

Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

What is a sacrament?

A sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace. Expressed another way, sacraments are efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us. The visible rites by which the sacraments are celebrated signify and make present the graces proper to each sacrament. They bear fruit in those who receive them with the required dispositions.

How many sacraments are there?

There are seven sacraments. The seven sacraments can be divided into three categories—Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist; Sacraments of Healing: Reconciliation (Confession) and Anointing of the Sick; and Sacraments at the Service of Communion: Holy Order and Matrimony.

What is Baptism?

Baptism is the sacrament of faith by which men and women accept Christ's call to salvation and the Kingdom of God. Moreover, the newly baptized are incorporated into Christ and the people of God. They obtain forgiveness of original sin and all personal sins and they become a "new creation" through water and the Holy Spirit—a member of Christ and a Temple of the Holy Spirit.

Is Baptism necessary for salvation?

Jesus Himself affirms that baptism is necessary for salvation. "No one shall enter the Kingdom of God without being born of water and the Spirit" (John 3:5). Christ commanded his disciples to preach the Gospel, draw people to faith in him, and baptize those who come to conversion.

Who can baptize?

The ordinary ministers of baptism are the bishop and the priest and, in the Latin Church, also the deacon. In case of necessity, anyone, even a non-baptized person, can baptize, with the required intention, by using water and the Trinitarian baptismal formula. The intention required is to do what the Church does when she baptizes.

Why does the Catholic Church baptize infants?

Infant baptism has been practiced since apostolic times. Infants need to be baptized because through this sacrament, they are freed from original sin and are welcomed into the community of the Church, where they have access to the fullness of the means of salvation, especially the sacraments. Their parents, godparents, and the parish community commit themselves to their ongoing formation in faith and knowledge of the tradition of the Church. The best gift that parents can give their children is a life in the Church. However, the Church also teaches that the baptism of an infant may be postponed if there is not a "founded hope" that the child will be brought up in the Catholic faith. There are children—born and unborn who die without baptism. The Church entrusts them to the mercy of God, who wills that all people be saved. We recall Christ's tender welcome of children saying, "Let the children come to me and do not hinder them" (Mark 10:14). Because of this the Church confidently hopes for the salvation of children who die without baptism.

What about baptism of adults?

For adults today, the Church, after the Second Vatican Council, has restored the order of the Catechumenate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). It outlines the steps for the formation of the catechumens, bringing their conversion to the faith to greater maturity. It helps them to respond more deeply to God's gracious initiative in their lives and prepares them for union with the Church community. This process is meant to form them into the fullness of the Christian life and to become disciples of Jesus, their teacher. This includes the initiation into the mystery of salvation, the practice of faith, hope and love, and other virtues in a succession of liturgical rites.


Maronite Mass in Naples







Catholic Faith Appeal

The Catholic Faith Appeal, or CFA, is the collaboration of 61 Catholic Parishes in Southwest Florida to serve and protect the poor, neglected, forgotten, and outcast in our region by assisting with the Mission of the Diocese of Venice, including Catholic Charities. Our generosity supports Catholic Education and Seminarians, as well as to feed, clothe, and provide shelter to the marginalized, the aged, and the unborn.

While we have met our goal in years past, it has been through the efforts of a small minority of our Parish Family. We have set a goal for our Parish to double our previous level of participation and have over 40% of our Families contribute this year. If we exceed our goal, those funds would be returned to the Parish, so every dollar counts.

As a reminder, the Diocesan CFA structure allows for any excess in goal achievement up to 25% to be returned to the Parish free from consideration in the setting of future CFA goals. If you are over the age of $70\frac{1}{2}$, you may donate up to \$100,000 per year from your Individual Retirement Account tax free to a charitable cause. Spouses may also participate to the same level if they have a separate IRA, giving married couples the opportunity to donate up to \$200,000.


Resa Pearson Presents, "The Spirituality of Aging" Tuesday, January 11th

Luke: The Gospel of Mercy Presented by Deacon John Sebastian



Deacon John Sebastian presents a new adult education series, "The Gospel of Luke--the Gospel of Mercy," beginning Tuesday, January 18, at 11:30 a.m. in the Pulte Center. This church year is Year C in the three-year liturgical cycle, and our Sunday liturgies feature the gospel according to St. Luke. St. Luke's sources for his Gospel were primarily the Blessed Virgin Mary and the apostles, especially Saints Peter and Paul, with whom Luke traveled extensively.

Luke's gospel is often called the gospel of mercy because his gospel features unique insights of mercy which are not found in any other gospel. A few of these are: The Good Samaritan, The Prodigal Son,

and Jesus' forgiveness of persecutors as He hung on the cross. Luke's gospel features the importance of women to Jesus' ministry. It is also Luke's gospel that has most of the infancy narrative: the Annunciation, the Visitation, John the Baptist, the birth of Jesus, and the angels' announcement to the shepherds, the Presentation, and the boy Jesus in the great temple.

Accompanying your study of the Gospel of Luke will be a weekly world-class video presentation from Rome and Assisi hosted by prolific author Dr. Paul Thigpen and life applications from Fr. Jeffrey Kirby. The \$40 fee is the cost of a magnificent book with collection-quality reproductions of some of the greatest religious art in the worl,d as well as reference material and commentary with suggested discussion questions for each chapter in the gospel.

What about persons who were baptized in another Christian church?

Persons baptized into another Christian church and are now seeking communion with the Catholic Church are also welcomed to participate with catechumens in the RCIA in the process of learning about the Catholic faith. They bring to the process of preparation their prior experience of the Christian life and prayer. For a baptized Christian, reception into full communion with the Catholic Church involves the reception of the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation and then a Profession of Faith followed by the celebration of Confirmation and the Eucharist.

What are the effects of baptism?

First, sins are forgiven. By baptism, all sins are forgiven, Original Sin and all personal sins, and temporal punishment due to sin is removed. After one has been reborn in Christ, there is nothing to prevent one's entry into God's kingdom. However, though all sins are removed, there remains, as an effect of original Sin, the inclination to sin that is called concupiscence. This inclination to sin shows itself in what is sometimes referred to as a darkening of the mind and a weakening of the will, that is, the inability to know clearly the right or wrong of an action and/or the lack of strength to resist temptation and always do the right thing no matter how hard it is.


Second, we become adopted children of God. Baptism also gives us new life as adopted children of God. We can be called sons and daughters of God.

Third, we become Temples of the Holy Spirit. We become sharers of divine life and temples of the Holy Spirit. We are now made righteous by God and live in a state of grace, that is, we live in union with God because of his graciousness and loving initiative. Our permanence in the state of grace is called sanctifying grace because God "sanctifies" us, that is, makes us his holy people by giving us his life. God continue to assist us by many helps that are called actual graces. Thus, we have the ability to live and act under the guidance and light of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. This helps us mature in goodness through the practice of virtues.

Fourth, In baptism we become members of the Church, the Body of Christ. We share in the priesthood of Christ as well as his prophetic and royal mission. "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9). We enjoy the community we find in the Church, share our talents and gifts with its members, respond willingly to its teachings and requirements, and assume the responsibilities that our membership implies.

Fifth, we are bonded to other Christians. Baptism provides a common foundation among al Christians, including those not yet in full communion with the Catholic Church. The Church recognizes the validity of baptism of other Christian churches as long as the rite involved pouring of water or immersion in water, a Trinitarian formula, and the intention to baptize. Those who have been baptized have been saved by their faith in Christ and the grace of baptism. "They therefore have a right to be called Christians and with good reason are accepted as brothers and sisters by the children of the Catholic Church." (CCC, no. 1271).
