## No Rest for the Weary

Last week, I referenced Pope Francis' call to live with the Holy Spirit in our hearts and souls, allowing its "violent wind" to move us to change and grow. I alluded to the fact that this transformative power of the Spirit is going to be a reality on our campus. That reality is fast approaching, and I think it is so important to communicate these changes directly. The Summer of Ultimate Flexibility is just scratching the surface of the significant and impactful changes to our campus and to our Parish Family that will be occurring in the upcoming months.

This image of old and new together provides a great visual illustration of our campus. The old lamp pole was erected 20 years ago as part of the Parish Activity Center (previously known as the Parish Life Center) construction. At the time, it was sufficient to light the walkway partially between the central parking lot and the Ballroom. However, as the Parish Family's evening and night-time activities increased, it became apparent that it was no longer fully functional. A plan was put in place as part of our Capital Campaign, Build Our Future, Serve Our Past, to define and develop an effective lighting solution, along with many other initiatives over the next three years to renew and refresh our entire campus. However, God decided the time is now for all of it. He sent us a malicious visitor named Hurricane Irma who decimated and damaged nearly every square inch of our beloved church environment, just like this light pole. We are now moving forward positively and with purpose for the future of the Parish Family. The new light pole is not only more powerful, defusing more light and creating a welcoming environment, it is more ecological as an LED light, which reduces waste and power consumption (Pope Francis would be very happy). When all is said and done, our Parish Family will have an entirely new lighting system that will serve us effectively, efficiently, and safely. That is true for our entire campus, once we get through this complex time of repair, renovation, and renewal.

In the meantime, we have asked organizations, groups, and ministries who meet on our campus to please refrain from the use of our facilities starting on June 30, 2018. Our buildings will not be open for activities except for Masses and religious services like funerals, baptisms, and other Liturgical functions. Mission essential functions, like Faith Formation and CYO/CAO, will have access to our buildings and grounds for their activities and programs, but all other groups will need to suspend function on our campus. It has been described as a "stutterstep," we must stop for a moment (several months), but we will come back even better and bigger, and want all those who meet

It is going to take a significant effort to take all the complex tasks we have in store and execute them. We will have the weather to contend with, just as we felt this past weekend. We will have various materials and special items that will take time to be delivered and installed. Many of you have told me how you have been dealing with the exact same issues with your own homes. Construction materials are in short supply. Labor is even harder to find. There are long lead times on roofing projects. Unexpected issues always pop up (our Ballroom project is a great example), so as much as we are planning and identifying just about every possibility and variable, something will come up. However, we will be working with every ounce of blood, sweat, and tears that we can come up with. Our Construction Management company, Gates Construction, our architecture firm, Studios Plus, our Buildings and Grounds Council, and countless others have committed themselves to our Parish Family. We will be spending every waking hour on making Saint John not just whole again, but a beacon of love, community, and joy for decades to come. I wish I could provide specific details, like the date we are moving to the Ballroom for Mass, or the timeframe for opening the Life Center or the church back up, but it would be foolish and foolhardy to even predict that information until we have solidified all the variables described above. What I can tell you is that I have wrapped my heart and soul around this effort, and I will not rest until we are celebrating this renewed environment together. My beloved wife, Donna, can tell you as she shares this journey with me, the sleepless nights, the early and late teleconferences with vendors and suppliers, the pain I have felt in requesting suspension of essential community programs like Al-Anon, and AA, and most importantly, the responsibility I feel to and for you, our Parish Family.

I truly appreciate your commitment, your patience, your support, and your prayers as we delve into this massive undertaking for the betterment of our Parish Family. No matter if we are in the church or in the Ballroom, we will always be Saint John!



# **Creating a Safe and Welcoming Final Resting Place**

Our Parish Family's Memorial Garden, nestled behind a high hedgerow next to the front entrance of the Church, is one of the most beautiful locations on our campus. I have been told persistently that the Memorial Garden provides a peaceful environment for visiting loved ones that have gone before us. We were blessed that only superficial damage to the Garden occurred from Hurricane Irma, and we were able to have it functioning fully only days after the storm. We have plans to replant the trees that were pulled over and relevel the entire Garden. Once all of those steps are taken, we will be reengineering the irrigation to provide a consistent flow of water to keep the Garden lush and inviting.

