"Rejoice and Be Glad:" Holiness in Today's World



Our Holy Father Pope Francis has added another tool for our Parish Family to engage the world with our love, our joy, and our mercy: The Apostolic Exhortation Guadete et Exsultate, or Rejoice and Be Glad, on the Call to Holiness in Today's World. He states himself that, "[m] y modest goal is to repropose the call to holiness in a practical way for our own time, with all its risks, challenges and opportunities." What it means for us is to confirm our focus on joyously engaging and accompanying each other and the whole community around us with hospitality and inclusion. That is how we find holiness, even within our less-thanperfect lives. It is not that we have to have all the answers, or believe all the answers lie within doctrine or law. Love, grace, and mercy should be our driving forces as a people and will help us reach out and even touch holiness, even in our small gestures (like our Simple Gesture Program).

I hope you take the time to read and prayerfully contemplate this amazing call

Pope Francis is making for all of us. He calls for us to live with patience, joy, passion, and a sense of humor in our community, not set apart from others. Our hospitality as a church is a core mission "To Love" all and commune with all. Here are a few of my favorite sections of this Exhortation:

14. To be holy does not require being a bishop, a priest, or a religious. We are frequently tempted to think that holiness is only for those who can withdraw from ordinary affairs to spend much time in prayer. That is not the case. We are all called to be holy by living our lives with love and by bearing witness in everything we do, wherever we find ourselves. Are you called to the consecrated life? Be holy by living out your commitment with joy. Are you married? Be holy by loving and caring for your husband or wife, as Christ does for the Church. Do you work for a living? Be holy by laboring with integrity and skill in the service of your brothers and sisters. Are you a parent or grandparent? Be holy by patiently teaching the little ones how to follow Jesus. Are you in a position of authority? Be holy by working for the common good and renouncing personal

16. This holiness to which the Lord calls you will grow through small gestures. Here is an example: a woman goes shopping, she meets a neighbor, and they begin to speak, and the gossip starts. But she says in her heart: "No, I will not speak badly of anyone."

This is a step forward in holiness. Later, at home, one of her children wants to talk to her about his hopes and dreams, and even though she is tired, she sits down and listens with patience and love. That is another sacrifice that brings holiness. Later she experiences some anxiety, but recalling the love of the Virgin Mary, she takes her rosary and prays with faith. Yet another path of holiness. Later still, she goes out onto the street, encounters a poor person, and stops to say a kind word to him. One more step.

22. To recognize the word that the Lord wishes to speak to us through one of his saints, we do not need to get caught up in details, for there we might also encounter mistakes and failures. Not everything a saint says is completely faithful to the Gospel; not everything he or she does is authentic or perfect. What we need to contemplate is the totality of their life, their entire journey of growth in holiness, the reflection of Jesus Christ that emerges when we grasp their overall meaning as a person.

26. It is not healthy to love silence while fleeing interaction with others, to want peace and quiet while avoiding activity, to seek prayer while disdaining service.

Everything can be accepted and integrated into our life in this world, and become a part of our path to holiness. We are called

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to be contemplatives even in the midst of action, and to grow in holiness by responsibly and generously carrying out our proper mission.

29. This does not mean ignoring the need for moments of quiet, solitude, and silence before God. Quite the contrary. The presence of constantly new gadgets, the excitement of travel and an endless array of consumer goods at times leave no room for God's voice to be heard. We are overwhelmed by words, by superficial pleasures and by an increasing din, filled not by joy but rather by the discontent of those whose lives have lost meaning. How can we fail to realize the need to stop this rat race and to recover the personal space needed to carry on a heartfelt dialogue with God? Finding that space may prove painful but it is always fruitful. Sooner or later, we have to face our true selves and let the Lord enter. This may not happen unless "we see ourselves staring into the abyss of a frightful temptation, or have the dizzying sensation of standing on the precipice of utter despair, or find ourselves completely alone and abandoned." In such situations, we find the deepest motivation for living fully our commitment to our work.

41. When somebody has an answer for every question, it is a sign that they are not on the right road. They may well be false prophets, who use religion for their own purposes, to promote their own psychological or intellectual theories. God infinitely transcends us; he is full of surprises. We are not the ones to determine when and how we will encounter him; the exact times and places of that encounter are not up to us. Someone who wants everything to be clear and sure presumes to control God's transcendence.

