives Holy Eucharistic Communion on that day shall obtain the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment. Additionally, the Roman Catholic Church grants a plenary indulgence (observing the usual rules) with the recitation of some simple prayers.

Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, reported visions and visitations from Jesus and conversations with Him. He asked her to paint the vision of his Merciful Divinity being poured from his sacred heart and specifically asked for a feast of Divine Mercy to be established on the first Sunday after Easter so mankind would take refuge in Him.

"I want the image solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter,



and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it." (Jesus' words, *Diary* 341)

On Mercy Sunday, April 10, 1991, two years prior to the beatification of Saint Faustina, Pope John Paul II spoke about Saint Faustina, relating her to his encyclical and emphasising her role in bringing the message of mercy to the world, "The words of the encyclical on Divine Mercy (Dives in Misericordia) are particularly close to us. They recall the figure of the Servant of God, Saint Faustina Kowalska. This simple woman religious particularly brought the Easter message of the merciful Christ closer to the whole world".

St. Faustina was beatified on April 18, 1993, and canonized on April 30, 2000. Pope John Paul II, who gave approval for Divine Mercy Sunday in 2000, died

just after the Vigil of Divine Mercy Mass in his room in 2005, was declared Blessed on Divine Mercy Sunday in 2011, and he was canonized Saint John Paul on Divine Mercy Sunday, April 27, 2014.




