Gospel Reflection with Fr. Tom

In different ways, all three readings of today's Mass deal with the theme of eternal life.

An old and infirm man was living in a shack on the edge of the forest. One winter's morning he got up to find only one meal of porridge left, the fireplace empty, and snow on the ground. He felt like asking God to take him to heaven there and then. However, he managed to summon up a little spirit, and went into the forest to collect firewood.

He collected a large bundle of sticks. Then he put a rope around it and tied a knot. However, when he tried to lift the bundle onto his shoulders, he found that he couldn't even move it. With that a wave of depression swept over him. He looked up to heaven and said, "Lord, take me now. I've nothing left to live for."

In an instant a strapping young man appeared at his side. The stranger introduced himself as the Angel of Death and said, "You sent for me. Well, now that I'm here, what can I do for you?" Quick as a flash the old man replied, "Hey son, would you ever give me a hand with this bundle of sticks."

As we go on in life we become increasingly aware of how fleeting life is, and how precarious is our hold over it. In spite of ourselves we become familiar with the thought of death. But this need not be a negative or morbid thing. In fact, it can be a very positive thing. Thinking about death can result in a true love of life. When we are familiar with death, we accept each day as a gift. And when we accept life bit by bit like this, it becomes very precious.

By facing our mortality we are put in touch with that other life, eternal life, the seeds of which have been planted in our hearts and souls. Death is the passage to a new life, which (as Jesus says in the Gospel) utterly transcends the life we know now. This sounds beautiful, but that doesn't mean it's easy.

Our passage from this world is preceded by many other smaller passages. When we were born we made the passage from life in the womb to life outside the womb. When we went to school we made the passage from life in the family to life in the larger community. Those who have married have made the passage from a life with many options to a life committed to one person. Those who have retired have made a passage from a life of clearly defined work to a life without such work. Each of these passages results in a kind of death but also leads to new life. When we live these passages well, we are preparing ourselves for our final passage.

The thing that best helps us to confront the reality of death is our Christian faith. Faith enables us to face death with courage and hope, because we know we can overcome it in Christ. But the courage and faith of people such as the woman and her seven sons (First Reading) also serve as a powerful example to us who follow them in faith. The martyrs, by their witness to the Spirit, show that life is stronger than the forces of death.

"Proofs" based on the immortality of the soul are not very helpful. For the Christian, the real ground of immortality is fellowship with the risen Lord and with the living God. As Paul says, "God has given us his love and, through his grace, inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope" (Second Reading).

God has made promises to us in Christ which cannot fail, promises which death cannot annul. Our hope of resurrection lies in the power and love of God. Death is not the enemy who puts an end to everything but the friend who takes us by the hand and leads us into the Kingdom of eternal love.

Readings for the Thirty-second in Ordinary Time

Lectionary: 153 Reading 1 Wis 11:22-12:2

It happened that seven brothers with their mother were arrested

and tortured with whips and scourges by the king, to force them to eat pork in violation of God's law. One of the brothers, speaking for the others, said: "What do you expect to achieve by questioning us?

We are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors."

At the point of death he said:

"You accursed fiend, you are depriving us of this present life,

but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever.

It is for his laws that we are dying."

After him the third suffered their cruel sport. He put out his tongue at once when told to do so, and bravely held out his hands, as he spoke these noble words:

"It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." Even the king and his attendants marveled at the young man's courage,

because he regarded his sufferings as nothing.

After he had died,

they tortured and maltreated the fourth brother in the same way.

When he was near death, he said,
"It is my choice to die at the hands of men
with the hope God gives of being raised up by

but for you, there will be no resurrection to life."

Salute to WWII Veterans



John Mitchell and his twin brother Jim, enlisted in the United States Navy on May 2, 1945 after only three and a half years at East High School in Akron, Ohio. Their parents received the twins diplomas, as the 18 year old young men were serving their country during the graduation ceremony.

Following eight weeks of Boot Camp at the Great Lakes Training Center, they were sent to San Diego Hospital Corpsman School. The twins learned nursing, pharmacy, first aid, drug use, wound and burn care. Upon completion of the three month course, they became certified Naval Corpsmen.

Both John and Jim were assigned to St. Albans Naval Hospital in Queens, New York City, where they cared for wounded GI's returning home from the war.

Following their honorable discharge in 1947, the twins went to the University of Akron for undergraduate degrees and then to Michigan Law School, graduating in June, 1942. They did everything together, even getting married at a double wedding ceremony in June, 1950 and going into law practice for one year before joining different corporates. Jim passed away in 1995.

John also has an older brother, Charles, a B-17 pilot who was shot downby enemy fire and rescued by the French underground. Charles celebrated his 100th birthday this past July 4th.

Thank you John, for all you did to make the USA a wonderful country. You are a true patriot and a member of the "Greatest Generation."



Looking forward to his 100th birthday next June, Boston native Martin Monahan is a joy to speak with and has an infectious smile to all who meet him. After graduation from Boston Latin High School in 1942, Monahan enlisted in the United Sates Navy as an aviation cadet.

His two years of naval aviation pilot training took him from Boston to Connecticut, Oklahoma and Texas where he was commissioned as an naval aviator Ensign USNR and received his "Wings" to fly the famed TBM torpedo bomber and qualified as an aircraft carrier pilot.

Assigned was to the "Top Hat Squadron", the first dive bomber squadron in the USN. Anxious to join the fight in the Pacific, Japan surrendered before this member of the "Greatest Generation" could use his skills against the enemy.

Monahan received an honorable discharge in November 1945 and returned to Boston and graduated from Tufts University, where he earned a degree in mathematics and physics and went on to work for GE for 34 years in their jet engine department.

Martin and his wife Anne were married in 1945 and had two children, Martin and Mary Ellen. After 58 years of marriage, Anne passed away in 2003.

Martin resides in Aston Gardens senior living community and can often be seen riding his tricycle to Seed to Table farmers market store with an American flag on the basket.

Thank you for your service to our country Martin, you are a true patriot of the USA.