57. Still, some Christians insist on taking another path, that of justification by their own efforts, the worship of the human will and their own abilities. The result is a self-centred and elitist complacency, bereft of true love. This finds expression in a variety of apparently unconnected ways of thinking and acting: an obsession with the law, an absorption with social and political advantages, a punctilious concern for the Church's liturgy, doctrine, and prestige, a vanity about the ability to manage practical matters, and an excessive concern with programs of self-help and personal fulfilment. Some Christians spend their time and energy on these things, rather than letting themselves be led by the Spirit in the way of love, rather than being passionate about communicating the beauty and the joy of the Gospel and seeking out the lost among the immense crowds that thirst for Christ.

61. In other words, amid the thicket of precepts and prescriptions, Jesus clears a way to seeing two faces, that of the Father and that of our brother. He does not give us two more formulas or two more commands. He gives us two faces, or better yet, one alone: the face

of God reflected in so many other faces. For in every one of our brothers and sisters, especially the least, the most vulnerable, the defenseless and those in need, God's very image is found. Indeed, with the scraps of this frail humanity, the Lord will shape his final work of art. For "what endures, what has value in life, what riches do not disappear? Surely these two: the Lord and our neighbor. These two riches do not disappear!"

101. The other harmful ideological error is found in those who find suspect the social engagement of others, seeing it as superficial, worldly, secular, materialist, communist, or populist. Or they relativize it, as if there are other more important matters, or the only thing that counts is one particular ethical issue or cause that they themselves defend. Our defense of the innocent unborn, for example, needs to be clear, firm, and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development. Equally sacred, however, are the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery, and every form of rejection. We cannot uphold an ideal of holiness that would ignore injustice in a world where some revel, spend with abandon and live only for the latest consumer goods, even as others look on from afar, living their entire lives in abject poverty.

115. Christians, too, can be caught up in networks of verbal violence through the internet and the various forums of digital communication. Even in Catholic media, limits can be overstepped, defamation and slander can become commonplace, and all ethical standards and respect for the good name of others can be abandoned. The result is a dangerous dichotomy, since things can be said there that would be unacceptable in public discourse, and people look to compensate for their own discontent by lashing out at others. It is striking that at times, in claiming to uphold the other commandments, they completely ignore the eighth, which forbids bearing false witness or lying, and ruthlessly vilify others. Here we see how the unguarded tongue, set on fire by hell, sets all things ablaze (cf. Jas 3:6).

119. Here I am not speaking only about stark situations of martyrdom, but about the daily humiliations of those who keep silent to save their families, who prefer to praise others rather than boast about themselves, or who choose the less welcome tasks, at times even choosing to bear an injustice so as to offer it to the Lord. "If when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval" (1 Pet 2:20). This does not mean walking around with eyes lowered, not saying a word and fleeing the company of others. At times, precisely because someone is free of selfishness, he or she can dare to disagree gently, to demand justice, or to defend the weak before the powerful, even if it may harm his or her reputation.

128. This is not the joy held out by today's individualistic and consumerist culture. Consumerism only bloats the heart. It can offer occasional and passing pleasures, but not joy. Here I am speaking of a joy lived in communion, which shares and is shared, since "there is more happiness in giving than in receiving" (Acts 20:35) and "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:7). Fraternal love increases our capacity for joy, since it makes us capable of rejoicing

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in the good of others: "Rejoice with those who rejoice" (Rom 12:15). "We rejoice when we are weak and you are strong" (2 Cor 13:9). On the other hand, when we "focus primarily on our own needs, we condemn ourselves to a joyless existence."

131. Look at Jesus. His deep compassion reached out to others. It did not make him hesitant, timid, or self-conscious, as often happens with us. Quite the opposite. His compassion made him go out actively to preach and to send others on a mission of healing and liberation. Let us acknowledge our weakness, but allow Jesus to lay hold of it and send us, too, on mission. We are weak, yet we hold a treasure that can enlarge us and make those who receive it better and happier. Boldness and apostolic courage are an essential part of mission.

137. Complacency is seductive; it tells us that there is no point in trying to change things, that there is nothing we can do, because this is the way things have always been, and yet we always manage to survive. By force of habit we no longer stand up to evil. We "let things be," or as others have decided they ought to be. Yet let us allow the Lord to rouse us from our torpor, to free us from our inertia. Let us rethink our usual way of doing things; let us open our eyes and ears, and above all our hearts, so as not to be complacent about things as they are, but unsettled by the living and effective word of the risen Lord.

140. When we live apart from others, it is very difficult to fight against concupiscence, the snares and temptations of the devil, and the selfishness of the world. Bombarded as we are by so many enticements, we can grow too isolated, lose our sense of reality and inner clarity, and easily succumb.