It had become apparent, however, that the damaged lighting within the Memorial Garden, which had never provided full illumination, needed to be replaced as a priority with a pervasive and welcoming lighting scheme. Indeed, as Irma damaged or destroyed just about every walkway light around the campus, the time had come to redesign the exterior lighting, so every inch of our campus would feel safe and welcoming. The dark zones in our parking lots and sidewalks have always been a concern, and we wanted to make the Memorial Garden a place where our Parish Family and friends would feel comfortable visiting no matter the time of day. Our new walkway and pole lights have been installed in our top priority location, the Memorial Garden. If you have ever been in the Garden at night, you will see the dramatic improvement that this new design provides. You should now be able to read each name no matter which section you are visiting. We hope we have improved and enhanced the Memorial Garden to ensure its mission of comforting and healing can continue for decades to come.

# Priceless Treasure (Mark 14:12-16, 22-26)

he Solemnity of the Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ, which we celebrate today, teaches all Catholics throughout the world about the centrality of the Eucharist. Through the gift of the Eucharist, we are brought to the edge of eternity where the risen Christ is present to His Church. As we invoke the Holy Spirit to come down upon the gifts of bread and wine, we become aware of a love beyond all telling.

## **Reflection Questions**

- 1. In what ways does the Catholic tradition different to Protestantism in regard to the teaching on the Eucharist?
- 2. How does your faith in the real presence comfort you?
- Do you allow Jesus to feed your soul or do you allow other things to satisfy you?
- 4. In return for Jesus offering himself to you, how do you offer yourself to God?
- 5. Name the practical ways in which you can enter into communion with God.
- 6. In regard to consuming the body of Christ, how in turn will you become Christ to others?

We recall the words of the Last Supper and the sacrifice that took place on Calvary as we offer the unbloodied sacrifice at the altar of God. There are some Christian communities who simply have communion services, emphasizing their communion with one another rather than divine interaction. Others say the bread and wine are merely symbols, not the body and blood of Christ. Catholicism teaches the doctrine of transubstantiation – that is, the bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Jesus.

In Lumen Gentium (Dogmatic Constitution of the Church) paragraph 11, we are told, "Taking part in the Eucharistic sacrifice, the source and summit of the Christian life, they offer the divine victim to God and themselves along with it." In the breaking of the bread, Christ becomes available to each one of us in a very tangible way. Jesus' life is broken for us, so that in the midst of our fragile lives, we can appreciate that God understands. Each one of us through weakness admits that we are not worthy. On the other hand, the words of the gospel give each of us the dignity of being called a son or daughter of God, making us completely worthy!

Through the gift of the real presence, we are given a priceless treasure that is heaven's treasure. To the nonbeliever, the simple gifts presented to the altar remain just as bread and wine. However, people who have faith realize that the food and cup offered at the altar, enables them to be fed and nourished, not only in the present moment, but for all eternity. At the moment of Holy Communion, Jesus Christ offers his body and blood as the life force for the Christian community. The mass is the Sacred Meal in which we are fed by the Word and nourished by the Sacrament. It is also a moment that becomes timeless in which we relive the events that give us salvation in Christ. The once and for all sacrifice of Calvary is relived again and again, reminding us of the great sacrifice that will lead us to eternal life. As we come to the conclusion of the mass the minister sends us forth to encounter the Christ in the gift of another.



## Prayer

Jesus, may we hunger for you as the Bread of Life. Help us to drink from the cup of life, knowing that you are constantly present to us. Whenever we gather to celebrate the mass, we hope that we become aware of the holy ground on which we stand. Let us always uphold the dignity of all those who gather to celebrate the Eucharist no matter how perfect or imperfect they may be. May the wisdom of your love make us increasingly aware of the priceless treasure that is given in the mass. Amen.


## Wisdom of the Fathers




