The Joy of Love: Making it a Reality Here at St. John

A blessed and joyous Palm Sunday to all of you! Some of you are regulars, and you have read my musings in the past about our Parish Family of Saint John the Evangelist. Others of you may be visiting family and friends down here in sunny Florida, escaping the colder climates up North. Still others of you may be here for the first time, dipping your toe into the faith called Catholicism. No matter where you are on your life journey, you are welcome here at our church.

Our Holy Father Pope Francis has given the Catholic Church a wonderful blueprint for how we are supposed to inject our faith into the world with our positive actions. It is called AMORIS LAETITIA, or The Joy of Love. It is a sweeping document, and it touches on many of the core facets of how we bridge the difficulties in our lives with the joy of a deep personal relationship with Jesus, who asked us all to love God and each other as we would want to be loved. The key word we use here at St. John is: accompaniment. Cardinal Wuerl, who has put together a "Pastoral Plan to Implement AMORIS LAETITIA" for Washington, DC, provides a great definition of accompaniment:

The ministry of accompaniment is a collaborative effort of priests and laity who understand themselves to be missionary disciples, who experience the love of the Lord in their encounter with him and who seek to share it with others. Pope Francis invites all of us to this practice of accompaniment, noting, "In addition to the small circle of the couple and their children, there is the larger family, which cannot be overlooked ... Friends and other families are part of this larger family, as well as communities of families who support one another in their difficulties, their social commitments, and their faith" (AL, 196).

But what does that mean for us? Here at St. John, we focus on caring for each other without judging. We help each other while laughing or crying together because we are all hurting, or distracted from what is important, or feeling anonymous. We all need each other's love:

Some people have focused much of the attention of Amoris Laetitia on people in so-called "irregular situations" as divorce and remarriage. An honest, spiritual assessment of marital and family life recognizes that it could be said that each one of us is in an "irregular situation" when it comes to our relationship with true God. Each of us is a sinner in need of wholeness who has fallen short of the great plan God has laid out for us. Yet we are people of unending hope because our own shortcomings are not the end of the story. It is through the encounter with Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit that we are reconciled to God and to one another. Each of us is in need of this healing, and so we journey together as brothers and sisters united in our common need for the love and mercy of God that heals every broken human heart. - Cardinal Wuerl

And it is our responsibility as a Parish Family to welcome and accompany every single person who comes to our doors, and to go out into the community and provide that same hospitality:

Often the first person who gives witness to the joy of the Gospel is not the pastor, but the parish staff member or volunteer who answers the phone call of an engaged couple, welcomes a family into religious education or the Catholic school, or who greets a couple before Mass. The fundamental attitude of an accompanying community is hospitality - in particular, that offered by the parish office. Pope Francis points out in a very practical way that the parish office should be prepared to deal helpfully and sensitively with family needs and be able to make referrals, when necessary, to those who can help. - Cardinal Wuerl

So, once again, welcome! We look forward to walking on this journey together with you.

God of endless love, ever caring, ever strong, always present, always just: You gave your only Son to save us by his blood on the cross.



The Passion of the Christ is a great movie that depicts the final 12 hours of Jesus Christ in Jerusalem during his crucifixion. The term passion originates from Latin, where it means suffering and pain. However, Christian theology broadened it to include the love of Christ for mankind. Now, the passion of Christ means that he willingly suffered and died for us. *The Passion of the Christ* begins from the time Judas betrayed Jesus Christ, His condemnation by the Pharisees, and His appearance before Pontius Pilate.

The movie runs for 126 minutes and up to 100 minutes of it concern specifically with details of how lesus Christ was tortured before He died. Some describe it as the most violent film ever created (graphic and not for children). Mel Gibson, who created the film, designed the film's graphics to clearly show the price Jesus Christ had to paid for our sins. 
Mourning Loss of a Patron of SJE: Bill Pulte

Triumphal Entry to Suffering and Death

oday, in union with the Church throughout the world, we contemplate the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and the events that led to His saving death. As the disciples of Jesus followed him into the holy city, they must have been amazed and awestruck at the welcome they witnessed. They probably thought that, at last, the world understood what they had come to believe — that Jesus is Messiah, for "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" Jesus' entry was an answer to prayer — the people waved their palm branches as if

welcoming their new king. It is hard to believe that within one week this would all change. How could the crowd acclaim Jesus as Messiah on the Sunday and then shout for his death on that infamous Good Friday?

During Holy Week, we witness the high points and the low points of humanity. On Palm Sunday, the people who welcomed Jesus managed to go beneath the surface and connect with their deeper self. Their faith held out the hope that had arrived to transform them. As the week progressed, greed entered the heart of one man, Judas. In the upper room, as Jesus took the Unleavened Bread and the Cup, he held in his hands the new covenant in his blood. In the gesture of the washing of the feet, Jesus taught his disciples humility and service. In this selfless act, God himself stoops low to wash the feet of a sinful people whom he instructs to follow him in selfless acts of love. Jesus also embraced the fears of the disciples and the fragility of their discipleship. He told them, "Do not let your hearts be troubled; have faith in God, have faith also in me." Jesus points out to his disciples that he was going to prepare the way for them, creating an eternal dwelling. After the meal, pride, arrogance, and narrow-mindedness took hold of the religious leaders to the point of fanaticism, calling for Jesus' death. These men believed

themselves to be religious and holy, yet their instincts motivated them to incite the crowds against the Healing Christ. The insults, mockery, and brutality inflicted upon Jesus demonstrated well how religious radicalism has deathly consequences.