143. Such experiences, however, are neither the most frequent nor the most important. The common life, whether in the family, the parish, the religious community or any other, is made up of small everyday things. This was true of the holy community formed by Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, which reflected in an exemplary way the beauty of the Trinitarian communion. It was also true of the life that Jesus shared with his disciples and with ordinary people.

144. Let us not forget that Jesus asked his disciples to pay attention to details.

The little detail that wine was running out at a party. The little detail that one sheep was missing. The little detail of noticing the widow who offered her two small coins. The little detail of having spare oil for the lamps, should the bridegroom delay. The little detail of asking the disciples how many loaves of bread they had. The little detail of having a fire burning and a fish cooking as he waited for the disciples at daybreak.

161. Hence, we should not think of the devil as a myth, a representation, a symbol, a figure of speech, or an idea.[121] This mistake would lead us to let down our guard, to grow careless and end up more vulnerable. The devil does not need to possess us. He poisons us with the venom of hatred, desolation, envy, and vice. When we let down our guard, he takes advantage of it to destroy our lives, our families and our communities. "Like a roaring lion, he prowls around, looking for someone to devour" (1 Pet5:8).

167. The gift of discernment has become all the more necessary today, since contemporary life offers immense possibilities for action and distraction, and the world presents all of them as valid and good. All of us, but especially the young, are immersed in a culture of zapping. We can navigate simultaneously on two or more screens and interact at the same time with two or three virtual scenarios. Without the wisdom of discernment, we can easily become prey to every passing trend.

173. Naturally, this attitude of listening entails obedience to the Gospel as the ultimate standard, but also to the Magisterium that guards it, as we seek to find in the treasury of the Church whatever is most fruitful for the "today" of salvation. It is not a matter of applying rules or repeating what was done in the past, since the same solutions are not valid in all circumstances and what was useful in one context may not prove so in another. The discernment of spirits liberates us from rigidity, which has no place before the perennial "today" of the risen Lord. The Spirit alone can penetrate what is obscure and hidden in every situation, and grasp its every nuance, so that the newness of the Gospel can emerge in another light.

Slow but Steady Progress in Ballroom



The palladium walls must be formed in the shop, which requires detailed drawings and measurements. All of this effort has meant that we have been forced to cancel events and activities through to and into May at this point. We are doing everything possible to get this room ready for its new role as our primary church during the summer months. It will be quite extraordinary when it is completed.

I continue to appreciate your patience and understanding as we improve our campus and repair the damage from Hurricane Irma.

s we journey through the Season of Easter, we hear various accounts of life for the post resurrection Christian in Acts of the Apostles. We are given an insight into how the early Church began to organize itself and hear about the bold witness of the apostles. In today's first reading, Peter stands before the leaders of the people after healing a man. He points out fearlessly how

the power of the Risen Christ had healed this man. Peter acclaims Jesus as the stone rejected by the builders, but the cornerstone of salvation. Peter puts his life on the line by confronting the leaders with the wisdom of the Shepherd. Peter knew what it meant to share in the work of the Shepherd. As a true Shepherd, he was willing to lay down his life for the sheep, that is, for the people he was called to serve.

Today's gospel speaks to the heart of God's generosity. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who is willing to lay down His life for God's people. He is not half committed, but wholly committed to His mission and ministry. This is bore out upon Calvary, as He took on our sins and that of the whole world. When Jesus spoke to His listeners, He was telling them that He was sent to lead them. His message is not to the people of Israel alone, but to the whole world. He tells us: "There will be one flock, one shepherd." Jesus Christ's mission is to gather us into the loving embrace of the Father and to guide us in the way of peace and truth. In this way, we can confidently say that we are children of God.

Jesus continues to guide the Church today. Sometimes personalities get in the way of the message, but overall, the Church stands the test of time. Christ is still the chief Shepherd of the Church. He continues to call us all by the virtue of our baptism, leading us to the truth. The wisdom of Jesus Christ constantly directs us toward right relationships with ourselves, others, and God. The way of Christ in the gospel inspires us to transform what is broken and to seek out what is lost. If there are situations in our lives that do not embrace the reality of Jesus, then we have an opportunity to change that situation. Jesus Christ can accomplish His work in us if we allow His wisdom to penetrate our consciousness. Surrendering to the truth of Christ in our experience allows us to enable Jesus to work through us. Just as Jesus is committed a hundred percent to the message He proclaimed, we, too, are called to the same commitment. Jesus also
