
The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ



Is Jesus Present in the Eucharist?



From the earliest days of the Church Christians have believed that Christ was present in the Eucharist, but they did so without theory or explanation. St. Paul simply admonished the Corinthians against sacrilegious reception (1 Cor. 11), but about 160 AD St. Justin wrote the first effort at an explanation, in his Apologia to Emperor Antoninus Pius.

For not as common bread and common drink do we receive these; but in like manner as Jesus Christ our Saviour, having been made flesh by the Word of God, had both flesh and blood for our salvation, so likewise have we been taught that the food which is blessed by the prayer of His word, and from which our blood and flesh by transmutation are nourished, is the flesh and blood of that Jesus who was made flesh.

In the Middle Ages the character of this change was explored and systematically developed by theologians, especially St. Thomas Aquinas. Thus, the Council of Trent taught against the theories of some of the Reformers, that Christ is really, truly, and substantially present.

His Presence is real, because it has "real being." This philosophical term conveys that it has actual existence, and not just mental existence (as a fictional creature, or a concept of a thing would).

His Presence is true. Truth refers to an accurate statement of a reality. The Blessed Sacrament is called Christ because it is Christ. It is not simply a symbol, as a flag is the symbol of a nation, or as a photograph is a representation of the individual shown.

Finally, His Presence is substantial. Even though our senses detect the appearances or properties of bread and wine, the substance is Christ, Who is wholly present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, under each element, and any parts of them.

Dear God, thank You for all creation. Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

As human beings we cannot live on bread alone. We suffer form many kinds of hunger. Let us turn to the Gospel to see the various kinds of "bread" Jesus offered to the people, thus satisfying their many hungers. To the people who followed Him into the desert, and who were starving, He offered ordinary bread, and so satisfied their physical hunger. To the leper whose body was falling apart, He offered the only bread that mattered to Him – the bread of physical healing. To the lonely woman at Jacob's well, He offered the bread of human kindness, and thus satisfied her hunger for acceptance. To sinners, He offered the bread of forgiveness, and thus satisfied their hunger for salvation. To the rejects and outcasts, by mixing with them and sharing their bread, He offered the bread of companionship, and so satisfied their hunger for self-worth. To the widow of Nain who was burying her only son, and to Martha and Mary who had just buried their brother Lazarus, He offered the bread of compassion, and showed them that even in death we are not beyond the reach of God's help. With Zacchaeus, the rich tax collector who had robbed the bread from the tables of the poor, He began by inviting himself to his table. Then, having awakened within Him a hunger for a better life, He got him to share His ill-gotten money with the poor. To the thief who died at His side, He offered the bread of reconciliation with God, thus bringing peace to his troubled soul.

But, surprisingly, there were some who refused His offer of bread. There was the rich young man to whom He offered the bread of discipleship, but who refused it because he was not willing to part with his riches.


There were the Scribes and Pharisees to whom He offered not once, but several times, the bread of conversion, but they refused to eat even a crumb of it.

There were the people of His beloved city of Jerusalem to whom, with tears in His eyes, He offered the bread of peace, but they refused it with the result that their city was destroyed.

There was Pilate to whom He offered the bread of truth, but he had no appetite for it because it meant putting his position at risk.

Jesus shared Himself with others in many different ways, and under many different forms, before offering Himself to them as food and drink at the Last Supper.


Jesus nourishes us in so many ways, and of course especially in the Eucharist. The presence of Christ



in the Eucharist becomes a problem only when we have lost our sense of his presence in all that is. Those who have a deep sense of the presence of God in the whole of creation, will not have great difficulty in believing that He is present in a very special way in the Eucharist.

God alone can satisfy all the longings and hungers of our hearts, because He alone can give us the bread of eternal life. This is the bread we receive in the Eucharist. Without it, we would not have the strength to follow Christ.



Scripture Readings

Reading I Ex 24:3-8

When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the LORD, they all answered with one voice, "We will do everything that the LORD has told us." Moses then wrote down all the words of the LORD and, rising early the next day, he erected at the foot of the mountain an altar and twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel. Reading II Heb 9:11-15

Brothers and sisters: When Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God.

For this reason he is mediator of a new covenant: since a death has taken place for deliverance from transgressions under the first covenant, those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance.

Gospel Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?" He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him. Wherever he enters, say to the master of the house, 'The Teacher says, "Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?"' Then he will show you a large upper room furnished and ready. Make the preparations for us there." The disciples then went off, entered the city, and found it just as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover. While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take it; this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many. Amen, I say to you, I shall not drink again the fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God." Then, after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.




