Pope Francis' Letter on the Month of May

Letter of His Holiness Pope Francis to the Faithful for the Month of May 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The month of May is approaching, a time when the People of God express with particular intensity their love and devotion for the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is traditional in this month to pray the Rosary at home within the family. The restrictions of the pandemic have made us come to appreciate all the more this “family” aspect, also from a spiritual point of view.

For this reason, I want to encourage everyone to rediscover the beauty of praying the Rosary at home in the month of May. This can be done either as a group or individually; you can decide according to your own situations, making the most of both opportunities. The key to doing this is always simplicity, and it is easy also on the internet to find good models of prayers to follow.

I am also providing two prayers to Our Lady that you can recite at the end of the Rosary, and that I myself will pray in the month of May, in spiritual union with all of you. I include them with this letter so that they are available to everyone.

Dear brothers and sisters, contemplating the face of Christ with the heart of Mary our Mother will make us even more united as a spiritual family and will help us overcome this time of trial. I keep all of you in my prayers, especially those suffering most greatly, and I ask you, please, to pray for me. I thank you, and with great affection I send you my blessing.

Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

"I came so that you may life and have it to the full."

Is Jesus talking only about eternal life or also about this life? I have no doubt but that these words are to be applied to our life on earth as much as to our hope of eternal life.

There is a lovely Spanish legend that goes like this. When people arrive at the gate of heaven seeking to enter, St. Peter asks them a strange question. He says to each one, "Tell me this. Have you taken advantage of all the earthly joys which God in his goodness made available to you while you were on earth?"

If a person replies, "No, I haven't," Peter shakes his head sadly and says, "Alas, my friend, I can't let you in-not yet at any rate. How can you expect to be ready for the heavenly joys if you have not prepared yourself for them through the medium of earthly ones? I shall be obliged to send you back down to earth until you learn better."

In the past, the Christian religion tended to be identified with restrictions and prohibitions. Many of us were brought up on a theology of detachment from the world. This present life was viewed as nothing more than a time of trial. This kind of spirituality discouraged enjoyment of life. It led to half-heartedness. It was as if we were always keeping something back. Always living cautiously, fearfully, miserly.

It ought to be possible to enjoy life to the fullest while being devout and religious at the same time. However, to live fully is not the same as to live it up.

Life is a fragile gift. Every moment is utterly unique. This should concentrate our attention on what we are experiencing now. But every moment is also fleeting. How quickly life's stream runs down to the sea. This fleetingness gives life its poignancy and makes it all the more precious. "For we do not enjoy this world everlastingly, only briefly; our life is like the warming of oneself in the sun." (Aztec Indians).

The Lord, the Good Shepherd, wants us to have life. Therefore, let us not be so timid and fearful. Let us live whatever presents itself to us, because everything is a gift from God. Life is generous to those who seize it with both hands.

Mere existence is not enough for us. "What people are looking for is not meaning in life, but the experience of being alive – the rapture of living" (Joseph Campbell). We are meant to live. It is a well-known fact that those who have lived fully and intensely, do not feel cheated at death. "Fear not that your life will end; rather fear that it may never have begun." (Thoreau).

The poet, Patrick Kavanagh, said:

Autumn I'd welcome had I known love in Summer days.



I would not weep for flowers that die if once they'd bloom for praise.

I would not cry for any tree

Leaf lost, a word of misery.

I would not make lament although my harvest were a beggar's woe.

Jesus began his ministry with these words: "Believe in the Good News." What is the Good News? The Good News is: "I came that you may have life and have it to the full."

Be close to those who are concerned for their loved ones who are sick and who, in order to prevent the spread of the disease, cannot be close to them. Fill with hope those who are troubled by the uncertainty of the future and the consequences for the economy and employment.

Mother of God and our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end and that hope and peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick and the victims be comforted, and their hearts be opened to confidence and trust.

Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers and volunteers who are on the frontline of this emergency, and are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort and grant them strength, generosity, and continued health.

Be close to those who assist the sick night and day, and to priests who, in their pastoral concern and fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help and support everyone.

Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus.

Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude, and generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

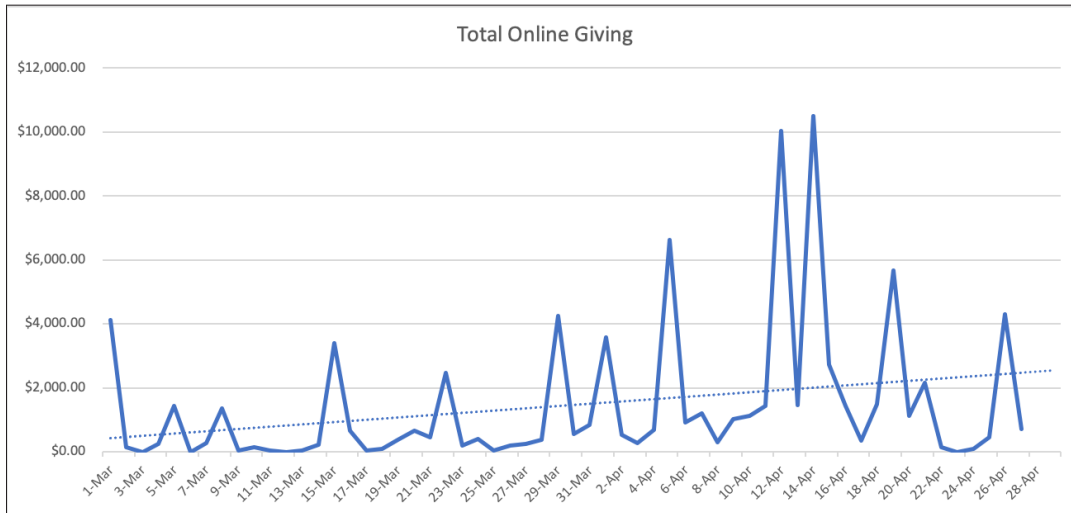

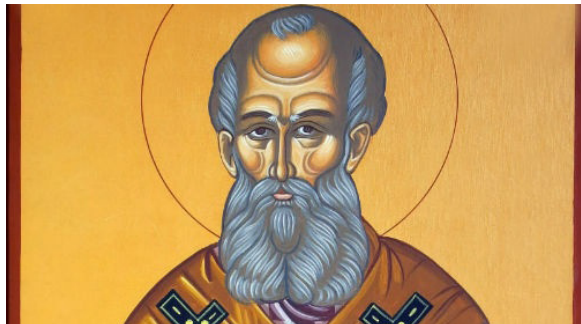

St. Athanasius



St. Athanasius, also known as Athanasius the Great and Athanasius the Confessor, was a bishop and doctor of the church. He is called the "Father of Orthodoxy," the "Pillar of the Church" and "Champion of Christ's Divinity." Athanasius became one of the most dedicated opponents of the heresy of Arianism. Much of his life was a testimony to the divinity of Jesus Christ.

Born in either 296 or 298 in Alexandria, Egypt to a prominent Christian family, Athanasius received a wonderful education in Christian doctrine, Greek literature, philosophy, rhetoric and jurisprudence.

Bishop Alexander of Alexandria became a strong influence in Athanasius' life after Alexander witnessed him playing at administering Baptism as a young boy, with other children. Alexander called the boys over and after questioning them, he determined the baptisms were valid and decided to train them for priesthood.

As he grew up, Athanasius befriended many monks and hermits of the desert, including St. Antony. He later wrote the biography of Antony.

Athanasius, as Alexander's secretary, was present during the great Church debate. He may have even composed the letter that announced Arius' condemnation. Athanasius stood alongside Alexander during the famous Council of Nicaea to determine the matters of dogma.

To this day, Athanasius is considered the great defender of the Faith in both the Orthodox and Catholic Churches.

During his years as a hermit, he wrote his Apology to Constantius, the Apology for His Flight, the Letter to the Monks, and the History of the Arians.

Emperor Julian's plan for paganizing the Christian world couldn't get very far so long as Athanasius, the champion for Catholic faith, was around. Therefore, Julian exiled Athanasius and he once again sought refuge in the desert.

