As a former teacher, I'd like to provide my students with more resources. The following is an annotated commentary on the resources that we will make available to you.

Readings for **FIRST DAY**, you will five files:

The word document is Pope Francis offers some reflections on doing lent.

The Keating document is an extended explanation of the process of doing the centering prayer.

Fr. Richard J. Hauser, SJ is a colleague at Creighton University and one of my best friends. *Give Comfort to my People*, is his narrative of how to pray.

Just last week, on February 8th, Cardinal Blasé Cupich published a wonderful six point exclamation of *Amoris Laetitia*. Pope Francis' document on the joy of love that happens in families.

The PDF labeled *Amoris Laetitia*, Pope Francis is 151 pages. Often these documents are difficult to read on the computer. You might order a copy of this document in book form, entitled *The Joy of Love*, on love in the family, published by Paulist press.

Readins for **Day TWO** are these:

An article on suffering by my friend, Fr. Richard J. Hauser, SJ.

The article by Abbot Keating gives a more theological explanation of what centering prayer does and it explains suffering in ways that I surely could not.

The readings for **Day Three** again include two by my colleagues: Fr. Richard J. Hauser, SJ. And Fr. Dennis Hamm, SJ:

Finding God's will by Fr. Dick Hauser outlines a method of journaling and examining one's options when seeking God's will in any life decision.

The article by Fr. Dennis Hamm, rummaging through your day, outlines a way of doing the daily examine of conscious that recommended by St. Ignatius.

Racism it Is a major problem in America. These documents could provide in examination of our conscience. The talks by father Massengale are our about an hour long..

The racial justice word document has a series of links which is an excellent examination of conscience reviewing our own racial prejudice. My favorite is the one in Washington, DC.
