# Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

Cana was in the vicinity of Nazareth where Jesus had grown up. His mother was invited to a wedding, and Jesus and His disciples were also there. John's Gospel uses this simple, family event to open our minds to some profound insights. The supply of wine ran short at the reception and Jesus' mother intervened; was seemingly rebuffed; and yet she told the attendants to do whatever Jesus told them to do. We thought we were just looking in on a reception, but John reveals mysteries to us that continue to envelop our lives today.

Our lectionary combines this gospel event with a passage from Isaiah filled with marriage allusions, depicting God's desires for his people. The marriage covenant had, throughout the long history of Israel, been a favorite way to describe God's special love and delight in his people. God shall rejoice in you is both an assurance for us today, and a challenge. Can we hear such words as truly addressed to us? We are the people God called to be his own, to be followers of Jesus and to know that, in the words of the headwaiter in today's Gospel, we share the best wine that has been saved until now. In our long liturgical history, wine has always been a symbol to us of the lifeblood of Jesus poured out for us. This is the love that envelops us!

The Gospel concludes by telling us that the disciples began to believe in him. This was just the beginning of their faith journey. As they stayed and traveled with Jesus they would come to deeper insights.

We, likewise, are on a journey of faith. We gather today because we believe and rejoice in the Risen Lord Jesus speaking to us and encouraging us to follow Him. Jesus continues to call us beyond all human understanding, into a deeper sharing in His Paschal Mystery. We strive to remember that God always delights in us and wants us to be with Him. Paul reminds us in Corinthians today that we all have unique gifts to offer for the encouragement and strengthening of our brothers and sisters on this same journey. We never travel alone!

The image of family and friends gathered at a wedding feast shows us that we are all in this together. We have gifts to share, for God's Spirit has been poured out on us. Today we are invited to share the joy of a great wedding banquet and reception; Jesus is there with His disciples, and He wants us to be there with them to participate to the fullest.

## Gospel Jn 2:1-11

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from — although the servers who had drawn the water knew —, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.

# Luke: The Gospel of Mercy Presented by Deacon John Sebastian



Deacon John Sebastian presents a new adult education series, "The Gospel of Luke--the Gospel of Mercy," beginning Tuesday, January 18, at 11:30 a.m. in the Pulte Center. This church year is Year C in the three-year liturgical cycle, and our Sunday liturgies feature the gospel according to St. Luke. St. Luke's sources for his Gospel were primarily the Blessed Virgin Mary and the apostles, especially Saints Peter and Paul, with whom Luke traveled extensively.

Luke's gospel is often called the gospel of mercy because his gospel features unique insights of mercy which are not found in any other gospel. A few of these are: The Good Samaritan, The Prodigal Son,

and Jesus' forgiveness of persecutors as He hung on the cross. Luke's gospel features the importance of women to Jesus' ministry. It is also Luke's gospel that has most of the infancy narrative: the Annunciation, the Visitation, John the Baptist, the birth of Jesus, and the angels' announcement to the shepherds, the Presentation, and the boy Jesus in the great temple.

Accompanying your study of the Gospel of Luke will be a weekly world-class video presentation from Rome and Assisi hosted by prolific author Dr. Paul Thigpen and life applications from Fr. Jeffrey Kirby. The \$40 fee is the cost of a magnificent book with collection-quality reproductions of some of the greatest religious art in the worl,d as well as reference material and commentary with suggested discussion questions for each chapter in the gospel.


