Pope Francis and Human Dignity

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning!



The pandemic has highlighted how vulnerable and interconnected everyone is. If we do not take care of one another, starting with the least, with those who are most impacted, including creation, we cannot heal the world.

Commendable is the effort of so many people who have been offering evidence of human and Christian love for neighbor, dedicating themselves to the sick even at the risk of their own health. They are heroes! However, the coronavirus is not the only disease to be fought, but rather, the pandemic has shed light on broader social ills. One of these is a distorted view of the person, a perspective that ignores the dignity and relational of the person. At times we look at others as objects, to be used and discarded. In reality this type of perspective blinds and

fosters an individualistic and aggressive throw-away culture, which transforms the human being into a consumer good (cf. Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, 53; Encyclical *Laudato Si'*, [LS], 22).

In the light of faith we know, instead, that God looks at a man and a woman in another manner. He created us not as objects but as people loved and capable of loving; He has created us in His image and likeness (see Gen 1:27). In this way, He has given us a unique dignity, calling us to live in communion with Him, in communion with our sisters and our brothers, with respect for all creation. In communion, in harmony, we might say. Creation is the harmony in which we are called to live. And in this communion, in this harmony that is communion, God gives us the ability to procreate and safeguard life (see Gen 1:28-29), to till and keep the land (see Gen 2:15; LS, 67). It is clear that one cannot procreate and

safeguard life without harmony; it will be destroyed.

We have an example of that individualistic perspective, that which is not harmony, in the Gospels, in the request made to Jesus by the mother of the disciples James and John (cf. Mt 20:20-38). She wanted her sons to sit at the right and the left of the new king. But Jesus proposes another type of vision: that of service and of giving one's life for others, and He confirms it by immediately restoring sight to two blind men and making them His disciples (see Mt 20:29-34). Seeking to climb in life, to be superior to others, destroys harmony. It is the logic of dominion, of dominating others. Harmony is something else: it is service.

Therefore, let us ask the Lord to give us eyes attentive to our brothers and sisters, especially those who are suffering. As Jesus's disciples, we do not want to be indifferent or individualistic. These are the two unpleasant attitudes that run counter to harmony. Indifferent: I look the other way. Individualist: looking out only for one's own interest. The harmony created by God asks that we look at others, the needs of others, the problems of others, in communion. We want to recognize the human dignity in every person, whatever his or her race, language, or condition might be. Harmony leads you to recognize human dignity, that harmony created by God, with humanity at the center.

The Second Vatican Council emphasizes that this dignity is inalienable, because it "was created 'to the image of God'" (Pastoral Constitution *Gaudium et Spes*, 12). It lies at the foundation of all social life and determines its operative principles. In modern culture, the closest reference to the principle of the inalienable dignity of the person is the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which Saint John Paul II defined as a "milestone on the long and difficult path of the human race," and as "one of the highest expressions of the human conscience." Rights are not only individual, but also social; they are of peoples, nations. The human being, indeed, in his or her personal dignity, is a social being, created in the image of God, One and Triune. We are social beings; we need to live in this social harmony, but when there is selfishness, our outlook does not reach others, the community, but focuses on ourselves, and this makes us ugly, nasty, and selfish, destroying harmony.

This renewed awareness of the dignity of every human being has serious social, economic, and political implications. Looking at our brother and sister and the whole of creation as a gift received from the love of the Father inspires attentive behavior, care, and wonder. In this way the believer, contemplating his or her neighbor as a brother or sister, and not as a stranger, looks at him or her compassionately and empathetically, not contemptuously or with hostility. Contemplating the world in the light of faith, with the help of grace, we strive to develop our creativity and enthusiasm in order to resolve the ordeals of the past. We understand and develop our abilities as responsibilities that arise from this faith, as gifts from God to be placed at the service of humanity and of creation.

While we all work for a cure for a virus that strikes everyone without distinction, faith exhorts us to commit ourselves seriously and actively to combat indifference in the face of violations of human dignity. This culture of indifference that accompanies the throwaway culture: things that do not affect me, do not interest me. Faith always requires that we let ourselves be healed and converted from our individualism, whether personal or collective; party individualism, for example.

May the Lord "restore our sight" so as to rediscover what it means to be members of the human family. And may this sight be translated into concrete actions of compassion and respect for every person and of care and safeguarding of our common home.

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

The Gospel story shows that the primacy of Peter was not something that was invented by the Church later on. It went right back to the beginning, yes, to the mind and will of Christ Himself. His position as the leader of the Twelve is shown in many details in the Gospels. For instance, He is presented as the spokesman of the Twelve, and whenever the twelve apostles are listed, His name is always first.

Yet the Gospels do not spare Peter, but clearly show the high and low points in his life. No doubt the lowest point was when he denied Jesus. The incident related in today's Gospel (his great profession of faith in Jesus) was almost certainly his finest moment.

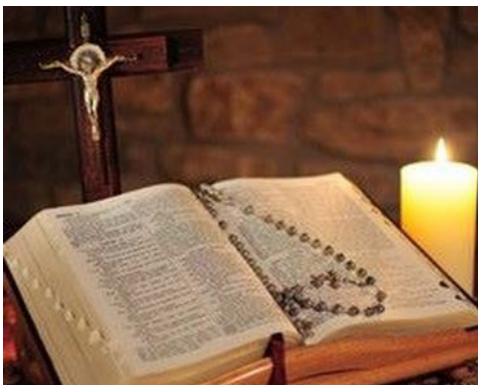
Jesus might have tempered this moment with a touch of reality, in case Peter might get a swelled head. Instead, He praised and blessed Peter, and promised to bestow responsibility and authority on him. There was a solid, even rocklike side to Peter's character. He was always the one to come forward. It's obvious that he had leadership qualities which Jesus recognized.