He stayed there until 363 when Julian died and the next emperor, Emperor Jovian reinstated him. Jovian's reign was a short one, and Athanasius was again banished just eight months later.

Jovian's successor, Valens issued an order banning all Orthodox bishops who were exiled by Constantius.

Four months later, Valens revoked his own order and Athanasius was restored permanently.

Over the course of his life, Athanasius was banished five times and spent 17 years of his life in exile for the defense of the doctrine of Christ's divinity.

However, the last years of his life were peaceful and he died on May 2, 373 in Alexandria.

St. Athanasius is often shown as a bishop arguing with a pagan, a bishop holding an open book or a bishop standing over a defeated heretic. He is a patron saint of theologians, and faithful Orthodox and Roman Catholic Christians and hailed to this day as a great Defender of the Faith.

His feast day is celebrated on May 2.

Act of Spiritual Communion

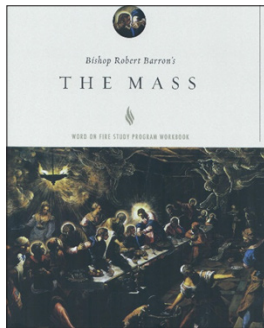

Adult Faith Formation

This Fourth Sunday of Easter is the Mid-Point of the Easter Season !

“...he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread.” ~ Luke 24:35

The Easter season is the 50 days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. Just as we are invited to do something special during Advent and Lent, **you are invited to do something special this Easter season.**



While you are “sheltering in place” and binge watching your favorite movie or show, take just 30 minutes each week and watch one lesson in Bishop Robert Barron’s program, The Mass. In only six lessons, you will discover the answer to the question, Why do I go to Mass?

Through these engaging videos from Bishop Barron, you will come away with a deeper understanding of what the Mass is and why it matters; why it’s the most important thing you can do on Earth.

This week view Lesson Three, God Speaks Our Story.

Biblical people are part of a story that they didn’t make up. To be a Christian is to be part of the great story of creation, the fall, the formation of a people Israel, and the coming of the Messiah. To know ourselves, therefore, is to hear this story told over and over again. The beauty of the Mass is that it is Christ himself who tells this story at every Mass.

This week explore the readings, the responsorial psalm and the proclamation of the Gospel.

When you have finished, consider these questions:

- How is the Trinity reflected in the reading and hearing of the Scripture?
- Why is “telling our story” so important in everyday life? Why is listening and retelling the story of our salvation in Christ so important in everyday life?
- What are your own stumbling blocks with regards to the Mass?

(Keep these in mind as we go through the study)

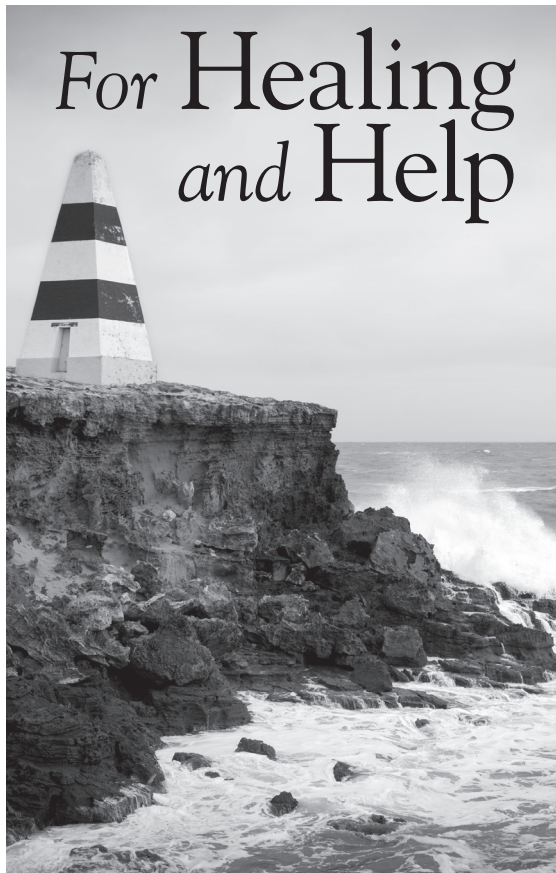
