This year’s annual Fortnight for Freedom runs from June 21, the vigil of the Feasts of St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More, to July 4, Independence Day. The two-week celebration will focus on the theme, “Freedom for Mission”.

The Fortnight for Freedom Opening Mass will be celebrated by Archbishop William Lori on Wednesday, June 21 at 7:00 p.m. at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Baltimore, Maryland.

July 3, 2017 Mass in Orlando, FL

For 2017, in lieu of a closing Mass, Archbishop William Lori

will celebrate a Fortnight Mass on July 3 for the Convocation of Catholic Leaders in Orlando, FL.

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops have stated that “we are called to follow Christ as missionary disciples by seeking the truth, serving others, and living our faith in all that we do”. They ask that we take some time during the Fortnight for Freedom to reflect, pray, and take action to defend our freedoms:

Spiritual Adoption Program Continues With Month Three

The Spiritual Adoption Program is heading into the third month. Your commitment is to pray a short prayer daily through Christmas.

MONTH 3 - Developing Baby – I can suck my thumb!”

Your spiritually adopted baby is quite active in the womb now – although his mother won’t feel him for another couple of months. If his mother’s womb had a window, you could watch your spiritually adopted baby squint, swallow and move his tongue. He can make a tight fist if you touch



his palm. He is breathing amniotic fluid which continues until birth, although he obtains the oxygen his body needs through the umbilical cord. The baby you are praying for weighs one ounce. Early this month – at just 9 weeks – he began to suck his thumb.

#ToKnow, #ToLove – Reimagining Hospitality at the Front

How many of you enjoy going to the DMV? Standing in line. Filling out forms. Talking over the desk at someone? Not too many of you, I would think. Unfortunately, it would seem that our Front Desk has been suffering from the DMV complex due to the physical layout and structure of the building. One of our plans this summer is to take a hard look at the layout of the Front Office so that the engaging moments of encounter with our faith can occur for those individuals and families who come to our campus. Our Front Desk volunteers already attempt to provide a warm welcome, but they are stuck behind a huge and imposing desk, which limits their connection to people. Some of the ideas we need to think through:

- 1. Physical Layout** – The Front Desk needs to be both welcoming and engaging while providing our Parish Family and visitors an opportunity for some private discussion. We will need to rework the layout with our architect and Construction Manager, Gates Construction, to determine the most efficient and effective structure to go from “DMV” to “Concierge”.
- 2. Communication** – The Front Desk is the first place people connect to our Parish environment, both over the phone and in person. It is the top priority of our Front Desk to make that connection and assist the person asking for help. We need to explore everything from self-service kiosks for people making reservations for a CAO or CYO events to greeters who can walk people around our campus to their activity or priest meeting.
- 3. New Location** – We will have a new desk in the Pulte Family Life Center, which will have different hours from our current Front Desk. While it may be more focused on the programs, events, and activities going on within the Life Center, it will naturally have to provide answers to similar questions and have the ability to connect with our liturgical and sacramental needs as well.

If you have had a positive or negative experience with our Front Desk in the past few years, I would love to hear about it. If you have any suggestions for improvements that will help us become the Concierge service you deserve when you engage our church, please contact me. Thank you so much for your support as we reimagine the Catholic Church experience here at St. John.

Editor's Note: *Every Catholic has a vocation, a calling from God on how to live our life in service to Him and others, whether it is a calling to the priesthood, religious life, single life, or marriage. Recently, the grandnephew and the granddaughter of St. John parishioners answered their calling. We would like you to hear their story.*

Mike Palmer, CSC, Is Ordained a Priest

Parishioners Tom and Marianne Middlemiss' grandnephew, Mike Palmer, was ordained to the priesthood at Notre Dame on April 22. Nearly 100 priests and two Bishops were in attendance.

"I first began considering the priesthood as a high school sophomore, when I heard my uncle telling our family that he was deployed in Iraq for an entire year without ever seeing a Catholic priest. I knew I wanted to give my life in service to the Lord, and after much discernment, I joined the seminary for The Congregation of Holy Cross in 2007 (this is the religious order that founded and still runs Notre Dame)," said Fr. Mike.

He graduated from Notre Dame while living at Moreau Seminary, and Fr. Mike completed his Master of Divinity degree in 2016.

Fr. Mike professed final vows with Holy Cross in August 2016, and then he was assigned to Christ the King Parish in South Bend, IN as a deacon. He was ordained to the priesthood on April 22, 2017, and will continue to serve at Christ the King for at least another year.

"I was drawn to the priesthood and Holy Cross because of the great joy I saw in these men who served God's people. Holy Cross priests and brothers serve in parishes, schools, and missions all over the world, and they are a wonderful example of how God's mercy and love are not bound by physical borders," said Fr. Mike. "If you think that God may be calling you to be a priest, don't hesitate to give it some serious thought; you never know how the Lord might surprise you!"

Fr. Mike hopes to go on active duty in three years to serve our troops as a Catholic Chaplain in the United States Army.



Sara Quinlan Responds to Teach for America for Two Years

Parishioner Bob Hill's granddaughter, Sara Hill Quinlan, graduated from Loyola University Chicago on May 11, 2017. She studied Business Management and Spanish. Sara is named after her grandmother, Sara Hill, who died April 23, 2015.

In Jesuit tradition, Sara will give the next two years of her life to Teach for America in rural Louisiana.

"I am honored to be a corps member of Teach for America (TFA) Greater New Orleans. I am motivated and passionate about being a part of a movement, a part of a mission driven, values based experience. I am excited to be a part of a movement that is going to disrupt educational inequities. Access to a quality education should be a right and not a



privilege. Through TFA's perseverance and dedication, we can begin to break down these social injustices to provide all students with an education they deserve," said Sara.