As we begin this Holy Week, we enter into a human story that has divine implications. Most of us will be able to identify with the motivations and emotions of each person involved in the great events of the week in which Jesus suffered and died. We are reminded this week that even though we may deny the Lord, fail to give witness, or show our full commitment to God, that the greatest of Saints have been there too. Just as the great Saints were called to transformation in the resurrection, where they renewed their commitment and gave witness to the death, so too are we called to that same transformation. This week calls to mind God's sacrifice and commitment to us. God answered the prayers of those who longed for the Messiah to liberate them and save them. Our prayers are answered in the holy events of what took place centuries ago. As we journey through these days, let us show a similar commitment.

Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! We welcome you, Lord, into our lives. We are constantly blessed by your eternal presence. May we live the dream that you have for us. Let the prayers we make reflect your will, not ours. Help us to understand the nature of discipleship and give witness to you in all circumstances. Whenever we fail or lose sight of what is important, enable us to stand firmly on our feet and move forward in your ways. Lord Jesus, we thank you for your sacrifice, we acknowledge our sin, and give our lives completely to you. Amen

Contemporary Wisdom

"The tragedy of the passion brings to fulfillment our own life and the whole of human history. We can't let Holy Week examine how much we really want to live as Christians, to be just a kind of commemoration. It means contemplating the mystery of Jesus Christ as something which continues to work in our souls. The Christian is obliged to be alter Christus, ipse Christus: another Christ, Christ himself.

Through baptism all of us have been made priests of our lives, "to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through in the priestly mission that he has given every single one of Jesus Christ." Everything we do can be an expression of our obedience to God's will and so perpetuate the mission of the Godman.

Once we realize this, we are immediately reminded of our wretchedness and our personal failings. But they should not dishearten us; we should not become pessimistic and put our ideals aside. Our Lord is calling us, in our present state, to share his life and make an effort to be holy. Holiness can sound like an empty word. Too many people think it is unattainable, something to do with ascetical theology — but not a real goal for them, a living reality. The first Christians didn't think that way. They often used the word "saints" to describe each other in a very natural manner: "greetings to all the saints;" "my greetings to every one of the saints in Jesus Christ."

Take a look now at Calvary. Jesus has died and there is as

yet no sign of his glorious triumph. It is a good time to be holy. Here is our chance to react against our weaknesses with an act of faith. We can trust in God and resolve to put love into the things we do each day. The experience of sin should lead us to sorrow. We should make a more mature and deeper decision to be faithful and truly identify ourselves with Christ, persevering, no matter what it costs, his disciples. That mission should spur us on to be the salt and light of the world."

The Pivotal Players Continues Wednesday, March 28th Featuring The Mystic, St. Catherine of Siena



St. Catherine of Siena witnesses to a higher world beyond the material. Though the fourteenth century mystic never studied theology and never learned how to read or write, her life constitutes a powerful challenge to the flattened-out secularism of our time. In a particularly vivid way, St. Catherine of Siena witnessed to the existence of a dimension beyond the physical world.

Bishop Barron recounts this story about St. Catherine:

"When she was a girl of six or seven, Catherine had an experience that changed her forever and provided the interpretive key for much of what she would say and do in the course of her life... While returning home from a cousin's house and standing in the middle of a busy thoroughfare, Catherine suddenly saw in the sky a vision of Christ surrounded by other saints and apostles."

Come to the Rome Room on Wednesday, March 28th at 5:30 p.m. to learn the details of her vision and explore the places where she ministered and prayed.

Celebrating the Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday

The Triduum celebrations begin with evening Mass on Maundy **Thursday**, which recalls the Last Supper and Christ's institution of the Eucharist.

On Good **Friday**, after the reading of the passion according to St. John, special prayers for the whole world, and the adoration of the cross, comes the Mass of the Presanctified, in which there is no consecration, but hosts already consecrated are distributed.

After sunset on Holy **Saturday**, the Easter Vigil celebrates Christ's resurrection and our dying and rising with him in baptism. A service of light and the blessing of the paschal candle introduce a series of scriptural readings that recapitulate the whole history of salvation from creation to the resurrection. The catechumens are baptized, they and the candidates are confirmed, and the whole community renews its baptismal promises before the Eucharist is celebrated. (c.f. A Concise Dictionary of Theology)

You are invited to participate in as many liturgical celebrations of the Easter Triduum (three days) as possible. See the complete schedule on page 19 of this Bulletin.

On Thursday Morning, Women of the Word View the Shroud



This is a stunning, compelling story of the burial cloth that, based on the evidence presented, could be nothing but that of our Lord Jesus Christ. This film tells the story of the Shroud for our modern age of high technology and shows the image of the Man on the Shroud as never before seen. This film does not shrink from examining the religious significance of what has become the single most studied article in history. Written by Ian Wilson, this was the official film for the 2010 Exposition of the Shroud.
