

Please Welcome Our Summer Seminarian, Michael Courville



Michael was born into a Catholic family in Sarasota, Florida in 1999, and is one of five children. He went with his family to Epiphany Cathedral in Venice from a very young age all the way through high school. At the Cathedral, Michael sang in the children's choir, was an altar server, and attended Epiphany's school from kindergarten through 8th grade. It

was at Epiphany Cathedral School where Michael developed an interest in math, science, music, acting, sports, and learning about his Catholic faith.

Michael attended Venice High School, where he was involved with many clubs and organizations including the engineering program and the amateur radio club. Michael and a few friends helped found a Catholic service club on the public high school campus called the Divine Hearts Club. Every month the Divine Hearts Club would undertake a service project based on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy including assisting the military, the impoverished, and unwed mothers. Michael was also involved with the local Ultimate Fitness Club where a group of men would gather for faith, fellowship, fitness, and food. Michael ran cross-country and pole-vaulted for the track-and-field team for 4 years. Michael also had a job at Publix for 4 years. He did all this while taking collegelevel courses and maintaining high honors.

Michael graduated from Venice in 2017 and journeyed to the University of Louisiana in Lafayette (UL) where he pursued a degree in electrical engineering. In Louisiana Michael lived with his grandparents and learned about his Cajun French heritage including how to cook, garden, sing, and dance. Michael was very involved with the Ragin Cajun Catholics and the engineering organization IEEE. Michael continued

to altar serve and sang in a schola at Mass. Michael joined the Legion of Mary and got involved with a local religious community called the Community of Jesus Christ Crucified. With this community, Michael was blessed to take collegelevel theology classes. While at UL, Michael took on a job tutoring student-athletes because he had the desire to be a teacher one day. Later at UL, Michael was granted two engineering internships, one over the summer and the other during the school year where he worked on projects for the defense industry. In 2021 Michael completed his degree at UL in electrical engineering with minors in computer science and mathematics.

At the beginning of his senior year of college, Michael felt a strong call to the priesthood and after graduation entered seminary at St. Vincent de Paul in Boynton Beach with the Diocese of Venice. This past year Michael learned philosophy, Spanish, catechism, prayer, and about the Bible. Michael's pastoral assignment was to serve the poor by tutoring children in impoverished neighborhoods, assisting the Missionaries of Charity, and accompanying members in the St. Vincent de Paul Society in their door-to-door visits. Michael cantors and sings in the schola at the seminary. Michael has grown much in faith and fraternity with his brother seminarians developing a great love for the Liturgy of the Hours, the Holy Rosary, and the Eucharist.

Michael is now in his second year of seminary and is on assignment here at St. John the Evangelist for the summer. Michael has helped with altar serving and lectoring at Mass, was a photographer at Vacation Bible School, assists at parish events, accompanies the priests on sick calls, and brings the Eucharist to shut-ins. Michael loves the friendly and active community of St. John's and says he is very blessed to be here. Please keep him in your prayers as he continues his discernment for the priesthood.

Responding to the Lord's command to go and make disciples of all nations, the Diocese of Venice is committed to providing the necessary resources for **seminarians**.

A seminarian's calling is nourished through a rigorous intellectual formation in a faithful and loving obedience to the Magisterium and the sacred truths entrusted to the Church. The seminary provides an environment that forms men to be committed disciples of Christ.

Seminarians live in community. This means they pray together, work together, take their meals together, and study together. While the seminary is a place where *individual* men go to discern what the Lord is asking of them, ultimately, as priests, they will belong to a *presbyterate*. The seeds of this brotherhood and fraternity are



As soon as the seminary closes its doors for the summer, a different type of learning begins with either pastoral work or a Parish assignment.

While in a Parish setting, a seminarian serves and learns from priests. He assists the Pastor with the many responsibilities of ministering to the needs of Parishioners and the community as a whole: distributing Communion during Mass, participating in Bible study, youth activities, leading a group to help feed those in need, and much more.



Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) provides an opportunity for seminarians to develop pastoral competency within a hospital setting. This experience serves as a basis for dealing with various life situations and crisis circumstances.

In the meantime, seminarians continue with their prayer life and grow in their vocation, like so many priests ordained before them.



