

Gospel Reflection with Fr. Tom

It's clear that Zacchaeus had heard a lot of good things about Jesus. But he wanted to see for himself. Firstly, he wanted to see what Jesus looked like. Secondly, and more importantly, he wanted to see what kind of person Jesus was.

A huge crowd of people showed up to see Jesus. In spite of all the attention and adulation, Jesus spotted Zacchaeus on the tree. The first thing, then, that would have impressed Zacchaeus was the fact that Jesus noticed him. It's nice to be noticed.

"Everything he does is done, not to bring honor to you, but to win the esteem of others, and thus bring honor to himself. He makes sure to get the seats of honor at banquets and in the synagogue. He loves it when people salute him in the marketplace and call him "Rabbi".

"But having noticed him, Jesus might have snubbed him. Had he done so he would have increased his popularity in that town. But Jesus did not snub him. He stopped under the tree and looked up at him. In this way he showed Zacchaeus that he was interested in him.

But there was better to come. He spoke to him. In deciding to speak to him he might have condemned him as a moneygrasper and exploiter of the poor. But he didn't utter one word of condemnation - at least not in public. Instead, addressing him by his name, he called him down and said that he wanted to stay at his house. In so doing he made himself extremely unpopular with the townspeople. But Zacchaeus was delighted, and welcomed him with joy.

Zacchaeus had come in order to see what kind of man Jesus was. Well, by the end of the day he had got a lot more than he bargained for or hoped for. Instead of getting a mere passing glimpse of Jesus, he had a face-to-face, and a heart-toheart encounter with him.

He not only discovered what Jesus looked like but also what his heart was like. And to know the heart of Jesus was to know the possibilities of his own heart too. Zacchaeus liked what he discovered about Jesus. And he also liked what he discovered about himself. He experienced 'the melting of the heart'. His heart came to life like a desert landscape after a

Zacchaeus' conversion was immediate, visible and, we feel sure, permanent. It was not, however, just an intellectual conversion. He had a change of heart. From a Gospel viewpoint this is most important conversion of all. It is, perhaps, harder to achieve than an intellectual conversion, and is certainly more far-reaching in its consequences. Fear can't produce this kind of conversion. Only an encounter with love can.

The central issue for human beings in how we can have a change of heart and learn to love one another. There has to be a touching, a softening, a moving of the heart, which leads to an opening of the heart, and finally to a sharing of the heart's riches. A harsh approach causes the heart to close and harden. A kind approach, such as Jesus adopted with Zacchaeus, causes the heart to soften and open. Nothing but the heart can change the heart. Treat a man as he is, and he will become worse; treat him as he ought to be, or as he aspires to be, and he will become better, because our aspirations are the most real part of us (Goethe).

Jesus saw that Zacchaeus' wrongdoing was not the whole of him, and that he had within him the possibility of goodness. Jesus' vision of Zacchaeus affected the way Zacchaeus saw himself. Goodness evokes goodness.

Zacchaeus' conversion was a conversion to goodness. All of us stand in need of such a conversion. Each of us has the capacity that Zacchaeus had, though it may be hidden or unexpressed. Each of us stands in need of daily conversions from a closed heart to an open heart, from a heart of stone to a heart of flesh.
