Securing the Future of our Parish Family for Another 30 Years

We are blessed to be back in our church, again whole with our enlivening faith environment. This new persistent message: Finish the Church, is our final push of the Capital Campaign, to complete the transformation of the entire campus and ensure our success for the next 30 years. While we have come far already, we will all need to work together to complete our vision of the new Saint John the Evangelist Catholic Church. Next week, our Finance Council will speak at every Mass to provide additional information on how we are moving forward to Finish the Church.

By now, most of you reading this have seen the transformation of our campus for yourselves. If you were here during the Season, we were able to accommodate our Parish Family in multiple locations across the buildings while we completed the church. In doing so, you may have been introduced to rooms you may have not seen before, like our Ballroom or the new Gym. We hope you enjoy those locations for our Parish activities and events going forward, like our CYO Basketball, concerts, dances, and so much more.

As we have been discussing, this all played out for us during a Capital Campaign and a Hurricane. These challenges also allowed us to to accomplish something we had never dreamed: a far deeper transformation of Saint John the Evangelist. Over 85% of our campus has undergone massive repairs and renewal in the past two years. This has been expansive and extensive, with every building and room receiving some renovation effort. The hurricane damage exposed the opportunity to address added renovations, previously planned for the future, in a very cost effective way. In fact, the Parish Family Leadership took this opportunity to complete a major portion of our 5-Year Capital Plan all within this span, and much more, bringing the entire renovation to over \$16 million of effort. Claussen Family Center

Our smallest building on campus has one of our most important missions, the Catholic education of our Parish Family and the local area. Both the Youth and Adult Faith Formation programs emanate from this building, as well as our on-site counseling services and our brand new Library (featuring both paper and electronic media and study space). This building sustained flood damage from Irma, so the walls would need to be opened up and the floors replaced. Additionally, the air conditioners for the building had totally failed, requiring not just a replacement, but a total overhaul, including new pipes from the outside units.

Parish Activity Center

While some may still call this building the PLC, our Parish Activity Center is still under repair and renovations that began the day after Hurricane Irma. We had planned a facelift for the aging Ballroom during the Captial Campaign, but with complete devastation of the building by the hurricane, we were able to transform it into a beacon of fun activities and events for years to come. New projectors and sound system were masked while we used the Ballroom as our church for an entire year. Flooring, seating, exterior doors, walls, and stage were all renovated, including a new dance floor. Whether we are having a 300+ person concert or hosting the Naples Council of World Affairs 750 attendees at a time, the Ballroom is now ready and able to support all the activities in a warm and open environment. The 10 Classrooms and various offices that make up the rest of the PAC are now undergoing their repairs, as well, matching the Claussen Family Center.



Our Church

Last but certainly not least is our new church. Every inch has been updated and repaired. You may have already felt the Air Conditioning is tremendously improved as all duct work was replaced with the proper materials. We ensured that the church building would be efficient and joyous for the next 30 years of Saint John's service to our community and Parish Family, including "future-proofing" the building (for example, those platforms on the side of the walls are for potential projectors to view the Psalms and other Mass parts, if we determine that our Parish Family would like that type of engagement).

Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

When a new prime minister takes up office, one of the first things he or she does is to appoint cabinet ministers. Then, in an official ceremony, the chosen ones get their seal of office. These are not slow in telling the world how pleased they are to have been chosen. You hear them say such things as, "I feel very privileged," "I feel very honored." The odd one may say, "It's a great challenge," or "It's a great responsibility." But I don't think I've ever heard anyone say, "It's a wonderful opportunity to serve."

Of course it's an honor to be chosen. But what many of them forget, if indeed they were ever aware of it, is that it is a call to service. There is the very human temptation to be attracted by "the Meres and perks" that go with the job, as well as the status it bestows on the holder.

We are at the start of St. John's Gospel. Jesus has just appeared on the public stage. John the Baptist, who prepared the way for Him, now has the further task of introducing Him to the people. How does John introduce Jesus? What role does he ascribe to Him? He calls Jesus God's Chosen One.

