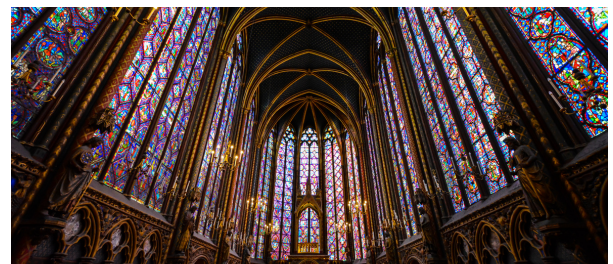

# Gospel Reflection with Fr. Tom

One of the images Isaiah uses to describe the messianic age is that of a lamb lying down with a wolf and having nothing to fear. It is a picture of a time of universal peace - the strong would no longer prey on the weak, or the cunning on the innocent.

Advent, with its wonderful promises of a new world, takes us on a trip to a place called hope. If things and people were perfect, hope would not be needed. Hope is required precisely because we live in an imperfect world.

Hope is a vital part of life. We spend a great deal of our lives longing, waiting, hoping for one thing or another. It is impossible to live when one is completely without hope. Hope is as important for our spirit as food is for our body.

Hope doesn't mean sitting back waiting for things to happen. Hope spurs us into action. It is precisely because we have hope that we work so hard. We believe our efforts are worthwhile, and that they do make a difference. Our strength, our commitment, depends to a great extent on the degree and quality of our hope. I am neither an optimist nor a pessimist. I just carry hope in my heart.

Hope is not a feeling of certainty that everything ends well. Hope is just a feeling that life and work have a meaning.

Cynicism is the enemy of hope. Many refuse to accept hope into their hearts. They say: "Things will never change. It's no good."

Cynicism comes easy. It requires nothing from us - no trust, no effort, no love. Hope is not the same thing as optimism. In fact, hope and optimism are radically different. Optimism is the expectation that things will get better, whatever the situation. Hope is the trust that God will fulfill his promises in his way and in his time. The person of hope lives in the present moment, with the knowledge and trust that all of life is in God's hands.

Hope springs from faith that God will fulfill the promises he has made to us. He has given us his word in Jesus. That word is the basis on which our hope rests. And that hope is an anchor of our lives. All great leaders were people of hope. They felt no need to know what the future would look like. They just tried to do what was right in the present, and trusted that God would take care of the future. It was enough for them to know that God is a faithful God.

What the world needs is new people. Hence, the relevance for us of John's call to repentance. To repent means to change our understanding of what is important in life, and to change our lives accordingly. Changed people will bring about a changed world.

But what in practice can we do? St Paul brings it down to everyday realities. He says, "Treat each other in the same friendly ways that Christ has treated you." That would make a difference. It's easy to be critical, to be over-hasty in making judgments, to be intolerant of the faults of others. If we did as Paul suggests we would make the world, or at least the corner of it that we inhabit, a more hopeful place.

It is the task of Christians to keep hope alive, and to set an example. However, we must not depend on results, but only on the rightness and truth of the work itself. We thank God for his blessings in the past, and ask his help for what we must yet achieve. When all is said and done, this world will never fulfill our deepest hopes.

Only God can do that. Meanwhile, we live in a place called hope. This hope enables us to keep one foot in the world as it is, and the other in the world as it should be.

## Reading 1 Is 11:1-10

On that day, a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse,  
and from his roots a bud shall blossom.  
The spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him:  
a spirit of wisdom and of understanding,  
a spirit of counsel and of strength,  
a spirit of knowledge and of fear of the LORD,  
and his delight shall be the fear of the LORD.  
Not by appearance shall he judge,  
nor by hearsay shall he decide,