But there was another side to his character, a weaker and darker side, of which he was not yet aware. But he would find out about it in time. It would prove to be a very humbling and bitter experience for him. It is important that those in positions of leadership be aware of their weaknesses. People who act as if they are infallible make a lot of mistakes and hurt a lot of people.

It's important to remember that the Peter who said, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God,' was the same Peter who later said, 'I do not know this man.' If it was a different Peter, that would explain everything. But it was the exact same Peter. We might be inclined to say, 'Ah, but the first Peter was the true or real Peter.' But this would be a mistake. There was only one Peter.

What does this tell us? That there was division within Peter, just as there is division within each of us. Just as Peter was capable of being courageous at one moment and cowardly at another, so are we. Each of us has high and low moments. We must not let our low moments get us down, and we must draw encouragement from our high moments. While we must not forget our weak side, we must try to act out of our strong side. The Lord smiles on us in our good moments, and upholds us in our low moments.

The low moments of others should not cause us to put them down or write them off. Their good moments should help us to see their potential, and to affirm and encourage them. In general we are eager to voice our criticisms, but reluctant to give a single word of encouragement, and in this way we bar every road to improvement.



A remark I read somewhere: 'I used to find the worst thing about others and tear them down. Now I try to find something good to say about them and thus build them up.' In considering what people are not, we overlook what they are. Better to appreciate what a person has than brood over what he hasn't.

Peter had his faults, but those faults were very obvious. But so, too, were his strengths: his generosity, his enthusiasm, his leadership. Jesus saw that, in spite of everything, his heart was sound. We must try to seek the good in everyone, and to reveal it and bring it out, as Jesus did in the case of Peter.

Registration Now Open for Faith Formation 2020-2021

Registration is now open for Faith Formation at St. John in the Fall. This is our first attempt at Online Registration, so please bear with us. In summary, online registration is in four parts.

1. **REGISTER with My Own Church - Wait for confirmation email that includes a temporary password**
2. **REGISTER for Class Preferences**
3. **PAYMENT**
4. **DIOCESAN FORMS SIGNED ONLINE - Separate Email Sent to You**

To help you through this process here is additional information and links.

1. REGISTER with My Own Church

When you register with MY OWN CHURCH, you can update your contact information.

Please note: After initial registration of MY OWN CHURCH you will receive an email with a temporary password before you can register for classes.

2. REGISTER for Classes

Click on the Faith Formation tab and then the Online Registration button. From here, the member can verify details in their family record and register for religious education classes.

*When registering for classes, you will **+Add** each student one at a time. You have the option to print your registration sheet for your records.*

3. PAYMENT - Click "PAY NOW" Button to proceed

After you register for classes, you will be able to pay for the sessions. The option to pay at this website is with a credit card OR Apple Pay only. Cash payments would have to be made in person in our Parish Office. Payments by check may

be mailed in or dropped off in person as well.

Please keep in mind when you pay for Faith Formation, you will be "adding each child's registration" to your shopping cart one at a time. After each child is added, you will then hit "continue shopping," and then click on **Faith Formation Registration** to return to the previous page where you will add your next child's registration to the cart, until you have added all of your children. Then you can check out and make payment. Each time you choose a purchase option for your child, you will choose either **STANDARD REGISTRATION** or **SACRAMENTAL YEAR**. The shopping cart will total up the registrations for you. *There is a discount for registering additional children within the same family. Sacrament fees apply for the child's second year of First Communion or Confirmation preparation.*

4. Completing and Signing Diocesan Forms

The Final step in this process is completing the required online Diocesan Forms. You will receive these forms via email from our Assistant in Faith Formation, Miss Luz Lozano. In that email, she will also confirm your class sessions.

Please email us a copy of your child's baptism certificate if your child is entering kindergarten or is new to our program. Baptism Certificates may be sent to luz@sjecc.com. New Confirmation candidates will need to send a copy of their First Communion record as well.

We are hoping this NEW registration process will be a welcome new part of our program. Thank you for your patience. Your feedback is always welcome. Kindly register by August 31, 2020. Thank you!



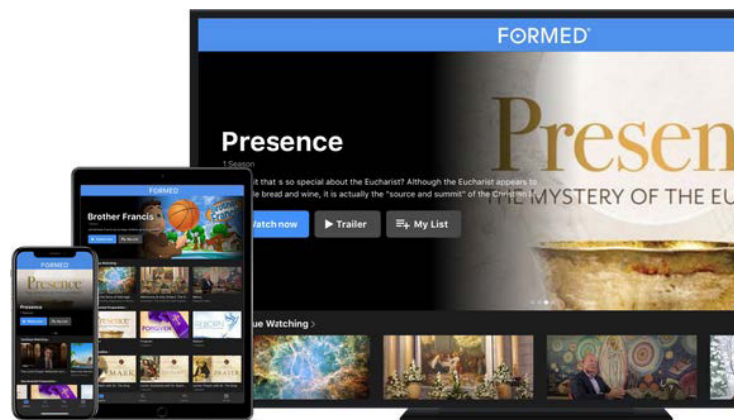