Gospel Reflections

Gospel Reflections with Father Tom

Christianity is a very practical religion. Catherine de Hueck Doherty was an outstanding Christian. A Russian aristocrat by birth, she spent most of her life in America. She said, "At an early age I learned that the Gospel has to be lived."

As a young woman she worked as a cocktail waitress in a Manhattan bar. On one occasion she announced to a group of GIs and their girlfriends (whom she knew to be Catholics) that it was closing time (4 a.m.) and that she had to be off.

"Where are you going to, Katie?" they asked. "It's Sunday, and I'm going to Mass."

"That means you're a Catholic then?"

"Yes," she replied.

They couldn't get over the fact that she could be a practicing Catholic and work in a place like that. They all trooped off and went to Mass with her. A couple of weeks later a girl from the group returned. She said, "You've made me think. If you can live a good life while working in a place like this, then maybe I can too."

Another time Catherine was traveling in the subway in Montreal when she met a lonely old woman who said to her, "Would you mind talking to me for awhile?" They made two trips from end to end of the subway, talking all the time. They became good friends, and corresponded until the old lady died.

The harvest is indeed great for those who have eyes to see it and a heart to respond to it. It is in our hospitals, homes, schools, prisons, work places, neighborhoods. Every day is a harvest day.

Christ sent his disciples out to help him reap the harvest. We tend to leave it to the specialists – to priests, nuns, missionaries. The people Christ sent out weren't specialists. Yet they became His instruments. Few things help an individual more than to place responsibility on Him, and to let Him know that you trust Him.

The seventy-two began by being His disciples. Then He steered them to goals beyond themselves by making them His apostles. That's the way it should always be. The Lord asks us to share with others what we have received from Him. There are things which will remain undone if we don't do them. We lift ourselves up in proportion as we help to lift others up.



To be an apostle is to be one who is sent. One doesn't have to be some kind of genius or superhuman person to be able to do the work of Christ. There is a difference between an apostle and a genius. The difference has little to do with talent or intelligence; it has everything to do with purpose and commitment.

Just because people are called doesn't mean they become more intelligent or more imaginative than they would otherwise be. No, they still have to rely on their native gifts. But they now have more purpose, more dedication than they would otherwise have. That can make a huge difference.





Diocese of Venice Statement regarding the recent Supreme Court Decision, Dobbs vs. Jackson

Venice, FL, June 24, 2022 -- In God's eyes, all human life is sacred, from conception to natural death; this is the teaching of the Catholic Church. The Church is pleased to hear of the Supreme Court decision in Dobbs v. Jackson. This ruling now undoes the grave injustice of 1973, when Roe v. Wade decided that an entire class of human beings, the preborn, were outside the protection of the law. Now the states will once again have the opportunity to protect the lives of preborn children and in doing so, also protect millions of women from the tragic consequences of abortion. Of course, legal protection must be accompanied by more care for mothers and their children. The Catholic Church, and the Diocese of Venice, stand ready to help mothers in need. Pregnant women are not alone.

Pope Francis has called upon all Parishes to be "islands of mercy in a sea of indifference." Parishes in the Diocese of Venice have redoubled their efforts to accompany women and couples who are facing unexpected or difficult pregnancies, offering them loving and compassionate care.

Specifically, Walking with Moms in Need is a new program. The Diocese of Venice helps parishioners connect with local mothers facing difficult or challenging pregnancies. The program helps parishioners to identify local resources so that pregnant and parenting women receive the material, spiritual, and emotional support they need. Within the Diocese of Venice, there are Pregnancy Help Centers in 22 locations, and nine residential maternity and after-birth homes.

For decades, the Diocese of Venice has supported mothers in need and continues to do so. Our Mother's House of Catholic Charities in Venice is one of the programs in the Diocese that supports single mothers and their children, providing not just housing and material needs, but valuable counseling and education.

Additionally, the Diocese offers confidential, compassionate support after abortion to both women and men through its Project Rachel Ministry.

Let us all continue to pray for the end to abortion, and the end to taking the lives of an entire category of human beings, the preborn.

A local church may be able to help you with additional assistance and spiritual guidance personalized specifically to your needs.