Teach for America is an organization founded on change-makers. They believe in something larger than themselves.

"I am honored to become a 2017 Teach for America Corps Member," said Sara.

"The prodding of the Jesuit Mission and Fr. John's recent plea for vocations helped to reinforce Sara's commitment to 'giving back'. 

The Crimson Light – An Ongoing Journey

*A*s we gather to celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, both the scriptures and remembrances of Eucharistic processions call us to focus on our belief in the real presence of Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist. As children, many of us were taught whenever you saw the crimson light flickering in the sanctuary of the church that Christ was present, living in the tabernacle. The crimson light was a true reminder that Christ remains with us in the real presence always. Such is God's generosity that he

continues to feed us through the passage of time. God was present to the people of Israel who fled captivity in Egypt only to find themselves in desert lands, and he continues to journey with us offering us a food that will last forever.

Jesus reminds us today that He is the Bread of Life. From the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper through his death and resurrection, Jesus offers us a new covenant in his blood. Such a covenant cannot be broken for it is a once and for all sacrifice. When we celebrate the mass we participate in the life, death, and resurrection of Christ. Our participation gives meaning to our journey of faith that culminates in eternal life. Every time that we celebrate the Eucharistic liturgy of the Church, God speaks to us in his Sacred Word and offers Himself wholly to each one of us. Transubstantiation is one of the mysteries of our faith that allows us to be *physically touched by the presence of the living God*. As food is necessary for life, the Holy Eucharist is necessary for our faith. Through the gift of the Mass we experience the real presence of Jesus and we are truly fed by this heavenly food.

Reflection Questions

1. What do you think Jesus means when he says that he is the living bread?
2. How does his living bread bring you eternal life?
3. What do you think Jesus was referring to when he says, "Unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you"?
4. How is the Mass a living testament of today's gospel?
5. In what ways does the Mass offer you nourishment?
6. Name the various ways in which Jesus is present in your experience

As we read through the gospels we often find Jesus in the midst of situations of sin and division. Jesus continually brings healing to the sick, calm to the storm, comfort to the disturbed, and disturbance to the comfortable. Jesus' fundamental option is to bring others to an encounter of the divine. He leads people into the heart of the Father where mercy and transformation can be found. And so it is with the sacraments of the Church, especially the Eucharist. Jesus is truly present in the sacrament of the Eucharist. The consecrated host is not merely a symbol to remind us of events that secured our salvation. The consecrated host is salvation made tangible — God's real gift of himself, where He is made known in the breaking of the bread. If we have faith in this tenet of our Catholic faith and allow the grace of this sacrament to penetrate our heart, mind, and soul, Jesus will continue to heal us, bring calm to the storms of our lives, give comfort in the painful experiences that come our way, and *challenge us to become what we receive*. Jesus is the living Bread that has come down from heaven. *The challenge is that our lives now become living bread for others.*

We, too, are experiencing the “solidarity of God” with man, a solidarity that never runs out, a solidarity that never ceases to amaze us: God draws near to us; in the sacrifice of the Cross He lowers Himself, entering into the darkness of death in order to give us His life, which overcomes evil, selfishness, death.

Jesus...gives Himself to us in the Eucharist, shares our same journey – indeed, He becomes food, real food that sustains our life even at times when the going is rough, when obstacles slow down our steps. The Lord in the Eucharist makes us follow His path, that of service, of sharing, of giving – and what little we have, what little we are, if shared, becomes wealth, because the power of God, which is that of love, descends into our poverty to transform it.

Let us ask ourselves this evening, adoring the Christ truly present in the Eucharist: do I let myself be transformed by Him? Do I let the Lord who gives Himself to me, guide me to come out more and more from my little fence, to get out and be not afraid to give, to share, to love Him and others?

Discipleship, communion and sharing. Let us pray that participation in the Eucharist move us always to follow the Lord every day, to be instruments of communion, to share with Him and with our neighbor who we are. Then our lives will be truly fruitful. Amen.”

Has a friend or family member ever asked you about becoming Catholic, or returning to the Church?

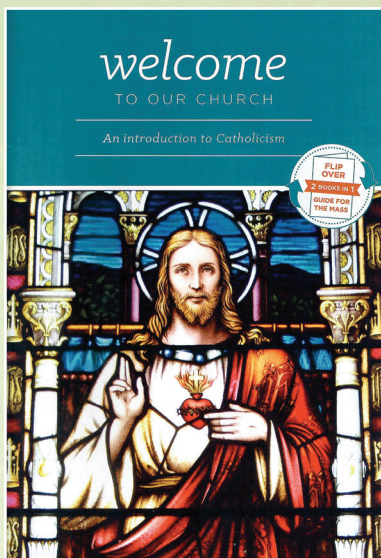
Have you ever considered extending an invitation to someone you think may be open to considering what it means to be Catholic?

If you feel inadequately prepared to answer their questions, help is available in the form of a little booklet, *Welcome to our Church*.

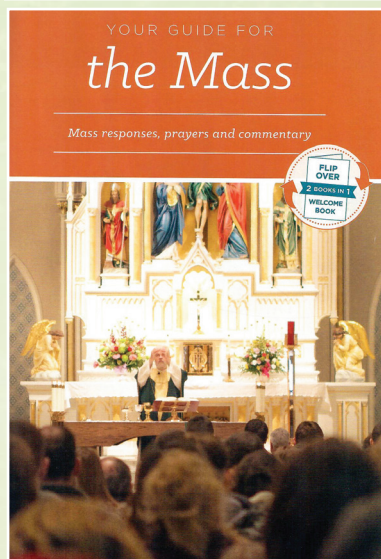