Jesus did not take this role upon Himself. He was called by God and sent by God. But once the call came, he made a total gift of Himself to it. From now on, He will seek not His own honor, but the honor of His Father. And He knows that He is sent to minister to His brothers and sisters: "The Son of Man came, not to be served, but to serve."

John the Baptist also gives us a wonderful example of service. His function was to direct people to Jesus. His task was to draw back the curtain, introduce the main character, and then withdraw into the shadows. In doing this, he knew he was inviting his disciples to leave him. Yet there was no jealousy on his part. In this we see his greatness. There is no harder task than to take second place, especially when one has enjoyed the first place.

Through our baptism, we have been called to be disciples of Jesus. This is a great honor and a great privilege. But we must not forget that it is a call to service. We need the Holy Spirit to



touch our hearts. We must learn from John the Baptist not to make ourselves the center of the world. We must put our gifts at the service of others, not just of ourselves.

In our society, our being chosen always implies that others are not chosen. But this is not true for God. God chooses His Son and the disciples to reveal to us that we, too, are chosen. In the Kingdom of God, there is no room for competition or rivalry. In the Kingdom of God, each person is precious and unique.







Campaign Corner

Updating Parish Financial Reporting for Transparency and Understanding

Service is the sign of true love. Those who love know how to serve others.

– Pope Francis



For some members of our Parish Family, financial discussions can feel bland and boring. I hope that over the next few weeks, including next weekend's Finish the Church Discussion Sessions taking place after each Mass, we can help everyone see how our finances directly impact our ability to achieve our Mission, serve the poor in our neighborhoods, provide programs and activities for our community, and impact the world with our action.

Saint John the Evangelist has long provided basic financial information for our Parish Family in order to illustrate how the Offertory (the main gifts of our Parish collected weekly in the baskets and online) "gets by," usually by determining if those gifts match our weekly budget of anticipated costs (expenses). However, it has become apparent that this is a myopic view of the health of our financial environment. Instead, we want to test out different ways to fully illustrate our past, current, and future fiscal program. For example, this chart provides a full picture of our finances for the month of December 2019:

December 2019	Standard	Other
Income	\$391,849.49	\$21,850.68
Expenses	\$270,490.03	\$18,815.34
Benefit to Parish	\$121,359.46	\$3,035.34

It is important to note that Saint John specifically separates our "Standard" expenses and income from our programmatic, or "Other." Some examples of Standard Income include not just our Offertory, but also our Poor Box, Religious Education, and Non-Parochial Collections, like the Retired Religious Collection. Standard Expenses include payroll, utilities, Cantor singers, and the church environment. Other Expenses provide for the cost of the Gift Boutique, our Memorial Garden, and all the costs of the Life Center, including the CYO and CAO Programs. The same areas make up the Other Income, showcasing that the Life Center and programs are not only covering their cost, but providing a benefit to the Parish Family. Perhaps by showcasing these income and expense details on a weekly basis, we will provide a more effective and clearer snapshot of the health of our finances than the previous bar chart. We welcome your feedback.

Additionally, we will continue to provide the specific details on both our Catholic Faith Appeal Goal as well as the Finish the Church Campaign. For example, we have been told that the Diocese is behind when it comes to inputting our 2019 Catholic Faith Appeal gifts. They are currently stating we have reached \$555,327.60, 96.58% of our \$575,000 goal. We fully expect to have reached and exceeded this goal. We will be able to take that overage and apply it directly to our Finish the Church loan balance. Our Finish the Church gifts on 1/12/2020 were \$12,173.05, bringing our total gathered so far to \$693,203.23.

Over the next few weeks, we will be working on a digestible format for these details, as well as specific deeper dive details to continue to communicate our financial environment, and most importantly, how it impacts our ability to execute on our mission, **To Know, To Love, and To Serve God in His Church and Our Community.**


